Town Development Questionnaire Will Be in July CPS Bills

Much has been written and said by civic leaders in recent months about ways and means of helping a town grow and prosper in spite of the many problems that plague the smaller communities of the state. It is generally agreed that the acquisition of new industry is one of the quickest and most effective ways of giving a boost to local economy.

Every citizen of Hico is being given an opportunity to take part in the search for industrial firms which may be interested in expanding or moving into this area.

"Along with civic leaders and other civic-minded firms, Community Public Service Company is helping distribute a questionnaire designed to turn up leads on industrial prospects," according to O. L. Davis, local manager for the power company.

"A copy of the questionnaire will be enclosed with electric service bills during the next month," Mr. Davis continued, "and every citizen of this community is encouraged to obtain, fill out and return the questionnaire as an aid to helping Hico grow and prosper."

Grandson of Hico Woman Commended for Viet Action

Seaman John Dankers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Dankers of Austin, and grandson of Mrs. Daisy Dankers of Hico, received the following letter of commendation from the commanding officer of the USS Oriskany. Young Dankers was one of 10 men of the crew of 3500 to receive the commendation for bravery during a fire aboard the aircraft carrier while on duty last fall off the coast of Vietnam.

The commendation read as follows:

"It is with extreme personal satisfaction that I present you this Letter of Commendation for your valiant and courageous actions during the disastrous fire at sea experienced by the USS Oriskany on 26 October 1966.

"The fire broke out about 0730 in the vicinity of the flare locker just forward of Hangar Bay I on the starboard side. The flames, smoke and intense heat quickly spread throughout Hangar Bay I and forward into officers' country, engulfing several decks all the way forward to the forecastle. The holocaust was not brought under control until about 1100, when damage and casualties finally could be assessed. In addition to extensive fire damage to the aircraft equipment and spaces, it was found that 43 officers and enlisted personnel had given their lives in the service of their country.

"During the fire, your assistance in combating secondary fires and pettisoning 5-inch projectiles, powder cases and photoflash ammunition was of great value and helped reduce the possibility of additional fire and explosion. Your quick and timely actions were instrumental in bringing the fire under control and reducing the hazards to the ship.

"Your brave actions, disregard for your own safety, and devotion to duty reflected great credit upon yourself, and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

The letter was signed by J. H. Iarrobino, Commanding Officer.

The San Francisco Giants snatched 17-year-old Gary Houston in the recent major league draft of high school players.

Houston, six foot three pitcher, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Houston of San Jose, California, former Hico residents, who still have many relatives residing here.

He is the grandson of Mrs. Dora Houston Pendleton, now of Cleburne.

Reunion Manager Ray Keller has released committee heads and members, and set a tentative program for the four-day celebration, coming up July 26-29.

First named was the parade committee, headed this year by Donald Warren. He will be assisted by Mrs. Fred Rainwater, Louise Blair and Bill Doty.

Aid Sought in Finding Origin Of Area Names, Communities

Residents of Hamilton County have been asked to help solve the mystery of the origins of several geographical names found on county maps.

The information is needed for a dictionary of Texas place names, including Hamilton and the other 253 counties, to be published soon by the East Texas State University press. Before Dr. Tarpley, professor of English at the university, submits his final manuscript, he is appealing to county residents for assistance in contributing information about several names with unexplained origins.

Miss Lackey is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doc Lackey, all former residents of Hico. She was sponsored to Girls State by the Dublin American Legion Auxiliary.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937. Non-partisan and non-political, the purpose of Girls State Program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group, and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adult. They learn the problems of government by performing the same duties as real office holders in the everyday world. Citizens are selected at local levels principally on the basis of character and leadership from students who have just completed their junior year in high school.

Comanche (Spl).—"Big Doings in Little Lamkin" is the theme being celebrated for the celebration in Lamkin, Texas, on Tuesday, July 4th when the homecoming will be held, and House Speaker Ben Barnes will dedicate a historical marker, erected recently on the edge of Highway 36. The dedication will take place at 2 p.m. at the market site, which has been partially enclosed with a concrete wall and will be decorated with flags. Patriotic music will be furnished.

L. I. Dixon, chairman of Comanche County Historical Survey Committee, will introduce the speaker, James Von White of Fort Worth, who will be master of ceremonies and others appearing on the program will be Elder Len Dalton, pastor of the Primitive Baptist Church at Lamkin, and Rev. C. C.

Klingman of Comanche, who will give the benediction; Mrs. Freddie Sills of Lamkin, former teacher of Mr. Barnes, who will extend greetings; and Mrs. Robert De Laney will present a gift to the speaker.

Over 400 are expected to attend the homecoming and celebration, as former citizens, ex-students, and teachers helped to buy the historical marker which gives the history of Lamkin, beginning in 1869 when the last Indian raid took place at Resley's Creek, within two miles of the first Lamkin which started on the banks of the Leon River in 1870. The first town was washed away in the 1908 flood. It was rebuilt one-half mile from the river at its present site, and was a thriving and prosperous town until the highway and school consolidations dwindled the town to a small community.

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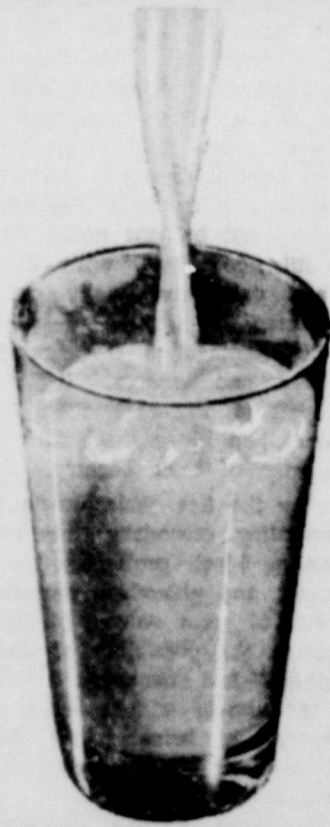

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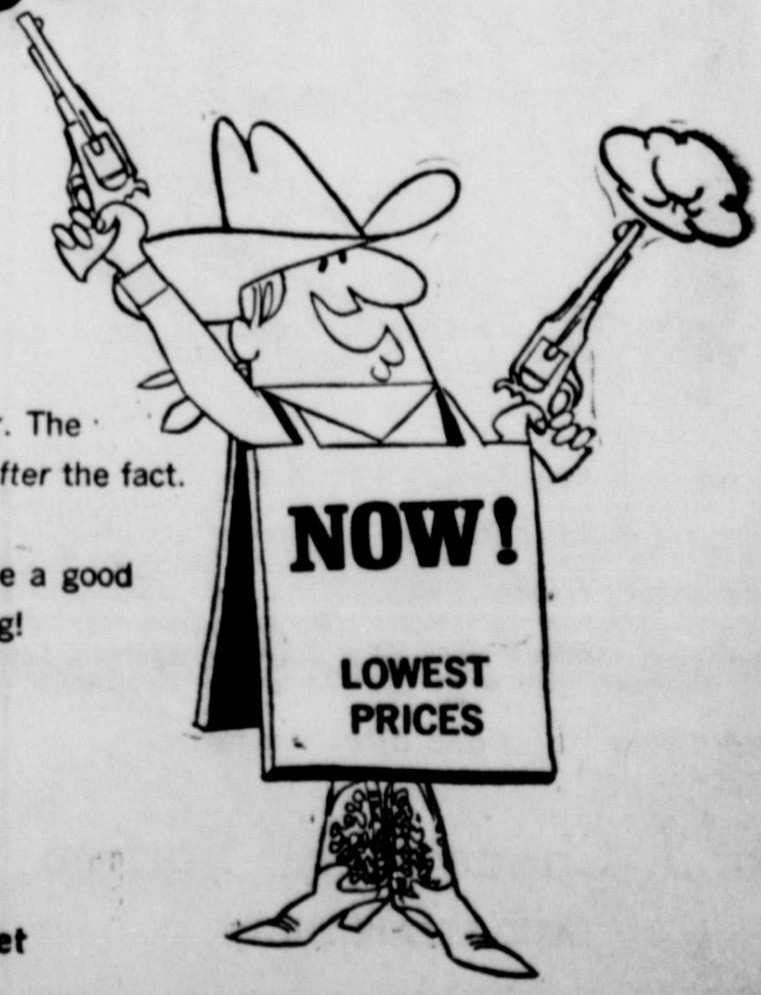
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WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—July 4th represents a moment of history too well known to bear mention. To call attention, however, to certain phenomena in relation to its origin and its ultimate achievement—the Declaration of Independence—may enhance the day's meaning.

The document was written in English.

Of course, everyone is aware of this fact, but the thought has just occurred at this particular time as we approach Independence Day.

"Why," we can ask ourselves. "Why English?" Why was it not written in French, Spanish, Dutch or Portuguese instead? All of these were ahead of the British.

The Portuguese had been entrenched on the Continent over a century before John Smith was born. France had its territories for decades before Plymouth Rock was even given its name. Spain, by then owned practically all of South and Central America, plus all of Texas and large areas around it. The Dutch were sipping cocoa in New Amsterdam long before the English changed the drink to tea and the name to New York. With all that competition, how did this country ever wind up in the English speaking column at all?

History suggests a number of reasons. The English, for example, were the only ones to bring their wives with them. Some other settlers did too, but it was the exception rather than the rule. Most of the original Latin-speaking residents were prisoners sent to the new Devils Island to satisfy their particular monarch's lust for power and gold. They mingled with the natives and produced a kind of nameless society and impermanent family unit. They were never really their own masters. It was the free English mother, who demanded for her children the schools, the churches and a sense of order that did so much to stabilize this land.

Maybe there are other good explanations, but the one that touches us most is the realization that, of all the nations which sought to conquer this Continent, England was the only one that carried out its colonization. It carried it out, not by kingly edict under the direct supervision of the Crown of England, but essentially civilian groups who pooled their assets to create the trading companies that privately finance their own development. Free men—risking their own capital in a venture for profit. That was the beginning.

Under this particular system came a different breed of individual with a different set of concepts of how he wanted to live. This was the hearty, fearless, rugged individualist of days gone by. The inevitable by-product of this characterization was the emergence of a sense of ownership and the development of responsible government under Constitutional Law. When the chips were down, these were the forces that won the final victory.

These were the people who won the final victory on the night of July 4, 1776. It was the night when a young patriot named Francis Scott Key, while a prisoner of the British on a ship in Chesapeake Bay, wrote on a piece of scrap paper "by the dawn's early light" when he saw the Stars and Stripes above the harbor of Baltimore City.

To remember and appreciate these incidents of our heritage, and to recognize the system of a free government under Constitutional Law, is to exercise our patriotism.

The system which gave us these things and established our Nation was a philosophy which could not be beat then. It still can't. Daniel Webster described this new government as "a more glorious edifice than Greece or Rome ever knew."

Orange juice popsicles for a welcome treat on a sticky day—a treat that may even lure adults to the freezer. Simple to make and easy to serve, orange juice popsicles make a nutritious appetizer, dessert or between-meal pacifier.

Dilute a 6-ounce can of frozen orange concentrate following directions on the can. Pour into an ice cube tray that releases cubes with little or no melting. Freeze with the refrigerator or freezer control set to "fast freeze." When the cubes are partly frozen, place a sucker stick or wooden skewer into each cube. Reset control to "normal" when freezing is finished.

When suckers are frozen solid, remove the cubes from the tray and place in a plastic bag. Seal with wrap around type sealer to tie top of bag in a knot. Then quickly put bag back into the freezer. Make as many as you can store easily—they'll be pretty popular.

Shirts wear out not much from steady wear as from heavy starching, overbleaching, set stains, and being allowed to whip on a clothesline. One method of removing bad soil from collars and cuffs is to dampen the area, then rub it well with a solution of one tablespoon of salt-soda per cup of water.

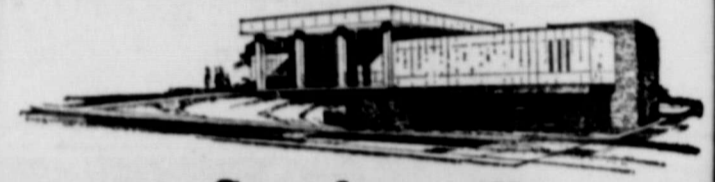

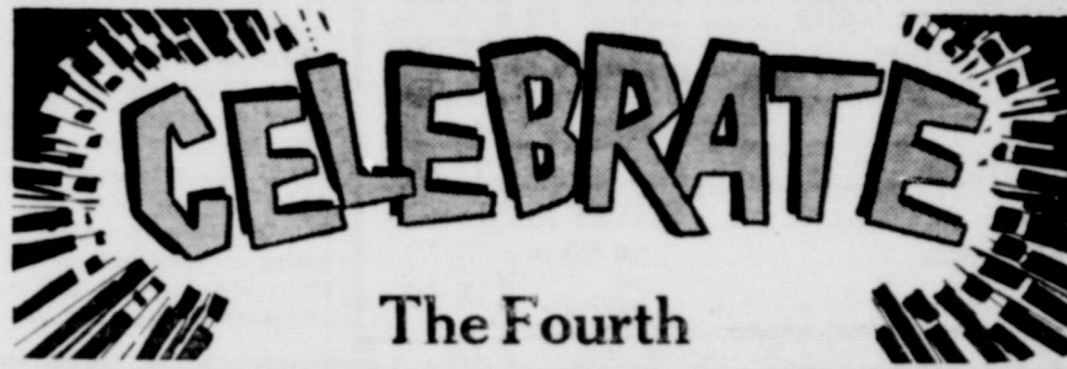

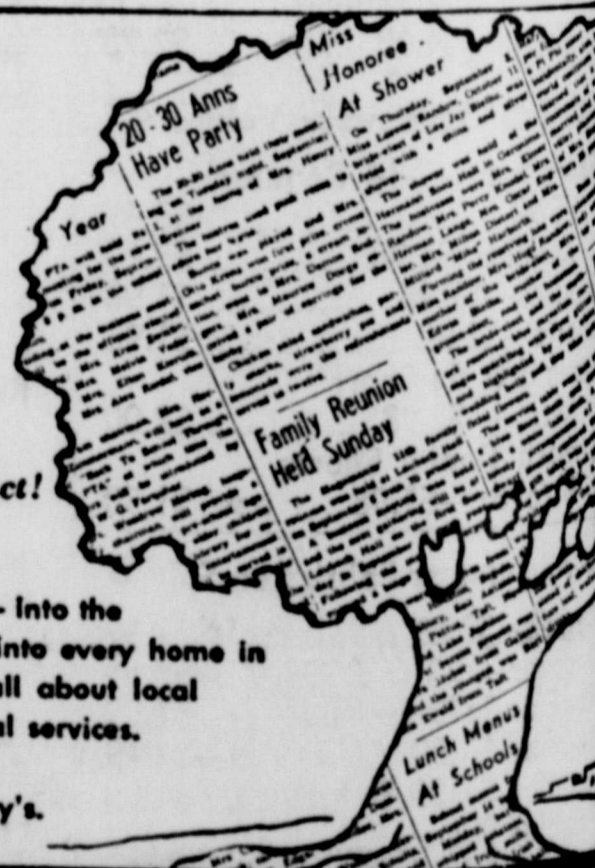

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

"June is Dairy Month" and it is

time to pay tribute to the county dairymen and their families. I include families because the entire family is necessarily involved in a dairy operation.

One only has to look around Hico to realize what the dairy industry means to this community. The money received for milk is spent in many ways, but most of it is circulated in the Hico area.

We can all support the local dairymen by consuming more milk and milk products. Milk is still one of the best food bargains.

Nutgrass is a worrisome problem in many lawns. Nutgrass and other weedy grasses which invade lawns, such as crabgrass and sand-

barr are not controlled by 2,4-D and other herbicides for broadleaf plants.

These weedy grasses can be controlled, however, by proper application of methylarsonates. The most common forms are disodium methylarsonate (DSMA) and amine methylarsonate (AMA).

These should be applied as a broadcast treatment to bermuda grass lawns only. DSMA or AMA will kill St. Augustine grass if applied broadcast.

To kill weedy grasses in St. Augustine, the DSMA or AMA should be applied as a spot treatment to the weeds only. When the herbicides are broadcast on bermuda grass, the leaf tips of the grass

may turn brown for a few days but will recover rapidly and will be damaged if the chemical is applied according to directions.

The methylarsonates, DSMA or AMA, will control most weedy grasses with the exception of grass in just one application. Since nutgrass has such an extensive root system, it takes several treatments to control nutgrass, even then, total eradication is most impossible.
