Sunday Storm Brings Needed Moisture

Winds, some hail, lightning, heavy rainfall raked this area Sunday afternoon, inflicting damage in some sections. Hico, more than two inches of rain were recorded, but up to five inches fell in other parts of the territory. Volunteer Firemen answered a call to the Bud Roberson home near the Stephenville-Dublin road about 2 p.m. after lightning had struck the house. Damage was inflicted to all electrical circuits, but didn't start a fire.

A person who was taking a shower when the lightning struck, was knocked from the bed by the bolt, but was uninjured, according to his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Roberson who lives nearby. Lightning bolt tore out the electrical circuit box, damaged the stove, burned chrome fixtures swimming in the bathroom.

City Employee Receives Citation From Health Department

Paul Hamilton (Spl.)—An official State Health Department citation for proficiency has been awarded to Zeiss, plant operations supervisor for the Hico water supply.

The citation reflects the preparation in which Zeiss is held in water officials. He is supervised by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Water and Sewage Works Division. The certificate of commendation is awarded only to those plant operators who have fully demonstrated their ability and knowledge in modern methods of plant management.

Qualification for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of work experience. He must also attend both regional and state short schools at which technique of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

The law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified by health department sanitary engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key servants to their community.

Sanitary engineers said the attainment of Zeiss' efforts to prepare himself for the profession.

Farmers Continue to Take it 'On the Chin', Price-Wise

Farmers continue to take it on the chin. Farm products went down 1.5 percent for the month ending April 15, according to Associated Press release. This makes a total decline of almost 10 percent since last August.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reported that farm prices as a whole in mid-April represented 72 percent of the parity price goals of federal farm aid programs compared with 74 percent in March and 80 percent in April a year ago.

Parity is defined as "Balance between the prices received by the farmer for his products and the prices he has to pay for taxes, labor, equipment, necessities, and comfort." The base period for computing parity is 1910-14. It was determined that the prices received for farm products at that time were equal to or the equivalent of prices paid for industrial products and other farm expenses.

While parity prices for agricultural products is the alleged goal of the Department of Agriculture, the gap continues to widen as shown by the statistics.

In February 1951 farmers received a high of 313 percent of the 1910-14 base average price for their

products. By mid-April last year this had dropped to 265 percent, and had gone down to 246 percent by mid-April this year. On the other hand prices paid by farmers in mid-April last year was 333 percent of the 1910-14 average and had gone up to 341 percent by mid-April this year.

In other words, what the farmer has to sell continues to go down in price and what he has to buy continues to cost more and more. This condition is referred to as the cost-price squeeze.

The USDA predicted last fall that farm income for 1967 would decline. They now estimate that the decline will likely be more than the forecast indicated, and may be down as much as five percent or more from last year's net income.

The anticipated decline in farm income may not be as bad as it appears. It is predicted that the farm population will continue to decline. In that case it is estimated the per capita income of farm people from both farm and non-farm sources will change little from the 1966 average of \$1,731. This is only 66 percent of the non-farm average income.

Self-made men and independence are generally associated with farmers and ranchers. Faith, courage and stamina are also attributes of farmers and ranchers. Through their faith they show complete confidence in something open to question and doubtful outcome—farming and ranching. In their courage they exhibit that rare human quality which keeps one going in the face of many difficulties. In their stamina they show their enduring capacity to overcome the many hazards of farming and ranching. They deserve at least parity prices for their products instead of the 72 percent of parity they are now getting.

Fractured 'Filosophy'...

A tribute of reverence and respect should be paid to father on this special day set apart for the recognition and remembrance of our Dads. This is well, and as it should be, but there is a great responsibility for any man to be a father, and I should like to talk frankly to the Dads of today.

The greatest and cherished privilege given to any man is the privilege of fatherhood. The responsibility that goes along with being a father should never be taken lightly. Our role as father behooves us to do all we know to be right in the sight of God and man in fulfilling our responsibility toward our children. Today's parents are failing pitifully in the guidance of their children. The lead of proper upbringing of the family should rest on the shoulders of Dad. Too often the greatest needs of children are neglected by both parents, but father has an unparalleled role to accomplish the objectives of bringing up children as they should be taught and guided. We need only to read or hear any news media to be made aware of the cruel reality of the failure of multitudes of today's parents. This theory of Dad's responsibility may seem rather astringent, but as a father who has faced all the problems of rearing a large family, and making far too many errors, I feel qualified to pass on to the fathers of America the need of being a father who accepts his duty and challenge as he should. Please read carefully, and consider prayerfully the following statements.

You are the only man who can give your children a Christian Daddy. You are the greatest, and most heroic man alive to your children: Be ever so careful not to destroy this image. You are the best anchor of hope to instill the true virtues of character (integrity, sincerity, humility and love). The church, school, and other community functions play a part in the development of your child's character, but it is YOU who has the

most persuasive force of influence in the life of your child. Your child should always be told the truth (it may "harelip a purple cow" so to speak, but the truth is always best). You are the example your child is more likely to follow than any other. Be the example you would want your child to follow. How often is it said, "He (or she) is only following in their Dad's footsteps?" Make that example one you can have your child follow with pride, "Like father, like son." Never

punish your child in anger. Enforce discipline firmly, but fairly. Be a companion and pal to your children. Share your leisure time with your family. Never be too busy to listen attentively to any problem your child may have. If you are unable to help with the problem, you can be sympathetic. Your child's problems are as real to them as yours are to you. Discuss family decisions with your children, particularly those pertaining to or involving the child. Show re-

spect to your children. Protect rights and privacy of your child. Encourage repeated effort in a situation that your child may have experienced defeat or failure, give your children religious training, but don't send them to church — take them. Be the right kind of father. May we be you with this thought: Work the task of being the kind of Dad your children will sincerely say you have reached maturity, "I glad he was my Father."
