BLAZE BELIEVED TO HAVE ORIGINATED FROM CAMP FIRE OR CIGARETTE. SMALL HOME IN PATH OF FLAMES DESTROYED. SEVERAL FROM MULESHOE ASSIST IN FIGHTING IT.

Thursday noon fire broke out on the Muleshoe ranch, 12 miles west of Muleshoe and burned its way to the ranch headquarters. The blaze traversed a strip eight miles long, and in places the burned area was a mile wide.

A small home, occupied by Frank Scroggins, which was in the path of the fire, was burned to the ground. Scroggins was absent from home at the time of the fire and his loss is not known.

The prairie fire is believed to have originated from a camp fire built by duck hunters, or from a cigarette thrown into the grass by a careless hunter.

Several automobile loads of men and boys from Muleshoe helped fight the fire.
