In my farming effort, I had completely worn the harness out for my in the barn, and these were the nearest thing I had, or could get, with which to make harness. With great deal of sweat and effort. finally came out with some pretty good raw-hide harness. I was quite proud of my accomplishment, and the rawhide did serve satisfactorily

The one instance I experienced where rawhide is not the best material to have your harness made of happened one summer day while I was hauling wood. I drove to the woods about a mile from where we lived, and began cutting and loading the wagon with wood for cooking fuel. I had just completed my load, when one of those sudden summer showers came up, and the rain poured for more than 30 minutes. I sought shelter under a tree, and when the shower passed I came out dry, and hesitated to climb up on the load of rain-soaked wood, so I decided to walk along and drive the mules from the ground. I undid the reins, spoke to the mules, and we were off toward the house. The mules strained at their load like it was rather heavy. but this was to be expected as the wood was wet, and the ground was very muddy. We reached the house, and when I glanced back, can you imagine, there was no wagon in sight! The rawhide traces were stretched tightly, as though they were holding a big load, but where was the wagon? I tied the mules to a tree, and scratched my head in wonder. I knew rawhide would stretch like rubber when it was wet, but I never dreamed of anything like this.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Those missing the Beef Cattle Short Course Sept. 25-27 missed some informative and interesting meetings, good refreshments, and some stimulating discussions. Attendance was good with an everage of about 45.

A Soil and Water Conservation Supervisor Election will be held October 12 at 7:30 p.m. in the Baptist Church at Fairy. The purpose is to elect a supervisor in Subdivision No. 4 of the Hamilton-Coryell SCD. This subdivision includes all of the northern corner of the county, including Hico, Carlton and Fairy areas. Carl King is presently the supervisor for this area and has served in this capacity for several years.

The program will not be all business. An interesting film will be shown and refreshments served.

Anyone over 21 years of age owning land in this area and residing in Hamilton County is eligible to vote. This includes both man and wife. We hope that the wives will accompany their husbands to the meeting and election.

The size of next year's small grain crop may well depend upon the kind and amount of fertilizer used at planting time.

Currently soil moisture is much better in the county and proper fertilization of small grains can play an important part in turning this moisture into forage and grain. If the grain is to be grazed fertilization at planting time is especially important.

For maximum production, use a soil test to determine fertilizer needs and fertilize at planting time, including some nitrogen especially if the crop is to be grazed. In the absence of a soil test, consider 15-30-0 at planting time and 30-0-0 as a topdressing in February or early March if moisture is avail-

If you have small grains up presently I would suggest checking it frequently for the presence of Fall Armyworm. I have received num-
