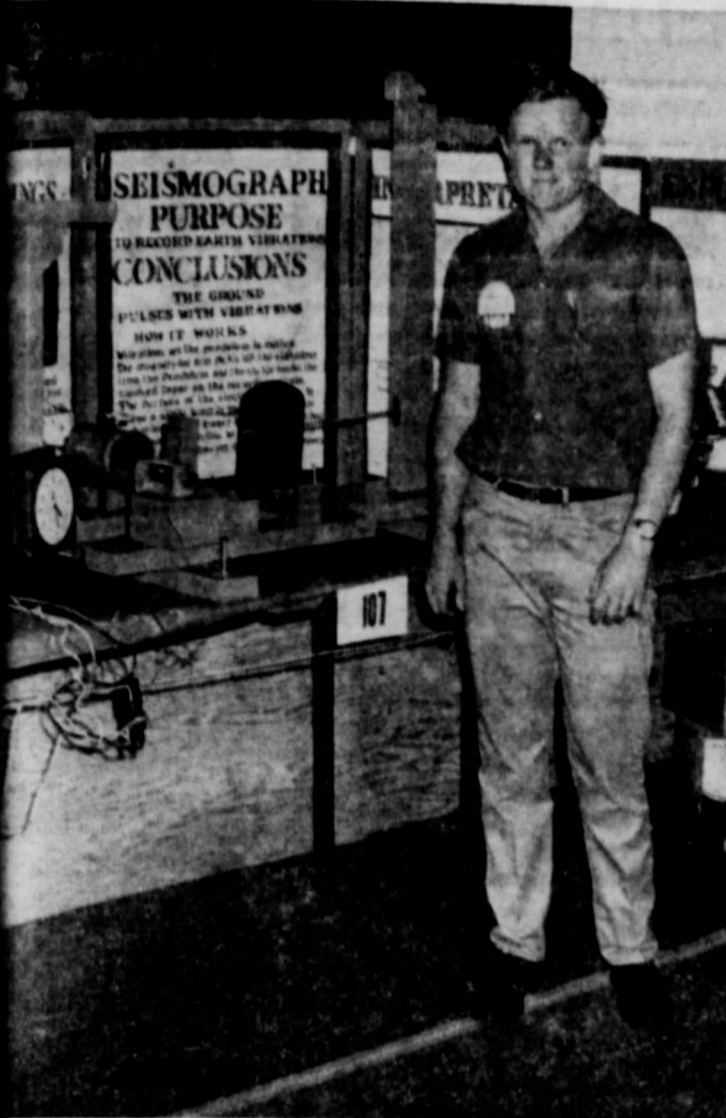

Ben Barnes Speaker's Day Barbecue Saturday at Proctor

Thousands of folks — including hundreds from distant points—are expected to gather at noon Saturday for the Ben Barnes Speaker's Day barbecue at Copperas Creek Park on Lake Proctor.

Governor John Connally will head the delegation of top-ranking state dignitaries who will attend and speak.

The park is located on Farm-to-Market Road 2861, which intersects Highways 67 and 377 between Dublin and Comanche and Highway 16 between DeLeon and Comanche.

Tickets to the noon meal are \$1.50 and may be purchased at the site. At least a dozen charter buses will bring visitors from Austin and Dallas. Private planes will bring people from other points.

State officeholders, Senators, Representatives and former Speaker's of the House have been invited and will be introduced.

Annual City-Wide Spring Clean-Up Next Week

Monday, April 17 through Friday, April 21, has been proclaimed Annual Clean-Up time in Hico by Mayor W. C. Howard.

Trash placed in containers and set at the curb will be hauled off free of charge by the city on two separate days during the week.

Free haul-off days will be Wednesday, April 19, and Friday, April 21.

The mayor has called upon every citizen to render all the aid and cooperation possible, pledging the cooperation of city officials in perpetuating Hico's record for sightliness and healthful conditions.

City officials pointed out that there is always an accumulation of trash about premises of residences throughout town. Constant effort is needed this time of year to maintain sanitary conditions and control the hordes of mosquitos which are beginning to make their appearance.

People are urged to cut weeds in ditches, gather up all old tin cans, empty trash barrels, and do anything else that will help the appearance of premises during this special period of cleaning.

The mayor emphasized the necessity of placing all trash in containers to speed the clean-up program. All containers should be placed as near a curb as possible to be more accessible to haulers.

Dog Vaccination Set Here Next Thursday

Annual Dog Vaccination Day will be held Thursday, April 20, at the Vocational Agriculture Building at the school. The special day is sponsored each year by Hico Chapter of Future Farmers as a public service to area people.

Time period for the vaccination will be 8:30 a.m. until noon.

Dr. J. B. Putty of Hico will

vaccinate the dogs and pets, with a nominal fee charged the owners. The FFA Chapter receives most of the funds from the program.

Area residents, both city and rural, are asked to keep the date in mind and bring their dogs and other pets to the school for the economical rabies vaccine, as there have been some confirmed cases of rabies reported in the area.

"Let's Look at Self"

Most everyone has at one time or other given themselves a self-analysis, to see just what kind of person we really are. I am not quite sure what prompts one to do this, but we attempt to get a clearer picture of what life has given us; to reflect on the course of events that have occurred through the years; to imagine any changes we would like to make, or any events we would like to have changed. This recalling of the past we have already spent; the outlook (as we see it) for the future, and the position we find ourselves to be in the present; allows us to reasonably well define the person we actually are, and to determine if we are satisfied with what we discover ourselves to be.

Our life is an ever changing pattern, and as we review those circumstances that have had an influence on shaping the person we believe we are, we must recognize there are many composites that make up each of our individual personalities. In the reflection of our own personal experiences, we should have gained great benefit had we heeded some of the warnings that were given us through the years. Many pitfalls could have been avoided had not our self-willed action led us into too many unpleasant encounters. I am sure each of us insist on our individual rights to shape our lives the way we see best suited to our own beliefs. This should be our choice, but so many uncontrolled factors enter into the areas of our destiny, until actually we are very limited in choosing for one's self. We may not be aware of this many times, but if you will only reflect back over any given period, you shall see with unequivocal clarity this is true.

All of life is guided by the influence of those with whom we are associated. The guiding influence of your own life should be carefully measured in the standards of benefits given to your associates. All too often we lose sight of the undisputed reality, that in every contact we make, we are exerting an influence on those whose paths coincide with our own.

If in our self-analysis we find some characteristics that do not tend to uplift, then we should make every attempt to change those qualities, and in so doing we shall find we have enriched our own personalities. If we are not too pleased with what we are, it is still not too late to instill those qualities we desire. Many of the opportunities we have had may have passed beyond recall, but the basic need of change is still ours, and only the will to bring about such change is necessary. Until such time the stable ingredients of self-improvement become a fixed part of life's pattern, one is generally floating about with a very irregular course. Oh, that we could see the imperative need for self-improvement, and not be slack concerning this need, we would escape the inevitable disappointment of having to face much frustration in later years.

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On the Home Range

The Family Living Committee of Hamilton County is sponsoring a special interest meeting on "Stretch Your Home Financing \$\$\$" on May 4 at 1:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall of Hamilton Methodist Church. Topics will be discussed that will be of interest to homeowners and prospective homeowners. Mark this day on your calendar so you don't forget it.

Spring is the time for sprucing up, or even remodeling the home. According to the U.S. Dept. of Commerce survey, about seven out of every 10 home owners plan to modernize or remodel within the near future.

The upsurge in home improvement and remodeling is closely related to the fact that financing for home modernization has been more readily available than for long-term mortgages. In addition, families have higher incomes and can carry larger home improvement loans. Houses built in the 1950's are beginning to need major repairs and up-dating, and are major targets for renovation work.

If you are satisfied with your present home location, families who need more room may choose to remodel rather than move. In many cases, it's much easier on the family pocketbook to refinance the

present home than to buy a new one.

Certain modernizations add value to the home as well as increasing the comfort and livability for family members. Often the increased value will more than offset the cost of the project.

The wise homeowner will protect his housing investment by caring for those small but important annual maintenance jobs.

When making meringues, separate egg whites and yolks carefully. Even a speck of yolk in the white will prevent it from beating up to full volume. Traces of yolk may be removed with a paper towel or piece of egg shell.

Egg whites beat to their greatest volume at room temperature. Beat the whites as stiff as possible, or until firm peaks are formed when the beaters are removed.

Buy pillowcases two inches wider and eight to ten inches longer than the pillow so they'll fit without straining, give longer service.

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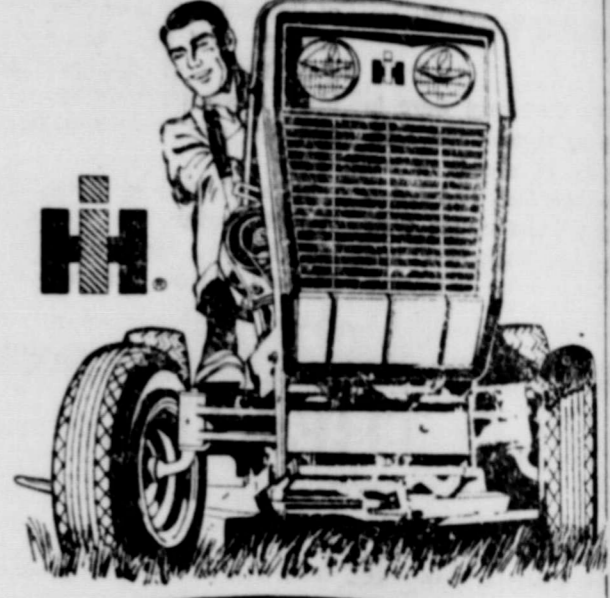

The 1967 Hamilton County Pecan Budding and Grafting School will be held Tuesday, April 18th from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The morning session-9 to 11:30-will be held in the Lion's Club Youth Center in Hamilton. B. G. Hancock, horticulturist with the Extension Service, will be in charge of the program. He is a noted pecan man and does an outstanding job in presenting this program. Hancock will demonstrate patch budding and inlay grafting and explain the various procedures used with each.

Following the lunch break the afternoon program will be practical work. The group will meet at the Hidden Valley Store on Highway 281 at 1:15 p.m. and everyone will

get to try his or her hand at budding and grafting.

Budding and grafting techniques are not difficult to master and it can become a fascinating hobby and a profitable practice. One word of caution however; if you get one bud or graft to live you can become an incurable addict. It is highly fascinating to watch a bud or graft you have put on develop into a tree of your own choosing.

The pecan as a cash crop in Hamilton County is just coming into its own. Along the county's rivers and streams there are thousands of pecan trees that are not producing a fraction of their potential.

In many of these areas thinning, brush control, and management are the answer. There are many areas however where budding and grafting to improve varieties should be used. If you are interested in pecan improvement, or simply interested in budding and grafting as a hobby, come out at 9 a.m. Tuesday, April 18th and join in the activities.
