## Monday Rites Held For Frank Allen, 81, Hico Area Pioneer

Funeral services for Frank Allen were conducted Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock in First Baptist Church, with Rev. R. E. Tatum officiating.

Mr. Allen passed away at 4:05 a.m. Sunday at Hico City Hospital at the age of 81.

He was born September 8, 1885 in Hamilton County, and was the son of the late A. O. and Maggie Lenoir Allen. A retired farmer, Mr. Allen had lived his entire life in Hamilton County, and had been residing at Hico Nursing Home the past 16 months. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Lydia Allen of Hico; one daughter, Mrs. Margaret Chaney of Clifton; two sons, Frank C. Allen of Fort Worth and James O. Allen of Roscoe; two sisters, Miss Constance Allen of San Antonio and Mrs. Robert W. Brown of Gatesville; a sister-in-law, Mrs. W. S. Allen of San Angelo; four grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Serving as pallbearers were Willard Leach, Frank Griffiths, George Griffiths, Rex Ellis, R. J. Russ II and Armer Mason. Burial was in Hico Cemetery.

## Mrs. Johanson Attends In-Service Conference At Houston Last Week

Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, local homemaking teacher, participated in the State In-Service Education Conference for Homemaking Teachers held at the Shamrock-Hilton Hotel in Houston last week. The meeting theme was "Homemaking Education—Evaluation and Direction."

Conference topics included unique contributions of home economics to vocational education; program evaluation; up-dating curriculum; developing gainful employment programs; provisions for establishing quality programs; and challenges for an effective over-all homemaking education program.

Mrs. Johanson served as a group leader, representing Area IV homemaking teachers, for the Wednesday morning session. During this time the teachers' ideas and suggestions were obtained for an evaluation of the vocational homemaking program. The Vocational Act of 1963 requires an evaluation of vocational programs every five years.

The fourth annual meeting of the association was held Thursday afternoon. Mr. Everett Lindsey, Human Motivation Engineer and Personnel Advisor to Gulf Oil Corp. was principle speaker. He challenged the group with his topic, "Human Motivation."

The week-long meeting was attended by some 1,500 homemaking teachers from throughout the state.

## Local Minister Takes Part in Ohio Revival

Rev. R. E. Tatum, pastor of Hico First Baptist Church, recently returned from a revival in the New Carlisle Baptist Church, one of more than 80 Baptist churches in the greater Dayton, Ohio area participating in a city-wide Evangelistic Crusade.

After intensive efforts to compile a religious census there, several weeks of training and distribution of religious tracts and other literature was held. A week of revival was held in the school stadium, followed by revivals in the churches. The two weeks of services resulted in over 1,100 professions of faith in Christ, and 2,000 re-dedications. Twelve people committed their lives to full Christian service.

This was the first attempt in a Northern city to have a city-wide revival. With its successful completion, others are being planned for many of the large populated cities of the North.

## Water Consumption Exceeds Storage Facilities; Council Asks For Cooperation of Residents

Record water consumption brought on by extremely high temperatures the past few weeks prompted city officials to ask resident's cooperation in conserving water until further notice.

Also prompting the appeal was the broken 8-inch water main in downtown Hico Wednesday morning.

City Water Superintendent W. R. Hampton pointed out that

there wasn't a shortage in the water supply, but merely storage facilities had been over-taxed the past few weeks as the result of most everyone in town watering lawns, shrubs, etc. City employees have worked around the clock pumping water to replenish storage, and the break Tuesday created the need for the appeal.

Mayor W. C. Howard asked

that residents limit outside watering to three days—Monday, Wednesday, and Friday—until further notice, saying that the odd days would give pumping facilities a chance to replenish storage supplies.

The mayor said that compliance with the request would be appreciated by city officials, and that the problem would be eliminated as soon as possible.

## Hico Sailor Aboard Ship That Helped Ill-Fated Carrier

(Editor's Note: The following letter was received recently by Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Solsbery from their son, STG3 Alan Solsbery, who is serving with the U.S. Navy aboard the USS Moore, which assisted in the tragic fire aboard the aircraft carrier Forestal on July 27. The letter is being published

as a matter of interest to local readers).

Dear Mom, Dad and Dinkum:

We had a bad tragedy today. We are operating with the Oriskany, and have been ever since Sasebo (Japan). The carrier Forestal operates right next to us, in the station adjacent, in other words. Any way, as a plane was about to take off the Forestal, one of its fuel tanks dropped off and the heat of the catapult caused the tank to explode, spreading flames all over the back of the carrier. It set other planes on fire almost instantly. Some of the pilots were trapped inside, while many of the deck hands were blown into the sea. We were assigned to follow the carrier while two other "cans" (destroyers) rode along each side spraying it with water. We passed two survivors, but didn't pick them up because a helicopter was there to take them directly to the hospital ship.

There was every kind of debris and junk imaginable in the water. Since the fire didn't damage the steering or engineering part of the ship, it kept at 20 knots into the wind to keep the fire aft. Within two hours from the explosion, the fire was under control, but way into the evening, flames could still be seen on the fantail. You might say it was a major fire.

It happened at 10 a.m. today and at 10 p.m., which is right now, we are still searching for survivors.

## Senator J. P. Word Appointed to Top Probe Committee

Austin (Spl).—Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith this week named Senator J. P. Word of Meridian as a member of the important Senate General Investigating Committee. The committee was created by Senate Resolution 39, adopted during the recent regular session of the 60th Legislature.

The five-member committee is charged with the duty of inquiring into affairs and activities of governmental departments and investigating law violations. The resolution calls for a report by the committee to the 61st Legislature when it convenes in 1969.

Word, whose home is in Bosque County, represents the 12th Senatorial District. He has served in the Senate since 1963, and is currently chairman of the Legislative, Congressional and Judicial Districts Committee. He is also a member of 10 additional standing committees, among them such major bodies as State Affairs, Water and Conservation, and Finance.

Others named to the investigating committee by Lt. Gov. Smith include Senators Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, E. V. (Red) Berry of San Antonio, David Ratliff of Stamford, and Bruce A. Reagan of Corpus Christi.

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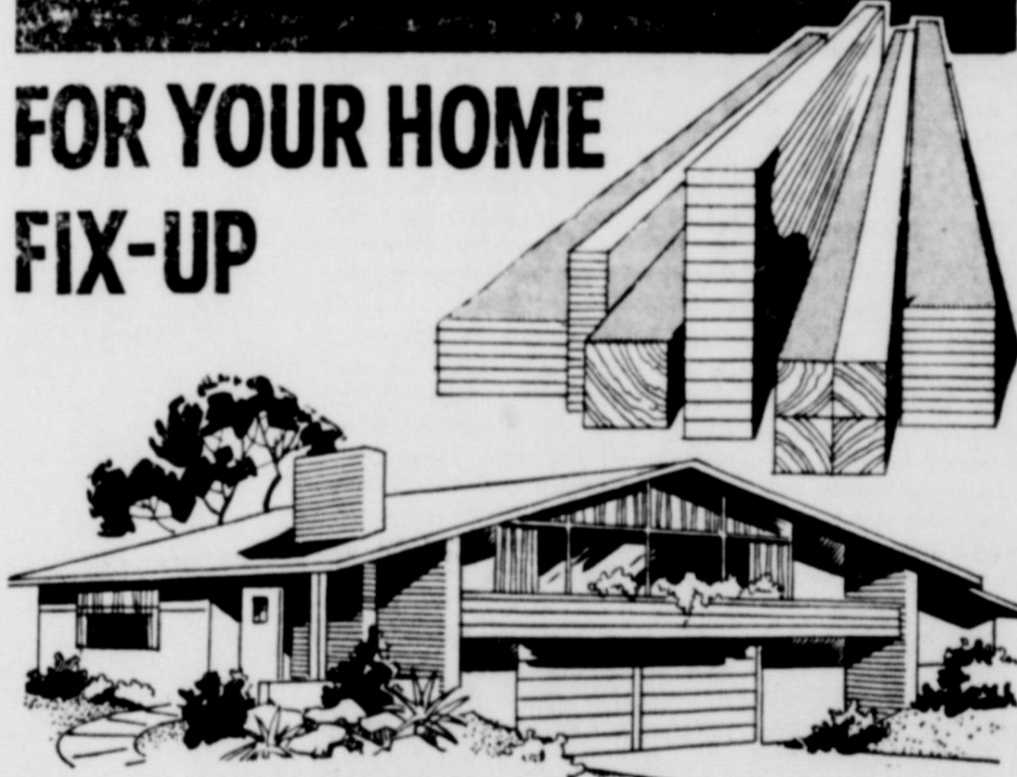

**Fractured 'Filosophy...'**

"AH PSHAW—RATS!"

The nation, and the whole world in general, is faced with problems which seem to big to be solved. The greatest difficulty is the lack of enough Texans involved in national and world affairs. Texans have problems too, but the ingenuity of stout-hearted Texans is due a lot of credit and recognition.

Without ever suggesting anything is done on a modest scale in Texas, this story sums up the strength and purpose of Texans, in coping with those problems that come our way.

A friend of mine had spent several years of frugal diligence in breeding up an outstanding dairy herd. His Jerseys were of such exceptional quality that no other herd came close to producing the superb milk and cream that flowed in vast quantities from his cows. The pride of ownership, and the unequalled production record of these famous cows had spread far. Many were the visitors who came from distant points to get a look at such unusual milk and cream producers. My friend was very happy with his fine herd, and displayed with grand enthusiasm the production ability of his breeding efforts.

It appeared my friend had almost discovered a gold mine. The demand for his high producing cows, and his famous trade name product, "Jersey Juice," had grown to be a substantial business. Everything was going well, when suddenly those cows were dry of milk at the morning milking period. There seemed to be no reasonable explanation, and my friend was frantic. The cows were kept in a loafing pen and shed adjacent to the milking quarters at night. As each rat ran upon the ramp of the weighted door, down he went, into the wire enclosure. It began to look like there would not be room for all the rats inside the big trap, but just as it was full to overflowing, the last rat entered to his doom.

The great number of rats were far too heavy to be lifted by any other means than a hoist, so my friend had to get a wrecker from town to do the job. The wrecker raised up the big load of rats, and drove to the river. There was much wailing and gnashing of teeth as the multitude of rats were dumped into the cold, dark waters.

**On the Home Range**

You can't depend on nature to clean the outdoor living area that should beautify the home. Rain may freshen the greenery, but it takes plain old suds and human effort to clean porch and patio furniture and the accessories. Armed with pails of suds, brushes for scrubbing, and a garden hose, the entire family can turn periodic clean-ups into enjoyment for everyone.

Choose a sunny day, a grassy spot and suitable equipment. Plastic pails are light, but old-fashioned galvanized wash tubs hold more for big jobs. Have a stiff brush for screens, a variety of synthetic sponges, a few two-inch paint brushes for reaching hard to get corners, wiping cloths and plenty of soap.

When sudsing venetian blinds outdoors, wear a pair of oven mits. These will soak and spread suds lavishly on both sides of the slats and also protect hands from rough or sharp edges. Use a well-lathered stiff brush to scrub the tapes and cords.

Use a different method for bamboo blinds. Stretch them full length on the grass, go over each one inch by inch on both sides with a well lathered brush—especially between the slats where dirt tends to lodge. Then hose down, wipe with dry cloths and let the sun complete the drying.

Don't forget the bird bath. Scrub it with a well-lathered brush, hose it down, and refill it with clean water.

Plastic cushions need suds-wiping often to keep summer clothes clean. Cushions with non-removable fabric covers can be given the dry suds treatment. Beat detergent with a little water to make stiff suds. Apply these with a sponge, scrape off soiled suds with a spatula, wipe with water-wrung cloths, and then wipe with dry cloths.

Summer evenings find more and more families taking to the out-of-doors for meal preparation. Thanks to the convenience of aluminum foil, it is now possible to cook the entire meal on the grill. Vegetable favorites wrapped in aluminum foil and placed directly on the

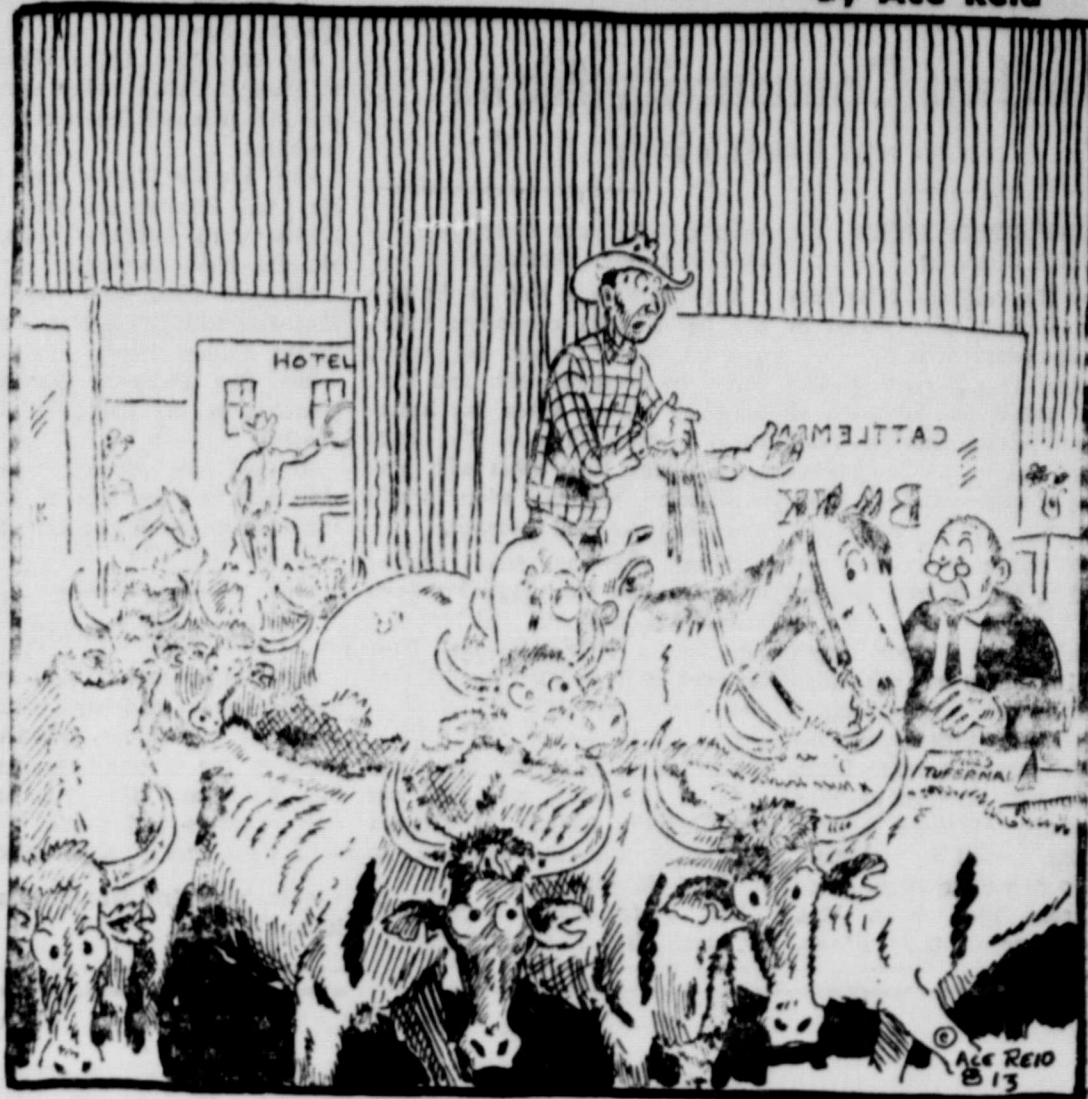

#### Congress Approves Sale Or Lease of Peanut Acreage Within County

Congressman Omar Burleson has advised interested parties that the Agriculture Committee of the House of Representatives has approved unanimously the measure authorizing the lease and sale of peanut acreage allotments under limited conditions. The bill approved is H.R. 11565.

The important details under this legislation are as follows: Any transfer by sale or lease is held within the county.

The Secretary of Agriculture is given authority to place a limitation on the size of the resulting allotments on farms to which such transfers are made, but in no event could the total amount of the allotment transferred to any farm by sale or lease exceed 50 acres. Moreover, if the normal yield to the farm to which an allotment is transferred exceeds the normal yield for the farm from which the allotment is transferred by more than 10 percent, a downward adjustment would be made in the transferred acreage.

Under such conditions the legislation provides that for the 1968 and 1969 crop years the Secretary of Agriculture, if he determines this would not impair the effective operation of the peanut marketing quota and price-support program, may permit the owner and operator of any farm for which an allotment is established to sell or lease all or any part of such allotment to another owner or operator. The owner of such a farm may transfer all or any part of such allotment to any other farm owned or controlled by him.

It is calculated this measure will be brought up in the House of Representatives under suspension of the rules, which simply means it will require a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, and is not subject to amendment.
