Cen-Tex Angora Goat Show and Sale Slated At Goldthwaite

Members of the Central Texas Registered Angora Goat Breeders' Association will have their 11th annual show and sale at the show barns in Goldthwaite Friday and Saturday, August 25 and 26.

Goats will be in their pens by 7:30 a.m. Friday and sifting will get underway at 8 a.m. when 100 bucks and 25 does will be selected for the sale, from about 350 bucks and 100 does.

The top 25 bucks and 10 does will be placed starting at 1 p.m. Friday, from which the champion buck and doe will be selected.

The sale will begin promptly at 1 p.m. on Saturday.

Goats offered for sale have been consigned by 40 Angora breeders. The association has 75 members in seven counties, including Hamilton County.

The Association was organized for the purpose of improving the commercial and registered flocks in the area and for the convenience of those in need of better stud and range bucks and top quality does, according to Dr. T. C. Graves, Goldthwaite, president of the association.

Iredell Sailor Completes Training Aboard Attack Carrier USS Ranger

USS Ranger—(FHTNC)—Airman Apprentice Howard S. Myers, USN, son of Howard F. Myers of Iredell, has returned to the Naval Air Station, Alameda, Calif. following three weeks of refresher training in waters near San Diego, as a crew member aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Ranger.

During training, the 75,000 ton carrier underwent intensive damage control, engineering, flight deck, navigational and departmental drills. General quarters, man-over-board, and nuclear, biological and chemical warfare drills were also included in the training.

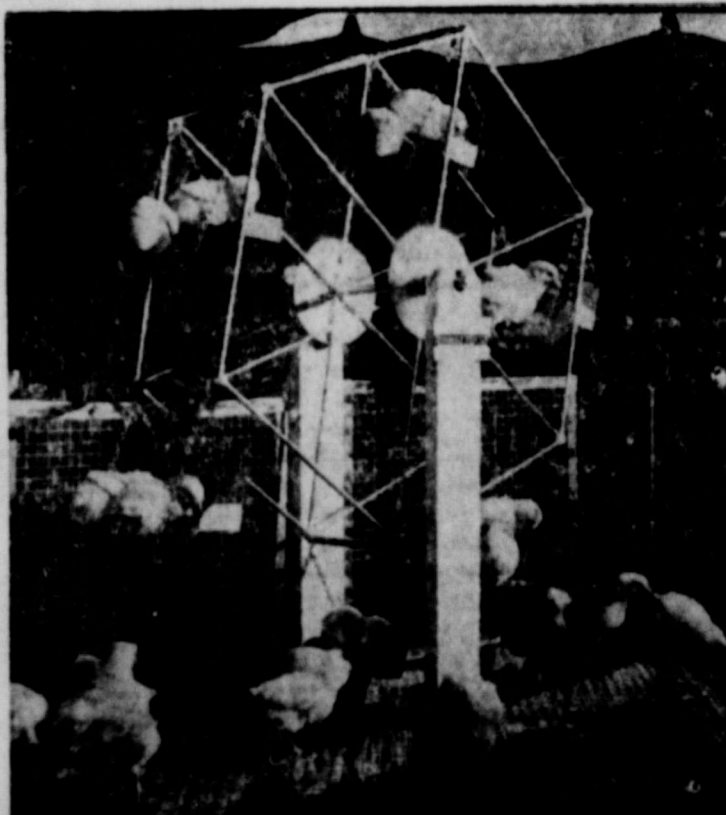
To complete the training period, the Ranger conducted a complicated battle problem simulating wartime conditions.

Upon completion of the training exercises the Ranger was officially labeled "battle ready" and will continue preparations for her next deployment to the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

\$2500 Loss Inflicted by High Winds

An estimated \$2500 damage was inflicted about 2:30 Monday afternoon when a tornado struck at the John Fouts farm near Duffau.

The roof of the new dairy barn recently built was completely torn off, and walls of the building were cracked. An aluminum storage room and its contents were also destroyed in the storm, as well as a metal stock tank used for watering. Damage was also inflicted to another barn on the farm.

No damage was reported to the Fouts home or to any of the equipment in the dairy barn.

The Fouts' oldest son, John Willis, was the only member of the family at home when the tornado struck. He was not injured.

The high winds accompanied more than an inch of rain that fell in the area Monday.

New Traffic Laws Become Effective Monday, Aug. 28

Austin (Spl).—The Department of Public Safety reminded Texans this week that August 28th marks the effective date of several amendments to the drivers license law which are designed to benefit Texas motorists from the standpoint of providing added protection.

The law sets new minimum age limits for acquiring a license, provides for issuing a provisional license to any person under the age of 21, and increases the penalties for driving without a license and violations calling for automatic suspension.

It also sets penalties for counterfeiting or forging a license, or for possessing such a license.

The age limits were raised to a minimum of 16 years for obtaining a license when a person has satisfactorily completed an approved driver education course, and to 18 years for persons who have not had such a course. The previous age was 14 and 16.

The minimum age for operating a five-brake horsepower motor scooter was raised to 15 years. A special examination will be required after January 1 for applicants desiring a license to operate a motorcycle which includes an "off-street phase" and an "on-street" phase. The applicant must provide the motorcycle and a passenger vehicle and licensed driver to convey the License Examiner during the road test.

Licenses issued to persons under 21 years of age will be stamped "Provisional" and may be suspended if the operator is convicted of two traffic law violations in a 12-month period. This becomes effective January 1.

UNDERGOES KNEE SURGERY

H. L. Hill underwent knee surgery last Wednesday at Hico City Hospital. He was permitted to return home Sunday, and is recuperating nicely.

Hico schools are ready to open for the 1967-68 term on Monday, August 28th, at 9 a.m., when a general assembly will be held at that time in the auditorium. Parents, teachers, and others are invited to attend the assembly.

Lunch will be served the first day of school, and the same policy will be in effect concerning lunches as in past years. Students may eat in the lunchroom. Bring their lunch or go to their homes. Prices will remain the same as last year, 30¢ for grades one through five, 35¢ for grades six through 12, and 40¢ for adults. Concerning the lunchroom, Supt. O. C. Cook said "Due to the fact that the lunchroom fund has gone in the red the last two years, and the balance has been greatly depleted, students and adults will be charged three cents for each extra half-pint of milk they drink. Only a half pint of milk will be furnished with the meal. Seconds on food will not be served. There will be only three canteens used instead of four as in the past. The school board felt savings in these three areas would eliminate the need to raise the price of lunches. This will be tried one month."

Pa had went to town yestiddy and got me two pair new socks, an' I had to put on one pair 'fore I went to bed, and not bein' used to wearin' socks, I plum fergot

to take 'em off." With an elaborate show of pride, he pulled up both pant's legs to permit me the thrill of seeing such plamorous socks. "See, ain't they purty. I got 'nother pair just like these at home thar I ain't never wore yet. One is yellor, an' 'tother is purple."

When Oscar is talking, all one has to do is listen, and Oscar was talking this morning. He started again, "You know sumpin', ole Rebecca died a coupla days back. That is, me and Pa thot she wuz ded. Ye know who Rebecca is, she's that ole muley cok uv our'n. Wal, as I wuz sayin', she pretnear died. Pa had left some uv the soured mash at his moonshine still whar that old cow cud get to it, and she et 'bout five gallon, and me an' Pa shore thot she wuz 'a goner. COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

It is time for county farmers to start thinking about small grain crops. Variety is of course a big consideration when planning a small grain crop and it may be difficult to find some small grain seed this year, particularly seed oats of the better variety.

Ora is the oat variety primarily recommended for this area. Alamo-X, Taggart, New Nortex, and Moregran are also adapted but are susceptible to the prevalent races of rust.

The hard winter wheat varieties recommended for this area are Sturay is a newly developed wheat Sturdy is a newly developed wheat with high quality, production, cold tolerance, disease resistance, and standability but should be grown primarily on heavy river bottom soil or under irrigation, as the short stem would make it difficult to combine under normal upland conditions. The other varieties mentioned are familiar to area farmers as they have been used for several years.

Barley varieties recommended for this area are Cordova, Rogers, and Zora. I understand that seed barley is also likely to be hard to find this year due to the drouth last year.

For the farmer or rancher primarily interested in small grain for winter pasture, rye might be the answer. Elbon, Gator, Explorer and Bonel are excellent winter forage ryes for this area.

Dove season is just around the corner, and according to a recent recreational survey completed by the Agricultural Agencies in the county and interested persons, this is the number one possibility of bringing in additional revenue to area farmers, ranchers, and local businesses. With the large metropolitan areas within an easy drive of Hamilton County, we are in a good position to attract plenty of hunters.

Last year's dove census taken by the Parks and Wildlife biologists indicated that Hamilton County had the highest dove population in the state, and the county consistently has a good dove crop.

Don Hall, Hamilton Chamber of Commerce manager has information on leasing and is presently taking the names of persons wishing to lease for doves. He plans to keep a list in his office and will refer hunters to persons on the list. The landowner and hunters will reach an agreement on the lease themselves.

With drouth conditions persisting over the county, farmers and

ranchers are faced with more decisions. Primary considerations are whether to cull the herd and conserve pasture or whether to feed until the drouth breaks. If things don't pick up soon many will have to do both to insure pasture for the winter and early spring.

If pastures are beginning to look overgrazed, it certainly is time to think about the future. Good pastures can be severely damaged by continued heavy grazing in times of severe stress.

First it might be wise to take a critical look at your livestock. All unnecessary horses, steers, goats and cows should be culled. This would include cows that have missed calf crops and other border line producers.

For those cattle left after culling, they will be faced with a vita-

min A deficiency. Green rough such as grass or weeds, or alfalfa or half pound of leaf meal per day will provide needed vitamin A.

In areas which still have forage, the rancher should use a careful system of deferred grazing and encourage more uniform use by placing salt away from water in areas not usually grazed. Herding and random distribution of supplemental feed will aid in spreading animals over range.

Stockmen should take into consideration the condition of lands at this time, the cost of feed to sustain the herd and the expected rate of return if the drought continues and make the decision on culling and maintaining the normal breeding herd.

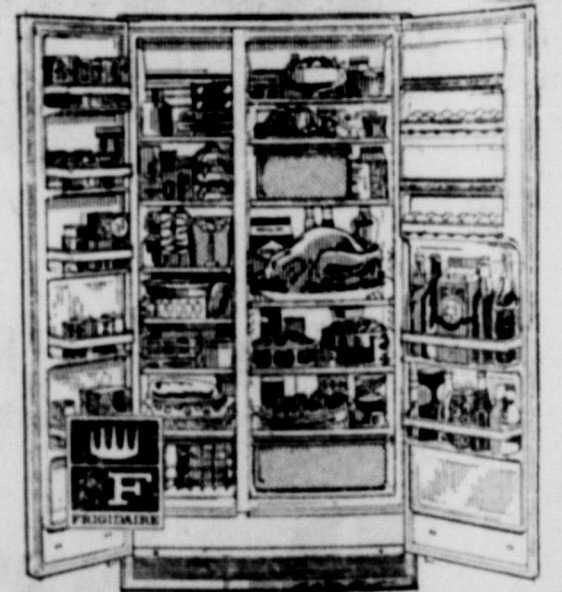

On the Home Range

By SONDRA CRAIG Home Demonstration Agent

Spark up the flavor of a macaroni and cheese dish with a dash of dry mustard or Worcestershire sauce in the cheese sauce.

There are two chemical types of bleaches for home use. Chlorine bleaches are available as liquids and powders. Oxygen bleaches come in powder form.

Chlorine bleaches shouldn't be used on fabrics containing silk, wool, or spandex fibers, or on fabrics with a chlorine-retentive resin finish. Fabrics with these finishes are usually marked "Do Not Use Chlorine Bleach" on the label. The chlorine bleach could yellow rather than bleach these fabrics, and could cause serious fabric damage.

Liquid bleaches are fast acting and should be mixed thoroughly with the wash water before clothes are added. Never use more than one tablespoon of liquid chlorine bleach to one gallon of water. Never add bleach to rinse water. Dry chlorine bleach is slower in action than liquid bleach. It doesn't need to be mixed with water before adding to the washing solution.

The whitening effect of fluorescent whiteners present in laundry

detergents is reduced by chlorine bleaches. To get maximum effectiveness from both whitener and bleach, agitate the clothes with the detergent solution for about four minutes before adding the bleach.

Oxygen bleaches are safe for all fibers, natural and man-made, and for resin-finish cottons. There are less likely to cause damage to fabric if improperly used than are chlorine bleaches.

Leather belts are back on the fashion-go-round for fall, riding high, low—and even at the waist. Chief among leather textures are smooth, grained, waxy, harness and suede leathers. Widths vary from the skinniest strip to a fanciful five inches.

Grained, waxy or split cowhide

styles accessorize a casual costume. The belts are brass-buckled or brightened with coins, studs and even over-sized zippers, running sideways around the waist. Also featured is the cyclist's friend—a leather-and-chain affair with leather mini-purse clipped on.

For business wear smooth leather, suede or "hair-on" calf leather belts. The latter is stenciled as leopard, tiger or zebra. These dress belts may sport nail-heads, leather-covered or gold buckles, bows—or even a watch that actually runs.

New hip-clinging belts accessorize perfectly with this season's popular long-torso line. These hip-pies come in narrow or wider styles, decoratively buckled, alternating leather ovals or squares with stripping and chain. Hip belts feature leather in the smooth, waxy and suede textures.

For after five, a leather cummerbund may be worn between waist and bosom. Or leather sash belts, buckled or bowed, give a feminine look.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for a referendum thereon.

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make and in such amount as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such lands to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of said Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, at such prices and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

irement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

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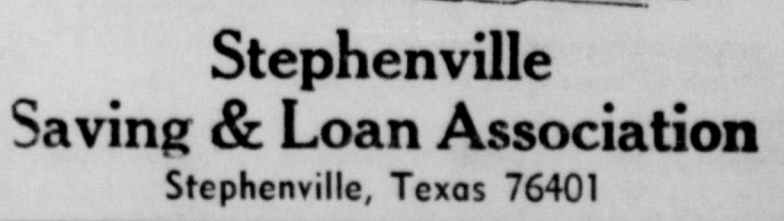
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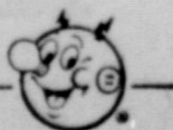
