Property renditions in Hamilton County hit an all-time high this year, with \$12,168,830.00 on the rolls, just completed this week.

Mrs. Pearl Williams, county taxassessor-collector, said Tuesday that statements would be mailed property owners next week. Mrs. Williams also said that she would be making her annual visits to Hico and Carlton later in the month, and would announce the date and time later.

Based on 100 percent collection, Hamilton County will derive \$97,-350.64 from taxes this year.

Mrs. Williams reminded residents of the voter registration law, whereby all people must file for voting privileges. The last session of the State Legislature made the persons 60 years of age and older were not required to register or pay poll tax.

I have received calls from many homeowners who have been concerned about the black spoty looking material on their lawns. This is a fungi known as slime mold and covers grass with a dusty, bluish-gray. black or yellow mass. Slime molds are not parasitic on grass, but they are unsightly. They feed on dead organic material. The most damage they do to grass is to shade and discolor the blades. Slime molds occur during wet weather, and disappear rapidly as it becomes dry. The large masses can be broken up with a broom or by spraying with a strong stream of water. During prolonged damp weather, slime molds can be especially annoying and it may be desirable to apply any good garden or turf fungicide to affected areas.
