May, the minister called an unusual news conference to announce his illness. His wife, Glenna, and one of their daughters, Sharon, 15, stood at his side—but there were no tears from him or his family.

"I really don't mind dying," Holladay said. "I've faced it before. I went through the momentary experience of dying. It's rather a peaceful thing; a pleasant thing."

He recalled that as a youth he was near death when he inhaled a lungful of gasoline while siphoning fuel from a tractor on a farm in Texas.

"And, of course, I faced it daily in rather a hard way as an Air Force Chaplain in Korea," the minister added.

The minister, who also had a married daughter, said only two things bothered him about dying:

"One is the pain. I never enjoyed physical pain. The other is my family. That is the tough one."

Robert Jacksons Are Hospitalized After Saturday Accident

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Jackson returned home Monday after being confined two days in Glen Rose Hospital following a two-car accident north of there early Saturday morning.

Neither were seriously injured, with both receiving bruises, and Mrs. Jackson a chest injury.

The accident occurred 1.8 miles north of Highway 67 on the Granbury road. The Jacksons were enroute to Fort Worth and their automobile was struck on the left hand side by a pickup entering the highway from a side road.

Officials placed damage to the Jackson automobile at \$400.

Hico lifts the lid on the 1967 football season Friday night at Tiger Stadium, and the opening foe is a formidable one—the Glen Rose Tigers.

Most everyone knows about the Glen Rose team, member of the tough Class A district composed of Clifton, Valley Mills, Meridian, Whitney and Itasca. Last year the Tigers forgot to read about how great perennial power Clifton was supposed to be, and waltzed through the district campaign undefeated to claim the title and advance to the state play-offs. And rumblings coming from the Somervell camp are that the Tigers are expected to be about as tough as they were last year, returning a host of lettermen including 15 regulars from the offensive and defensive units.

On the other hand, Hico will field an all-lettermen eleven in the opened, with new faces in some new positions expected to create the usual first-night jitters. For example, a guard has been shifted to the backfield, along with an end.

New Coach Charles Coan and assistant Jimmie Ramage are highly optimistic over this year's squad, and expect to get a lot of miles from the 16 lettermen available.

The coaches indicated at mid-week that they probably would start an offensive unit composed of Roger Meek, 145, and Wayne Wells,

145 at the guard slots; Brad Braune 177 and Carl Lamb, 173 at tackles; Mike Reeves, 173 and Jim Wolfe, 145 at the end posts; and Steve Jones, 151, at center.

In the backfield, Joe Tooley, 165, will handle the quarterback chores, being backed up by Howard Strader, 150, Dennis Polk, 165, and Mike Christian, the lightweight of the starters at 131 pounds. Christian is the converted guard, and Polk the end.

Strong support should come from Dennis Solsbery, a newcomer to the squad, Wayne Ross, and Bobby Ramey, a lightweight who likes to hit. Rusty Cryer, big sophomore, isn't expected to see much action in the early season as a result of a broken leg earlier in the summer.

Kickoff is slated for 8 p.m., and a large crowd is expected for the opener.

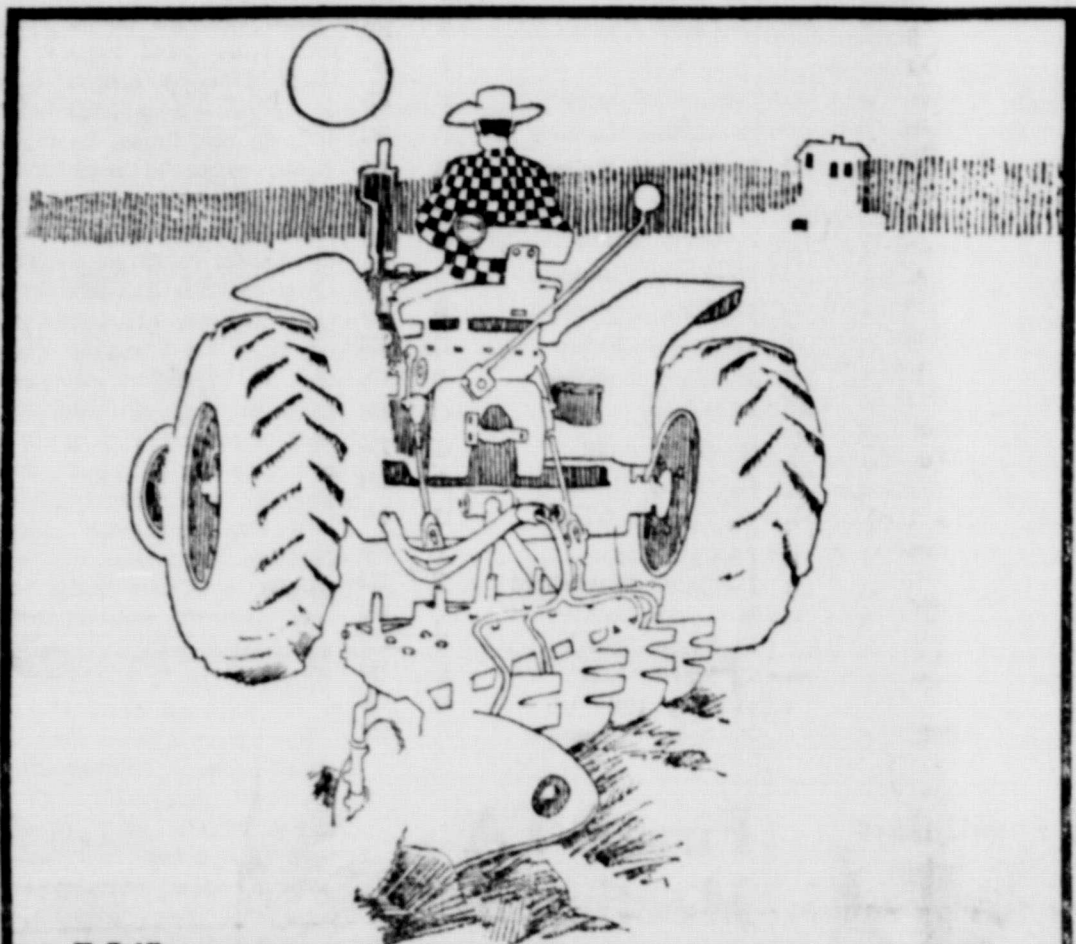

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

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WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—On February 23, 1966, the subject of this column was Lobbying and Lobbyists.

In the minds of many, the organized lobby has a mysterious and clandestine meaning.

As a matter of fact, lobbying activity has a long history. It actually started in George Washington's administration on the Tariff issue. It reached unsavory heights in the decades from the Civil War to the turn of the century.

Lobbying activity in Washington today seems tame as compared with the record back in the 1870's when Jay Gould offered members of Congress \$1,000 in cash and \$5,000 to \$10,000 in bonds after a bill was passed to approve a railroad route across the Continent.

Webster defines lobbying as "The effort to influence the proceedings in Congress." If this definition is left without qualification, everyone who writes a letter to his or her Congressman in behalf of legislation might be classed as a Lobbyist.

There is hardly an organization of any size, whether business, professional or otherwise, which does not have a "representative" in Washington. He is here to watch bills to determine how they affect their particular interest. Many lobbyists are never seen personally. When legislation is introduced affecting a certain group, their representative in Washington interprets the effect and writes the membership back home, requesting that they, in turn write their Congressman. These organizations are often referred to as "pressure groups." This is really basic to our system, and since every individual cannot come to Washington and since the Government is so deeply involved in so many people's business, it becomes necessary as a matter of defense that they belong to one of these groups and have someone in Washington to look after their interest.

Even ministers have lobbies in Washington. Educational institutions and churches, foundations, the Indians, hundreds of big corporations, farmers, veterans, labor unions, and just about everything and everybody has lobbyists in Washington.

From time to time the newspapers have played up the evils of lobbying when something comes to light having the appearance of wrong-doing. In the minds of some there is a suspicion of both lobbyists and the politicians. This hunting ground for sensation is often fertile. The evils of lobbying come from the evil that is in a few unscrupulous people. It takes a com-

bination of the unscrupulous lobbyist and the unscrupulous official to produce evil. The evil is not inherent in lobbying as such.

As a matter of fact, it can and does serve a useful purpose for a Member of Congress. Thus far, in the current session, more than 12,000 bills have been introduced in the House of Representatives. Another 2,000 have been introduced in the Senate. Some of these bills are identical. There still remain enough to make it physically impossible for every member of Congress to be fully familiar with the contents of each measure.

So, lobbyists perform a useful function in bringing to the attention of members the attitude of the citizens they represent. Their numbers and interests are as varied as the segments of our society. The lobbyists are representatives of a particular interest, specialized and able to present arguments for or against a particular measure, from their viewpoint. Then, it is up to the Member of Congress to exercise judgment in whether he consider the arguments persuasive or not. The idea that lobbyists of special interest groups offer things of value as an incentive is undoubtedly overdrawn in the mind of the mind of the general public. Not knowing the attitude of every member and every lobbyist, one could not say it does not happen. On the other hand, veteran observers feel that when it does, it is rare indeed.

Lobbyists are required under the law to register and to file financial statements of expenditures with details of the wheres, whens, and what-fors included.

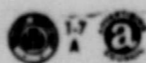

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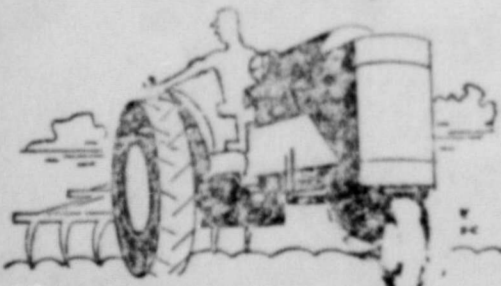

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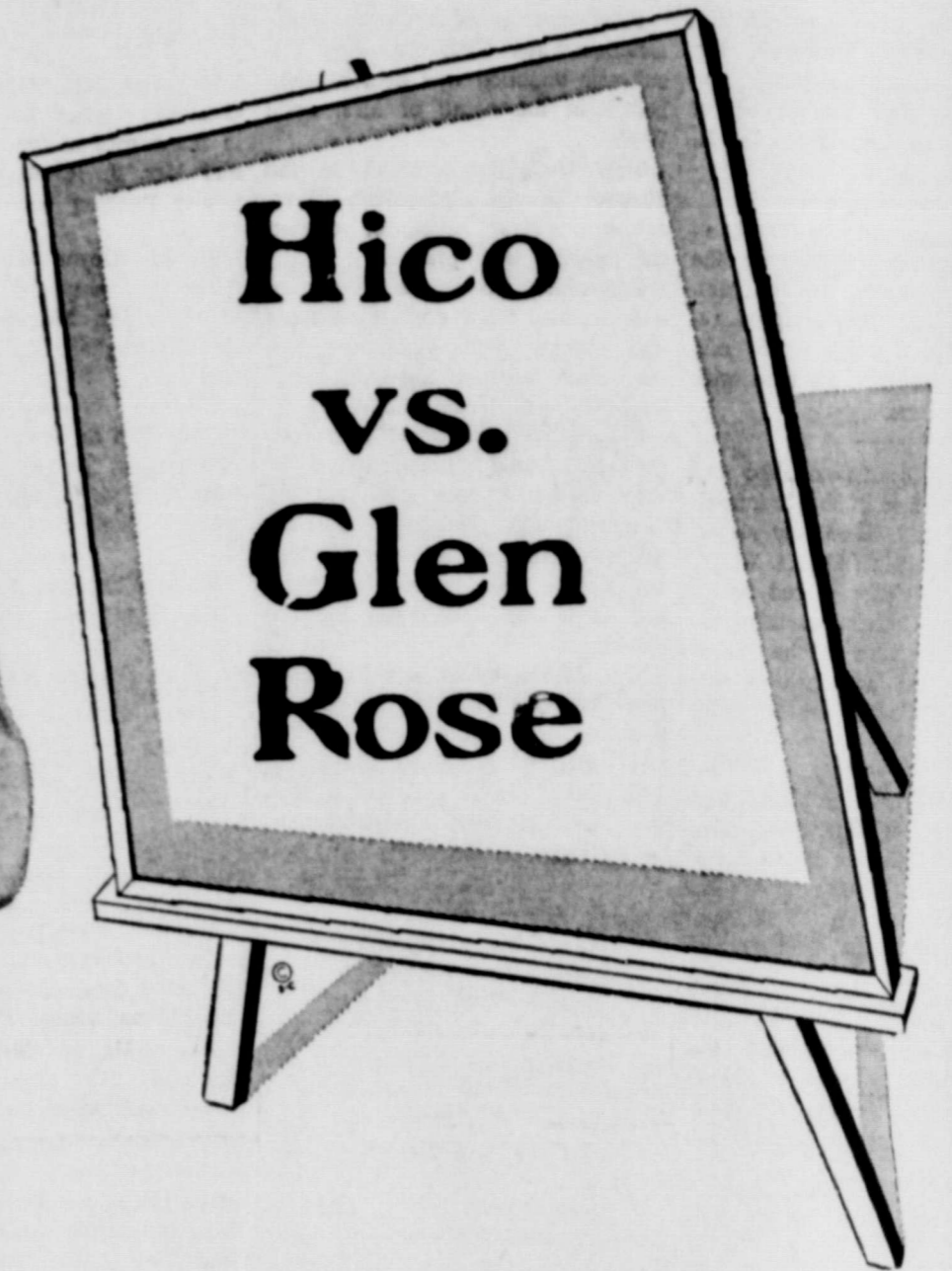
