Many Visitors Attending—

Homecoming In Full Swing



SATURDAY ENTERTAINER — Eddie McDuff and the Country Gentlemen, billed as the nation's most exciting dance and show band, is scheduled to make an appearance Saturday night during the Annual Old Settlers Reunion. McDuff, a Starday recording artist, has recently completed an engagement at Las Vegas.

Several thousand people lined Main Street Wednesday afternoon to view the parade officially kicking off the 81st Annual Old Settlers Reunion.

The parade was actually the second event of the celebration, with the big street dance Tuesday night attracting a crowd conservatively estimated at 2,000 people.

Led by six uniformed units of the Karem Temple Shrine, the parade had the usual number of entries, including floats, cars, bicycles, and many mounted horses.

District Judge Truman E. Roberts of Hamilton, former Hicoan, made the opening day address.

Shriners represented in the parade were the Karem Band, led by Lyle Skinner, director, and Doc Tate, president; the Arab Patrol, Arthur K. Williams Jr., captain, and J. K. McKay president; Motor Patrol, J. B. Reese, president and John Ed Williams, captain; Karem Clowns, Lavaun DeMooney, president and John McDonald, vice-president; Director's Staff, Oron Land, director, and Henry Evans and James W. Kuykendall, assistant directors; and Parade Staff, George Fadal, marshal and James R. Ramsey, president.

Ira Winthrop Seley, potestate, led the Karem group.

Featured entertainer at City Park Wednesday night was Don Foley and the Westerners from Stephenville. They presented a 3-hour program, viewed by a capacity audience.

Thursday night activities featured a band especially for the youngsters

with the "oldsters" invited to join in the fun.

Friday night, the traditional Miss Reunion contest was slated, with a slight change in format this year. A three to six year age group competed for the junior title, and the 14-18 year olds competing for the senior title.

Saturday night, Eddie McDuff, nationally known entertainer, will present a three-hour program under the pavilion. McDuff, recording artist, has recently completed an engagement at Las Vegas.

The Saturday night program will end activities for the year, and a large crowd is expected for the final program.

Billy Doty Attends Annual Firemen's School at A&M

College Station (Spl).—One Hico fireman participated in the 38th Annual Texas Firemen's Training School last week at Texas A&M University.

Billy D. Doty, employee of Lone Star Gas Co. and a member of the local fire department for several years, attended.

He was among 2,200 firemen that attended representing 565 cities and 20 states in the United States and several foreign countries. Included are men who work in fire prevention and control for municipalities, industries and armed services.

Texas towns sending firemen to the school receive key rate credit for their insurance rates according to the number of firemen participating. Cities sponsoring one qualified fireman who completes the work successfully receive three percent credit. Those who sponsor a fireman and fire marshal, or assistant fire marshal get four percent credit. And cities with two or more firemen and the fire marshal gain a five per cent credit.

Instruction includes 16 separate 30-hour courses in firefighting, fire marshal training, fire department officer training, instructor training, pump maintenance, pump operation, armed services and specialized fire protection.

Experienced instructors and technical advisors assisted in the school. These include representatives from the liquefied petroleum industry, the Texas Department of Public Safety, fire and arson investigators, fire apparatus and equipment specialists, and guest instructors from fire departments, industry and the armed services in Texas and other states.

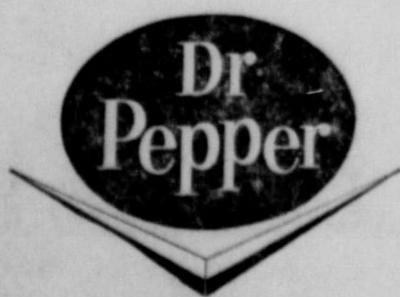

"What I want to know is, what you want to know about who wants to know what?"

Let's analyze the meaning of this sentence, shall we? It could be stated "I should like to know the things you would want to know about who may want to know certain facts" Confusing, isn't it? As the tongue-tied beatnik would say, "Clazy man, clazy, 'ats wat." The intricacies of certain words of our English language fascinates, befuddles our reason, and confounds our comprehension. Many times every day we use the word "what." In our usage of this little four letter word, we rarely ever stop to give thought to the word, or its many usages. No other word in Webster's has as many and varied definitions, nor more ways to be used. The sequence of the letters from the alphabet, in spelling in "what," is 23-6-1-20. "What" is a pronominal word used substantively and adjectively; that is, it is both a pronoun and an adjective. It is interrogative, it is absolute, a compound relative, and is both singular and plural. Not another word is sprinkled more through our conversation and written communication than "what."

Almost any question employs the use of "what." Nearly all directives include its use, and very few inquiries omit this little four-letter brain-teaser. Try making conversation (taking note of the number of times "what" is spoken) and you will see just how much our language is dependent on the word. What you do, what you speak, whatsoever your statements, "what" flows from your tongue many times, and without notice. As an experiment, see how much effort is required to make sentences, using other words to replace the normal usage of "what."

This thought provoking analysis of a much used word in our language, may not appeal to many as worthy of consideration, but so "what?" Many are the controversial issues that are brought to attention, with much less taste of enthusiasm. We shall continue our stumbling, and keep groping for the correct answers to "what's what." We will likely develop an attitude of indifference at our muddled confusion, and ask ourselves "So what?"

Take warning: the chances are slim that we shall ever really know "what's what," but why worry, we won't get out of it alive anyway. "What I want to know is what have we gone and done to you, our readers?"

Oh well, so much for "what." May we do better next time, regardless of "what" we aim toward.

Maturity date nears for 1966 cotton loans—Farmers have until the close of business Monday, July 31 to redeem their 1966 crop cotton which is under Commodity Credit Corporation loans, James Youngblood, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee said this week.

Growers who have 1966 crop upland and extra long staple cotton under loan may redeem their crop at any time through July 31 by paying off the loan plus charges and interest. Any of the cotton on which loans have not repaid by that time will be acquired by CCC.

Through July 1, a total of 717 bales of 1966 crop cotton was reported pledged for loans in Hamilton County. As of the same date, 388 bales had been redeemed, leaving loans outstanding on 307 bales.

Wheat, Feed Grain Final Payments

Final feed grain and cotton payments will be made in August. We have begun making wheat payments. To date \$13,081.59 of wheat payments have been made to 96 producers.

ACP Payments

Payments in the amount of \$19,947.76 were mailed to producers July 14 for carrying out 1967 ACP practices. Approximately \$17,121 has been paid direct to contractors or vendors for performing ACP work for Hamilton County producers in 1967.

Facility Loans

There have been some changes in eligibility for farm storage facility loans. More producers are now eligible for loans. Producers needing additional storage may make application at the county office. Loans will be made at 4 percent interest and 5 years to pay. Some of the major changes in requirements are: 1. Need not be eligible for price support; 2. Insurance requirements eliminated; 3. movable and immovable classification of bins eliminated.

On the Home Range

As the consumer, must understand the fibers, fabric characteristics, and care to buy wisely and prolong the life of garments. It is necessary to continually study the needs of family members in terms of activities, special needs, and total family income. Study fabrics, their fiber content and finish.

That causes jelly or jam to be at the top of the container. Storage in too warm a place, a faulty seal that allows air to enter.

That causes fading of jelly? Warm a storage place or too storage. Red fruits such as raspberries and raspberries are especially likely to fade.

That causes fermentation of jelly? Too little sugar, or improper storage.

That makes jelly too stiff? Too

much pectin (fruit was not ripe enough or too much added pectin was used). Overcooking.

We know that rice is one of man's oldest foods, even if we don't know the exact date of the first cultivation. One-half of today's population depends on rice as a basic food. In many countries, food is the same word as rice cultivation.

Rice first came to America on a ship from Madagascar which landed in Charleston, S.C. for repairs. In appreciation for the hospitality he received, the captain presented the settlers with a bag of rice.

Rice has been popular since that day. It is the original convenience food—easily prepared with no peeling or scraping, and no waste.

Easy as rice is to prepare some do's and don'ts will make it fluffier and more attractive. Don't wash or rinse rice. It is machine milled and already clean. Don't peek while the rice is cooking or stir until after it comes to a boil. Be sure to keep the liquid at the boiling point to prevent soggy rice, and keep the rice hot until served.

Simple cooking directions for regular milled white rice are often called the "1-2-1" fluff method. Use one cup rice, two cups water and one teaspoon salt. Place in a three-quarter saucepan with a tight-fitting lid. Bring to a boil, stirring once or twice. When the liquid is boiling, cover the pan, lower the heat to simmer, and cook about 14 minutes without removing the lid or stirring.

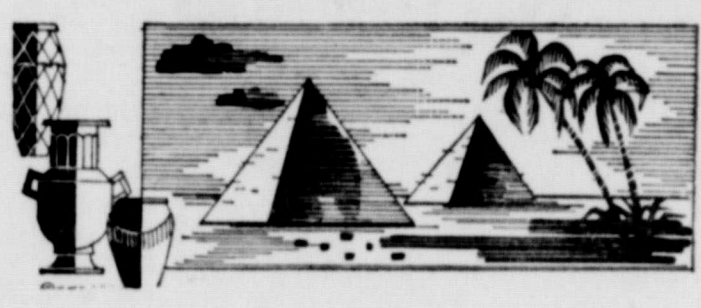

WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C. — There was scheduled but later cancelled, an "International Seminar" to be held in Tanzania on July 15 to the 28 on the matter of sanctions against the governments of Rhodesia and South Africa. The United Nations was a part of the sponsoring authority and was to assist in its financing. The U.S. was to participate and of course to foot a goodly part of the bill.

Just what business it is of the United States to dip its oar into the affairs of South Africa and Rhodesia is not easy to understand.

Speaking for our Government in the United Nations, Ambassador Arthur Goldberg joined in support of the British in calling for sanctions against Rhodesia when the Government of Ian Smith refused to accept joint control with the Africans to govern Rhodesia.

This is not a question of economics, the form of government or its character, but, rather, social. "Apartheid" simply means a separation of the races, and these two countries are the only places in the world it is applied.

South Africa and Rhodesia say that the word means "apart" but equal development of the blacks and whites. Many of those with an intimate knowledge of this area of the world, by firsthand observation, are convinced that there is less discrimination, as the term is ordinarily applied, than in many parts of our own country, but the do-gooders have world sway and are going to reform all those who do not share their view.

While the United States continues to back the British on the Rhodesian embargo, British flagships continue to carry goods to Communist Viet Nam. They are less than they were a few months ago, but the double standard of England is plainly visible in its willingness to trade with Communist countries, but not with Rhodesia. Rhodesia and South Africa are not recipients of America's foreign aid, but we joined in sanctions against them while talking of "building bridges" to trade with Communist nations.

The National Council of Churches says that the battle concerning sanctions against Rhodesia is actually being fought in Washington, and in this they are correct to a considerable degree. Well organized lobbying is bringing pressure to bear in Congress to quiet criticisms for our official support of sanctions

against what they call the illegal regime of Ian Smith. On the other hand, there are influential pressures to encourage Congress to declare null and void the Executive Order approving the United Nations action for selective mandatory trade sanctions.

Many of the same people who want to see the Government of Rhodesia and South Africa overthrown are for treating North Viet Nam as a friendly enemy or either withdrawing from all of Southeast Asia and turn it over to Communist aggression.

While our own men are dying in Viet Nam, while millions are suffering from malnutrition, while uncontrolled population growth breeds misery, frustrations and future aggressions, the United Nations has decided the real danger to the peace of the world is in a Government in Salisbury which no longer accepts instructions from London. But with the kind of irony which is becoming the hallmark of the United Nations, the very nations which so pride themselves on their anti-colonialism are trying to punish Rhodesia for refusing to behave like a colony.

Before we lend our own power to the support of such actions, we would do well to ask whether they might not be a greater threat to the peace than the policies of the Government they are designed to punish.

As was called to the attention of the Department of State and Mr. Goldberg on December 7, 1966, at the time of our approval of the United Nations action against Rhodesia, should we not ask ourselves whether we would be willing to tolerate this kind of intervention in our own internal affairs.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Many Hamilton County cattlemen are taking a beating from the heel fly. The heel fly is damaging from the time they lay their eggs on the cattle and continue through the period when the grubs appear as lumps in the back of the animal. Even though losses are occurring all through the life cycle of the heel fly it is noticed most when the cattle are marketed. Cattlemen take a good dock on grubby cattle. Packers can't pay as much for them because of the damaged hide and the beef must be trimmed due to grub damage.

These losses due to grub damage can be virtually eliminated with timely applications of any one of several recommended systemic insecticides. The insecticides are called systemics because they are distributed inside the body of the animal and kill the grubs before damage is done.

Since only one application is necessary, proper timing is all important. Early applications of systemic insecticides are considerably safer, and are more effective. You can expect good results with proper applications between May 1 and September 1.

Recommended systemics are Co-Ral, Ruelene, Neguvon, and Trolene. Co-Ral and Ruelene may be used as either a pour-on or spray. Neguvon is to be used as a spray, and Trolene is a material which is to be fed to the animals for the May 1-Sept. 1 period.

You are invited to call or stop by the County Agent's office for further information on insecticides, rates of application, or restrictions on the use of these materials.

Several people in the county have been concerned lately because their oak trees are dying. Some people are willing to pay large sums of money to anyone promising to save the trees. In many cases the trees are past the point that they can be saved.

If the light green tissue just under the bark (cambium layer) is dry, the tree is beyond saving. When the tree is declining there are measures that can be taken to save it, but this may involve a lot of plant material and expense. Preventive maintenance from year

to year is of greater value than a crash program to save the declining tree. A regular fertilization program, supplemental watering in times of drought, pruning diseased and dead limbs, and spraying when heavy insect infestation warrant are all part of a good management program.

The root system is one of the parts of the shade tree least understood and the area where many problems arise. The tree root system needs oxygen and house foundations, streets or driveways may cut off the oxygen supply and cause suffocation.

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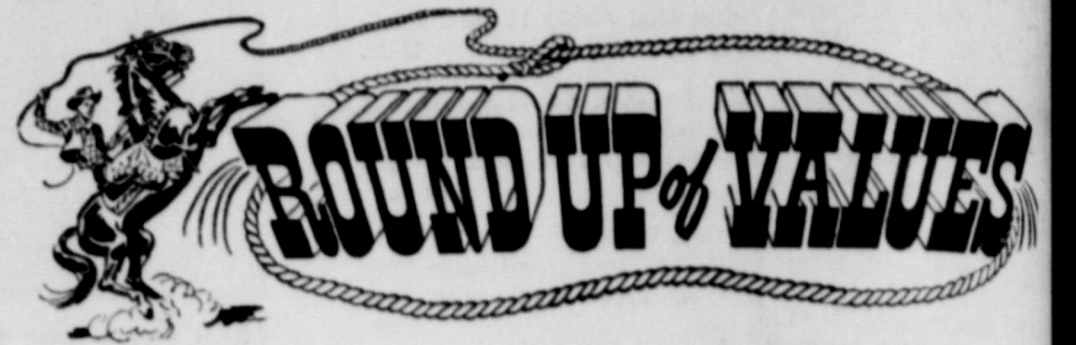
