The time change, effective nation-wide on the above date, will not greatly affect any of the merchants and individuals contacted. Most were happy about the extra hour of daylight at the end of the day.

In simple explanation, the change-over means that people will be going to work one hour earlier and quitting with one hour more of daylight. Businesses that formerly opened at 8 a.m. will actually be opening at 7 a.m., and if they have been closing at 5 p.m., the new time will be 4 p.m., by the

## Race Track, **Drag Strip** Planned Here

Tentative plans call for the oval to be finished by the third week in May, with the first racing program to be held the fourth week of that month.
