## Telco Assumes TV Cable Franchise

City Council members, in regular session Monday, passed a motion authorizing the assumption of a franchise owned by Fort Worth Co., Inc., by Telco, Inc. The franchise is for the right to cable television service into the district manager from Hamilton Moore of Fort Worth.

Moore of Fort Worth, Telco, Inc. is a solely-owned subsidiary of Gulf States-United Telephone Company.

Officials from the company, Rolland Johnson, president and general manager from Tyler, and Tom Veal, district manager from Hamilton Moore with city officials.

The action by Telco will be to survey the town for prospective subscribers. If this proves satisfactory, then construction will begin with a minimum completion of approximately 10 months. Telco plans to do is offer

## Lamar Johanson Completes Work For Doctorate Degree

Lamar Johanson of Hico recently completed all requirements for the Doctor of Philosophy Degree in Plant Physiology from Texas A&M University. He has accepted a position as Associate Professor of Biological Science at Tarleton State College in Stephenville, effective September 1.

Dr. Johanson was one of 1,070 scientists who presented papers at the 18th Annual American Institute of Biological Sciences, meeting at Texas A&M Aug. 27-Sept. 1. His paper was entitled "Calcium and Sodium Absorption and Accumulation in Excised Cotton Roots."

Dr. Johanson was graduated from Cherokee High School and received both the Bachelor of Science and Master of Arts Degrees in Biology from Southwest Texas State College, San Marcos.

He served in the U.S. Air Force, and was separated from the service as a First Lieutenant. He presently holds the rank of Captain in the USAF Reserves.

Prior to entering graduate school at A&M, Dr. Johanson taught biology at Tarleton State.

He resides in Hico with his wife, Marilyn Johanson, homemaking teacher at Hico High School.

## Glen Rose Downs Tigers In Season Football Opener

Hico and Glen Rose hooked up in a battle of the Tigers in the season grid opener for both teams last Friday night in Hico Stadium before a near capacity audience.

And the crowd received full value for their dollar, as the two teams put on an exciting game, though one-sided, as the visitors took home a 41-14 decision.

Glen Rose jumped into a 7-0 lead, and scored on their first three possessions to take a 21-8 lead at the first quarter mark. Hico's scooter, Howard Srader, put the Tigers ahead early in the game by taking the kickoff after the visitor's first TD and scampering 87 yards for the score. A pass, Joe Tooley to Mike Reeves, posted the short-lived lead.

The visitors scored twice more in the second quarter to take a 33-14 lead to the dressing room at halftime. A touchdown early in the third period ended scoring for the night.

Glen Rose used but six plays in a 50-yard march for their first corner. Mike Christian, pint-sized halfback for Hico, was lost for six or more weeks when he received a broken arm making a tackle on the drive.

Glen Rose scored their final points by taking the second-half kickoff and going 80 yards.

Despite the loss, there were several bright spots for the Tigers. The running of Howard Srader wasn't necessarily unexpected, as he had a fine season last year. Defensively, Brad Braune and Carl Lamb, along with freshman Eugene Lindsey, stood out. Another freshman, David Ashby, showed promise, along with Tooley at quarterback, and Roger Meek in the line.

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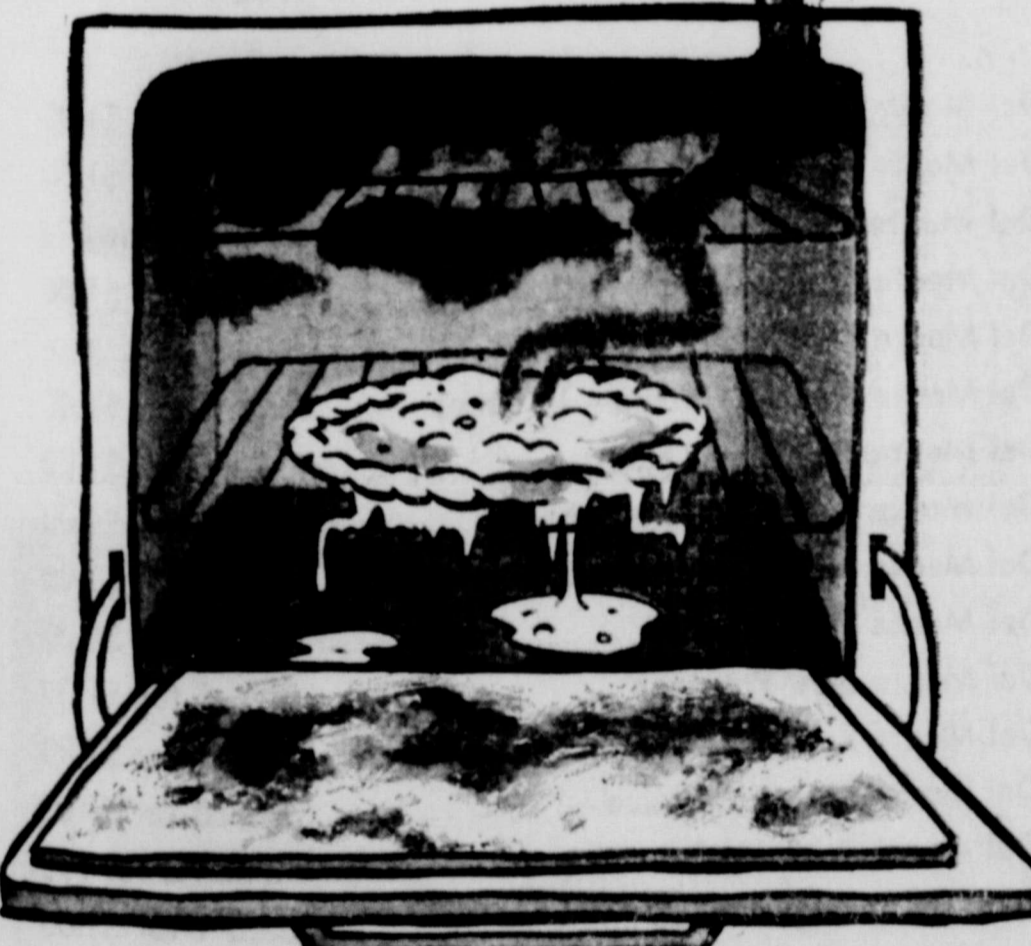
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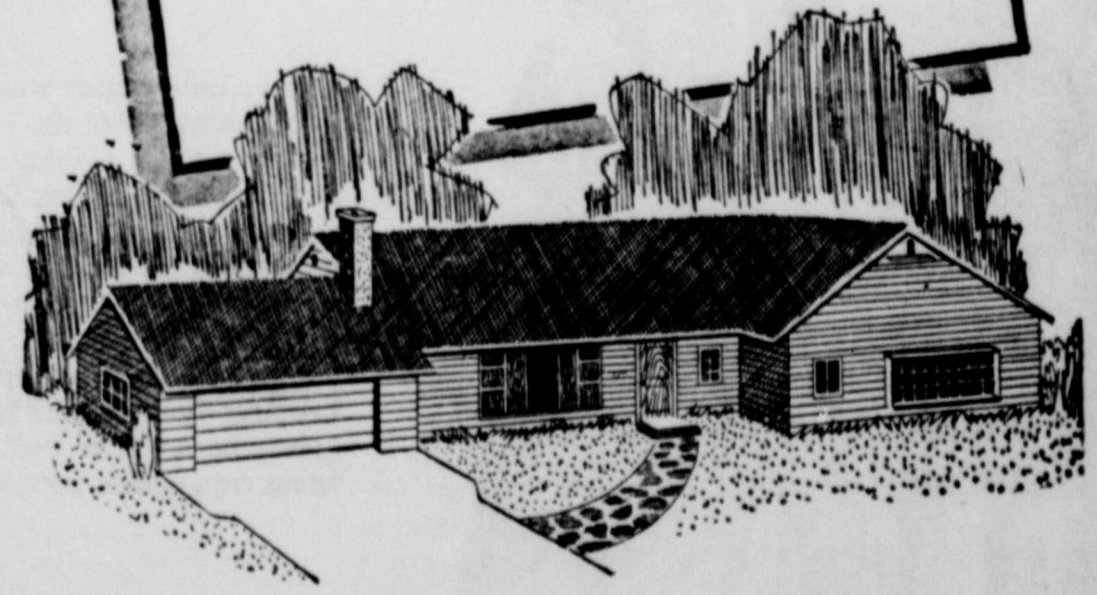

# As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—Because of Labor Day, most members of Congress visited their constituents this past week.

Many of them probably heard that the American people are dissatisfied today about many of the things the Government is doing or failing to do.

What are the people saying? What do they want?

If our area is representative, people are tired of the state of fear and uneasiness which has enveloped them. Extremists in our midst, both whites and negroes, have resorted to a process of intimidation and blackmail commonly called "protests" and "demonstrations."

People want the agencies of government, particularly the courts, to recognize the difference between "freedom of speech" and incitement to riot. Especially do they want to see more courage shown in high places in dealing with disorders.

Living conditions should be improved, but people do not believe that criminals and disturbers of the peace should go unpunished, nor that these circumstances be the sole excuse for lawlessness.

People are tired of reading what the Stokly Carmichaels and the Rap Browns say in rallies as they openly preach rebellion. They want to see such persons prosecuted. If existing laws are inadequate, they want Congress to strengthen the statutes. Most of all, they want to see law enforced.

It is hoped that members of Congress get the message that people are tired of political legerdemain. A lot, it not all, are fed up with attempts to curry favor with groups by the use of taxpayers' money. People have the right to know why Congress has not exercised a closer check on all government spending. They are tired of seeing big deficits pile up year after year and to be told that deficit spending can go on indefinitely

ly and that confidence in the future of the dollar can still be preserved.

Public officials in Washington should be getting the message that people are tired of the handling of the Viet Nam war. They want to know, and rightfully so, why our military men are not given a free hand to do that necessary to get it over. Many have the feeling that we are playing "chicken," which involves the lives of American boys. They want to know why we do not bomb every enemy base and supply line, as well as blockade the ports of North Viet Nam.

People are tired of reading that their money has been used to make loans to some governments to help them buy arms and then lining up in the United Nations against us.

People have the right to complain of being told that big deficits are due solely to the Viet Nam war. They are tired of being told that the country can afford to spend unprecedented billions on doubtful programs.

People are not happy with the prospect of having their taxes and mail rates increased when they feel that Washington is not spending their tax money wisely.

There is reason to complain about the increase in the cost of living while strikes and threats of strikes continues.

People want a peaceful society, a decent society—a society in which a fair deal for everybody transcends political deals in the use of governmental power at the federal, state and local levels.

Maybe official Washington has gotten the word that "you can fool all the people some of the time and some of the people all the time, but you cannot fool all the people all the time." To sum up, our people want courage, integrity and a conscience that overrides the temptations of pure old politics.

## On the Home Range

Representatives from Hamilton County will join 1,000 other Texas homemakers Sept. 19-20 for the 41st annual convention of the Texas Home Demonstration Association in Fort Worth.

Attending the state meeting will be Mrs. George Harris of Blue Ridge Club, Mrs. R. L. Stagg, Littleville Club, and Mrs. Fred Hyles from South Hico Club.

Walter Richter, director, Southwest Region Office of Economic Opportunity, will keynote the conference on Tuesday, telling of "The Significance of the Other War." Mrs. Florence W. Low, assistance director for home economics, Texas A&M University, will introduce the executive officer.

Welcome notes will come from L. F. Peterson of Fort Worth, member of the Texas A&M board of directors, and Mrs. J. E. Waggoner, THDA Chairman, Tarrant County.

Other talk and topics include Mrs. Wilmer Smith of Wilson, president of the National Extension Homemaker's Council, speaking on "The Home a World of Concern," and Dr. Alice Wonders, chairman, Division of Philosophy and Religion, Texas Wesleyan College, telling of "Family Portraits from the Middle East."

Dr. Carl S. Winters, Guest Lecturer for General Motors, will close the conference, speaking on "Today's Youth and Tomorrow's World" at a Wednesday evening banquet.

The two-day session will feature training workshops on 4-H, family life, safety, citizenship, health and recreation. Recommendations from these meetings will be taken back to the counties by those attending the state convention and carried out by the approximately 36,000 THDA members over the state.

Examples of proposed recommendations include home demonstration club members assuming citizenship responsibilities through study of new state legislation, clubs studying the services for the mentally retarded, clubs encouraging and supporting community and state agencies whose programs assist families, and clubs emphasizing driver education for youth and improved traffic safety legislation to legislators.

In citing the accomplishments of the THDA, Mrs. Low pointed out that "during 1966, the 36,000 members in 1,709 clubs provided help

in the development of home skills to 265,395 homemakers enrolled in clubs—an average about eight assistances per member.

Mrs. Low also emphasized 74 outstanding 4-H club girls who received THDA scholarships in the past 41 years.

"These recipients now serve leadership capacities throughout the state," Mrs. Low stated, "a tribute to the leadership of this organization."

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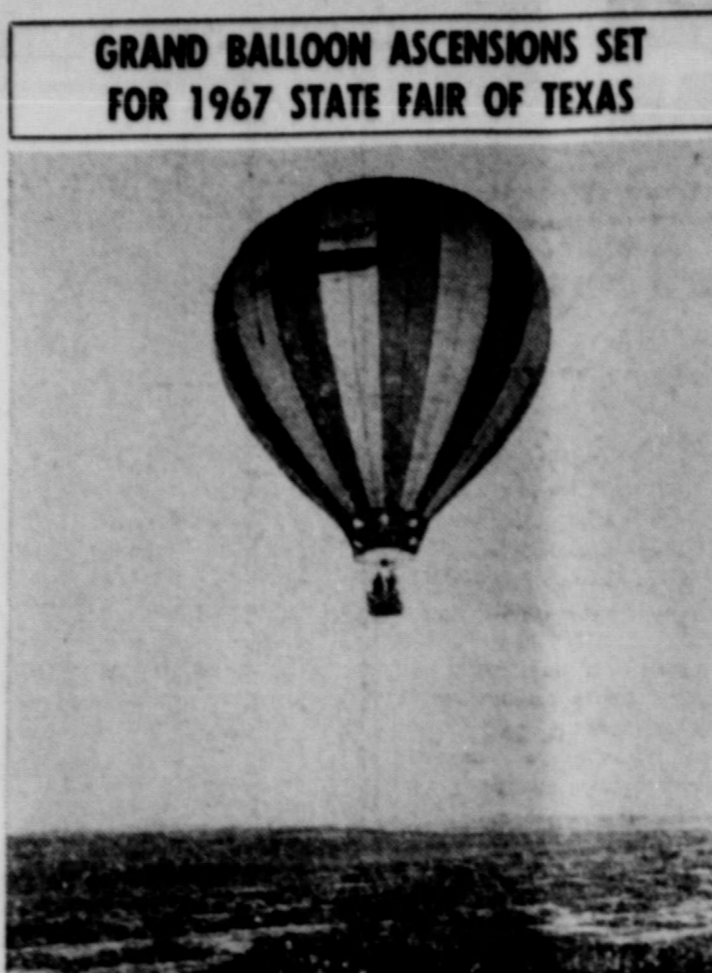
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## GRAND BALLOON ASCENSIONS SET FOR 1967 STATE FAIR OF TEXAS

**"To the Newlyweds**  
Dear Sharon and Bobby:

I assure you, all shall take a new promise. God has closed the curtain on the last chapter of this day, the soft shroud of night covers all mistakes and blunders, wherein we have erred, and tomorrow's dawn is the gift of a new chapter, a new hope, a new challenge, and a new road to travel. Were we not given a renewed beginning each new morn, the road indeed would become intolerable. Love each other, share the rough bumps, give as well as take, and learn to laugh together.

You have my sincere wishes for a long, and joyous life. May your fulfillment be complete in marriage, and may God be the center of your home.
