COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

One extreme usually follows another in this country and after a mild winter the county has received quite a lot of turbulent weather in the past several weeks. Although sections of the county have received good rains, drouthy conditions remain in other sections. Most of the western portion of the county is in need of mois-

ture for stock water, crops and pastures.

Livestock producers are urged to continue collecting and sending samples of all worms found in animal wounds to the Mission Screwworm Eradication Laboratory for positive identification. Hamilton County livestock raisers have cooperated well with the program and I am sure will continue to do so. Vials for collecting samples are available in my office.

Excessive and improper tillage operations may cause more income loss than is realized.

There are four basic reasons for a cultural or tillage operation: 1. To improve soil physical condition and promote water infiltration and aeration; 2. To destroy or control undesirable vegetation; 3.

To incorporate crop residues and other organic materials into the soil; and 4. To prepare a seedbed.

One tillage operation, plowing, may cause the formation of a sole—compacted soil usually found just beneath the normal tillage depth. To minimize this practice vary the tillage depth from year to year. It is often desirable to alternate deep chiseling, subsoiling and/or deep plowing on alternate years.

Don't operate wheel-type tractors on wet soil, especially when heavy equipment is being pulled. A slipping tractor tire moving in a row smooths and seals the soil beneath it by smearing, creating a layer of soil that prevents the downward movement of water and air. Wheel tracks should be chiseled out during the tillage process.



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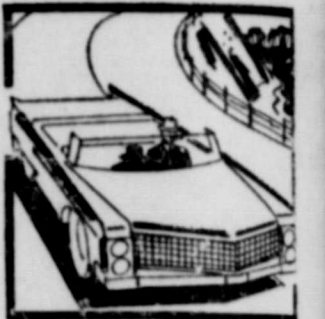

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—In the days just ahead there will be news from Austin about the efforts of the Texas Legislature to change lines of present State Legislative and Congressional Districts.

Whatever is done in the reshuffling of Congressional District lines will never please anyone completely. The Legislature will do the best it can, and it has a tremendously difficult job.

The Federal Court in Houston retained jurisdiction over this matter when the Legislature redistricted two years ago, and now demands that the job be completed

to meet the Supreme Court's decision on "One Man—One Vote."

Two years ago the state legislature acted responsibly and met the requirement in the best way possible. They came as near to establishing Congressional Districts to provide equal population as was possible at the time. Of course, exact equality is an absolute impossibility, and the more nearly the Legislature approaches the requirement of the Court, the less community of interest there can be in a Congressional District. Presently there are some ill arrangements such as A&M at College Station

being in the same district with TCU at Fort Worth, but, again, it was the best measure the Legislature could pass. When the legislature acts again, there likely will be even more conflicts, but unless they do, there is a danger of the 23 members of Congress from Texas running at large. Obviously, this would be chaotic.

At present, our 17th Congressional District is approximately 9.5 percent under the average of 417,000. Other Districts are approximately 11 percent over-populated, which makes a spread of a little more than 20 percent. It is assumed that the Federal Courts will demand a more even apportionment.

On the other hand the court has refused to indicate to the Legislature just what it expects in this regard. It gave no guidelines other than to say that Districts must contain the same population. Matters are further confused by suggesting that instead of using the official 1960 Decennial Census, which it seems is clearly contemplated by the Constitution of the United States, the Legislature may determine the number of people in a District by using any official or unofficial population figures.

This indicates that the Legislature must re-apportion all representative districts, both state and federal, every two years and come up with equal population in each district.

The success of representative government depends heavily on the contacts between the people and their Representatives. Unless they know each other there can be no true and meaningful representation. If a county or a part of a county is shifted every two years from one district to another, it becomes completely impossible for the people to get to know the man who represents the man as they should and for their representative to know their problems, as it is his duty to do. The result is not better government, but less effective representation.

The Supreme Court has indicated that not only must State Senatorial and State Representative and Congressional Districts be equal on the theory of "One Man—One Vote" but has now indicated that at every level of government, probably to include school districts, every district and precinct must have an equal number of people.

The theory of such representative government is perfectly good, but as a practical matter, to be exact is impossible.

There is no question that this test should be met to the greatest practical degree, but the demands of the Federal Courts show how unrealistic things become when the courts attempt to pass upon political matters.

In such a system as we have, if people and their local governments are left to their own devices they will work out these problems in the most practical way. Theory is one thing, but workable solutions are another. Community of interest in Legislative Districts should be maintained. Grapes, bananas and onions do not mix very well with apples, when we only want apples.

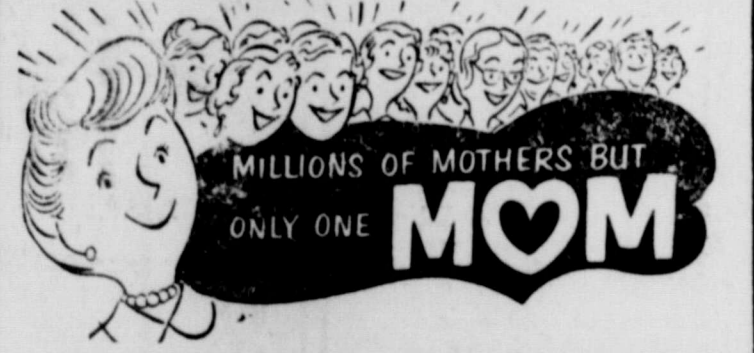

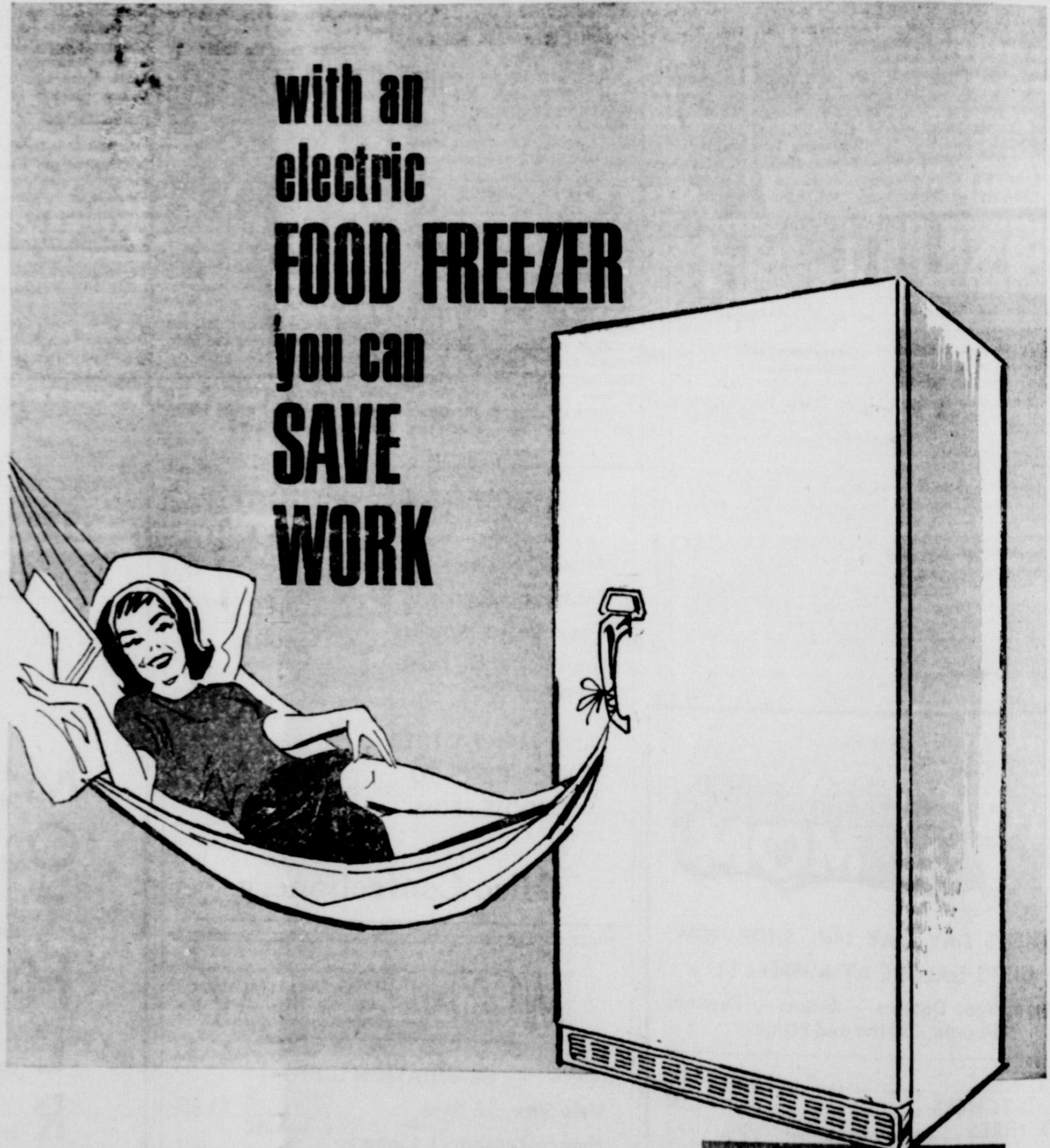

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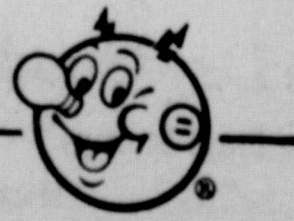

The greatest rewards are never material gain; the beautiful sweetness of joy is in the life of service to others!

As an individual we often feel we may not be able to accomplish any worthwhile achievement, but be not deceived: True brotherly love and concern is contagious, and one never knows who may be influenced by our unselfish adherence to the Golden Rule. It is not expecting too much of those of us who have the precious heri-

tage of being Americans, with the rights, privileges and freedoms we enjoy to set the world standard, and show by example we do accept the Golden Rule as our way of life. America, wake up! Our

blessed freedoms have been bought with a price. Our complacency must cease; the task is ours, may we accept the challenge. May our concern to all mankind be "Therefore all things whatsoever ye would

that men should do to you, do even so to them." May the true example of love to others, "Peace on earth, good will toward men."

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
