Congressman to Speak--- POST OFFICE DEDICATION FRIDAY

Open House to Follow

Dedication and flag raising ceremonies will be held Friday, March 31 at 3 p.m. for Hico's new post office building, occupied since last November 1.

Hico Civic Club is sponsoring the dedication, in cooperation with the Regional Post Office Department, Dallas.

Featured speakers for the ceremony will be Honorable Omar Burleson of Anson, Congressman for the 17th District of Texas, and J. Allen Dupree, Assistant to the Regional Director, Post Office Department, Dallas.

Following the 3 p.m. dedication, open house will be held from 4 until 5 p.m., with refreshments served by Hico Homemaking students under the supervision of Mrs. Marilyn Johanson.

The Friday program will be opened with prelude music by the Hico Band, under direction of Mary Bert Denison. Invocation will be given by Rev. Hubert Taylor, pastor of First Methodist Church, and opening remarks will be given by Postmaster Robert Jackson.

Most Hico Businesses will close from 3 to 4 p.m. for the dedication ceremony.

Harold Walker, Civic Club president, will serve as master of ceremonies, and will introduce guests. Address will be by Mr. Dupree, with Dedicatory Address and presentation of the U.S. Flag by Congressman Burleson.

A color guard from Tarleton State College, Stephenville, will be in charge of flag-raising ceremonies.

The program will be closed with the National Anthem by the Hico Band, and Pledge of Allegiance, led by Rev. R. E. Tatum, pastor of First Baptist Church. Benediction will be voiced by Nelson Stark, Church of Christ minister.

New Building Occupied Nov. 1

Local postal patrons began receiving mail from the new facilities on Tuesday, November 1, following a weekend move to the new quarters.

The building, modern in every respect, was constructed on lease contract by A. L. Mann of Temple.

First planning for new postal quarters was begun in November, 1964, when the Post Office Department asked for bids on remodeling existing facilities. Receiving no bids at that time, the department

then sought bids on either remodeled facilities or new construction, with the latter receiving several bids.

However, it wasn't until August 30, 1965 that the new building was approved, and on September 30, contract was let to Mr. Mann as successful bidder.

The new structure contains 2,330 square feet of floor space, and has parking area containing 8,000 feet.

Employees at the post office include Mr. Jackson, postmaster; L. H. Hudson, Elvis Vinson and G. M. Bullard, clerks; Marvin Marshall, Bertice Barnett Jr., J. T. Butler and Morse Ross, rural carriers; and J. R. Bobo, maintenance.

Out of Town Visitors Expected
Many area postmasters, postal employees, and others are expected here for the dedication.

Search Is On For County's Outstanding Senior Citizen

A Hamilton County man or woman will be named "Outstanding Senior Citizen of the Year" during May, which is Senior Citizen Month. Nominations, which may be made by an individual or an organization, should be submitted by April 10.

The award is being made by the county Governor's Committee on the Aging. To be eligible, a senior citizen should be over 60 years of age and fully retired from all gainful pursuits. He or she must have been a resident of the county for at least five years, and have made a personal, not merely a financial, contribution to community welfare. Nominees should have been regular and consistent worker in one or more fields of community service, and should have given their time without thought of personal gain or public praise.

The committee will judge the entrants from summaries of their activities and services. The summaries, which should be submitted with the nomination, should include information on the nominee's service with community-wide organizations, to a group or class of people, and to and within an organization with a service objective.

Community-wide organizations include the Red Cross, County Program Planning Building Committee, Salvation Army, and so on. 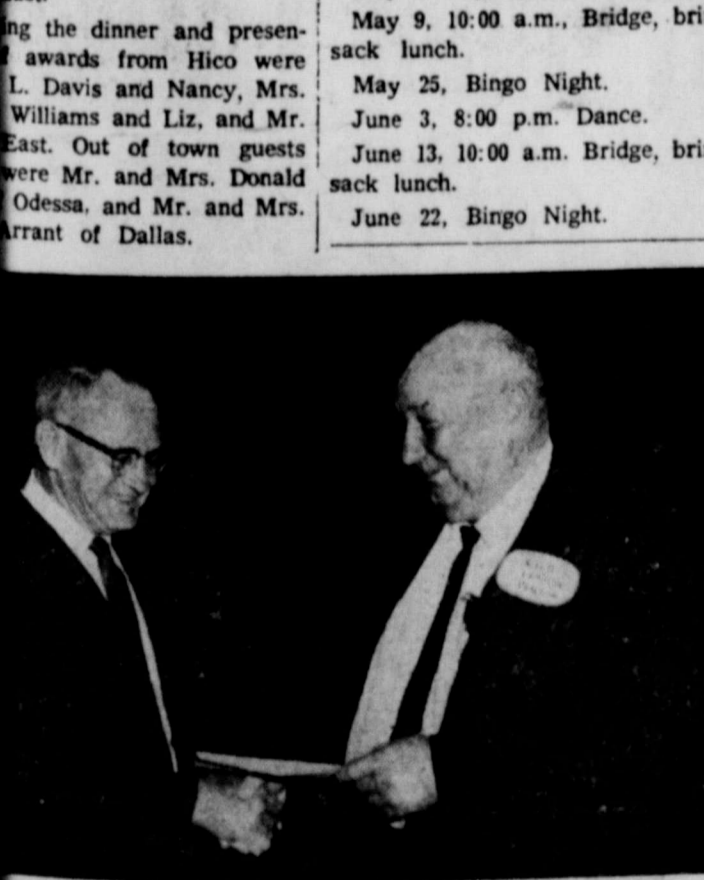
Mr. Cooper passed away in the Cleburne Hospital Tuesday. He was a former resident of Hico, and was the father of Mrs. Herman Leach.

O. L. Davis Receives 30-Year Pin at CPS Annual Spring Meeting

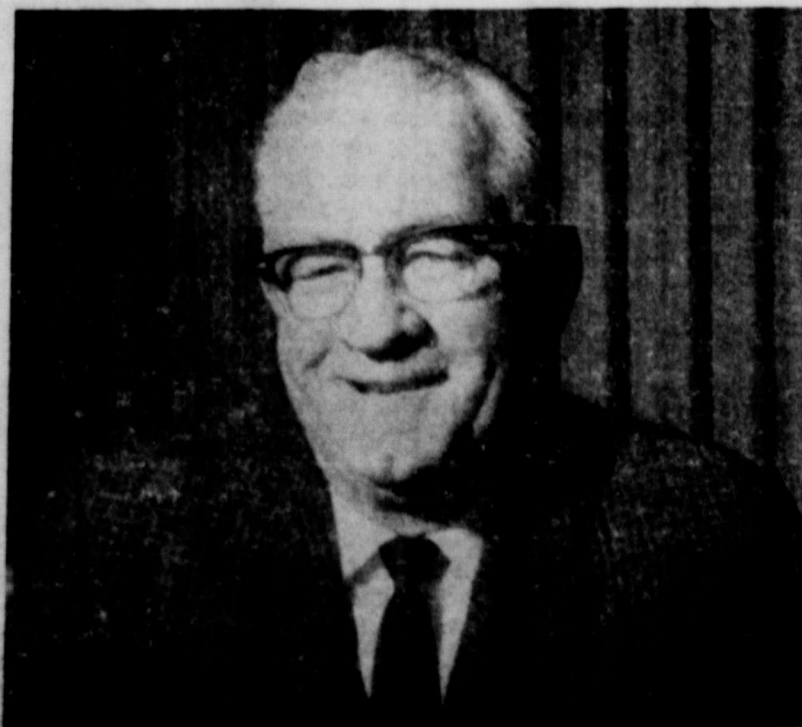
The spring meeting for employees of the Central Division of Community Public Service Company was held Friday, March 24 at the National Guard Armory in Clifton.

On the Home Range

Inspect your sewing machine. Give you the greatest satisfaction, you can't get it better. For care to guarantee operation, home sewers clean, oil, and lubricate lines periodically. Refer to instruction book for specific information and always for instruction. If you have completed a garment, remove lint and fluff from lever, thread guides, bobbin case and machine with a soft, clean cloth. Dampen the machine surface. Use a detergent. Use a lint brush clean the hook or thread-handle under the throat and slide. After each cleaning apply a drop of machine oil to these points. For specific oiling points, refer to the sewing machine instruction book. After oiling, always test a few lines of stitching on a piece of material to remove excess oil. Every few months, clean the area behind the face plate and oil the top and bottom of the machine in the oil holes. If the machine is to be stored, clean all exposed parts and areas behind the face plate. Swab these parts with a lint brush saturated in sewing machine oil to protect the machine from rust. Rust damage is more likely to occur when the machine is stored in a closed closet than when it is kept open to the air. Keep a small piece of fabric under the pressure foot with the needle down through it to protect the foot and feed from damage. When the pressure foot is down the pressure spring is released and its life prolonged. Also, excess oil will be carried into the accumulator rather than accumulating on the needle. Check all your every-day appliances, too, for lint, grease, dust. The best equipment will fall apart without proper care. Dates to Remember: March 20, Hico 4-H Club, Youth Center.

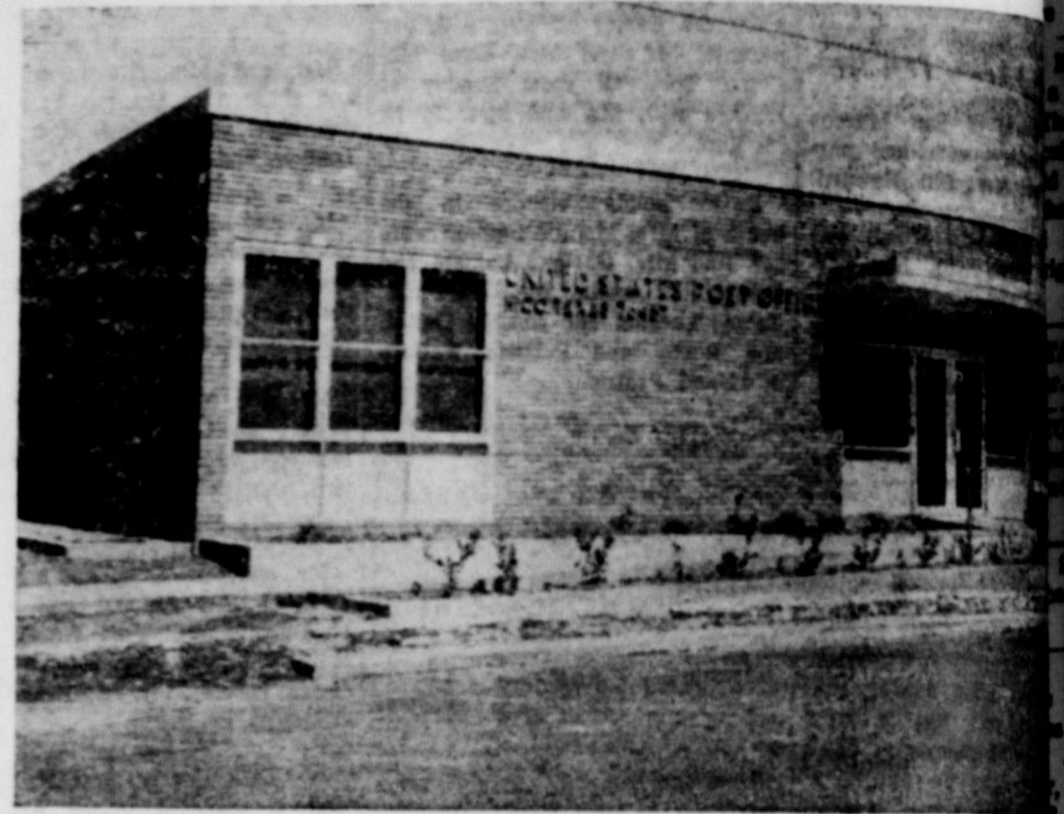

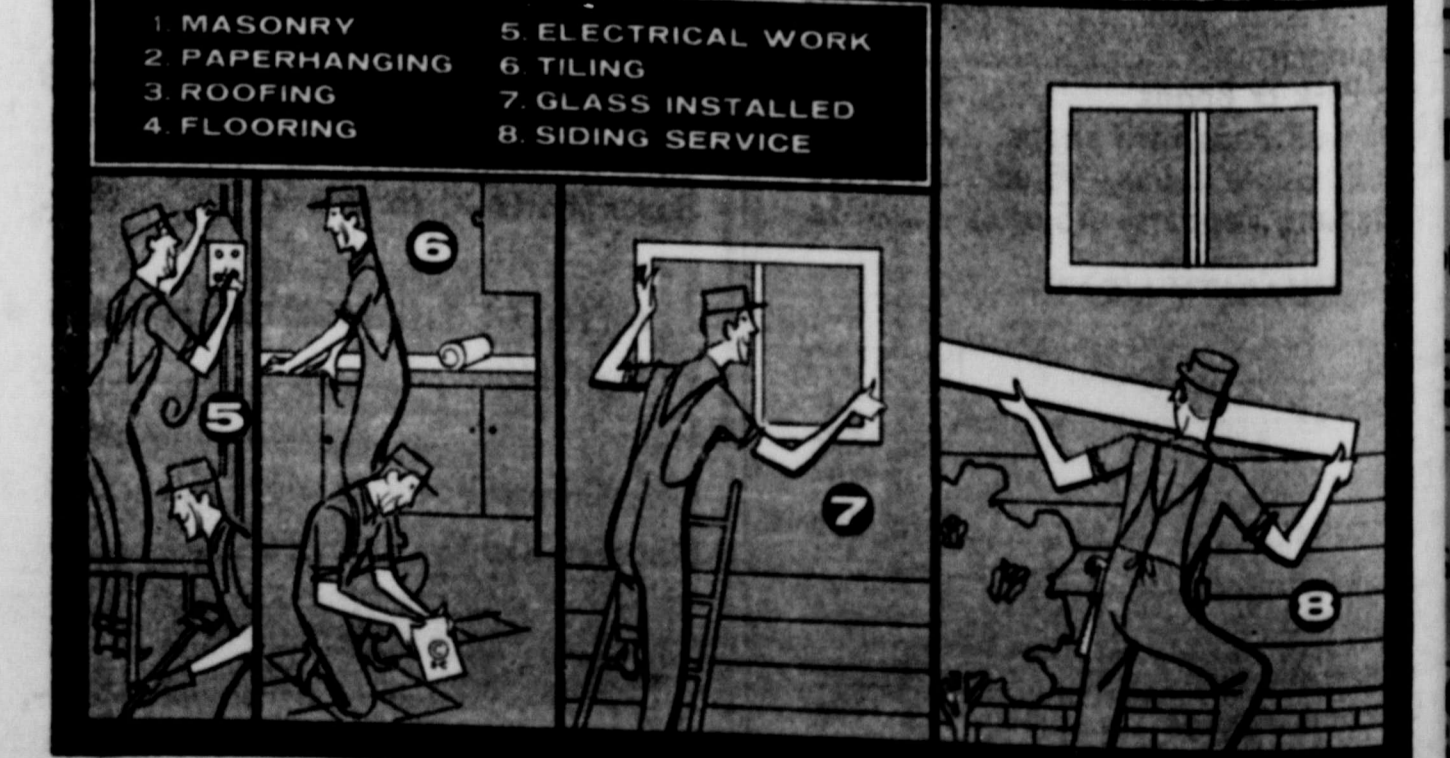

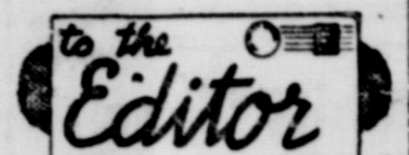

Director Sought to Lead County Senior Citizen Program

The Hamilton County Governor's Committee on the Aging is now taking applications for a salaried full-time director of activities for senior citizens in Hamilton County. The person the committee seeks should have senior citizen interests. He or she will coordinate a complete program of activities and social occasions for the older people here. Persons interested in the position should contact Jackie Eubanks at the high school in Hamilton for applications.

The coordinator and the program itself are authorized through Title III of the Older Americans Act of 1965. The program is administered on a state-wide level by the Governor's Committee on the Aging. On the local level the program will be sponsored by the Hamilton County unit of that committee. Title III funds are made available for the purpose of providing services of direct benefit to the aging population. The local committee's objective is "to develop the activities, services and cultural experiences of the aging citizens of Hamilton County in an effort to mobilize their economic, health and personal status into an active and progressive community group."

All applications for the director's position should be completed and returned to Eubanks at Hamilton High School on or before April 11. On or about this date a director for the project will be named.
