Riesel, showing their strength in early season games, has compiled a 5-0 record, and the team is rated No. 1 in class B for the Central Texas area.

Hico Victorious in Friday Grid Battle With Lometa

Hico's Tigers, their backs to the wall on many different occasions, always arose to the challenge, holding a fired-up Lometa eleven scoreless while at the same time crossing the visitor's goal once to build a 6-0 win over the Hornets in the annual Homecoming game played here last Friday night. The visitors tested the mettle of the locals on numerous occasions, but always met with the same results—"take what yardage you want between the 20's, but get closer and you're mine," the Tigers appeared to be saying all night. And the statistics bears this out as Lometa took liberties with the Tiger defense for a total of 257 yards on the ground, all outside the 10 yard line except on one excursion when the visitors failed to make good on a field goal attempt from the Tiger nine early in the first quarter. The Tigers, on the other hand, rolled to a net 155 yards aground, but counted where it counted the most—on the scoreboard. A real good effort by the defensive team when the visitors got down close netted the victory. It can be further pointed out by the 16 to 5 margin in first downs by the visitors. However, they couldn't pass a lick as they saw three attempts go for naught, all late in the game. Tiger quarterback Joe Tooley completed four of nine attempts for 36 yards, and had one intercepted. Another perfect strike to Jim Wolfe for an apparent touchdown was nullified for an ineligible receiver down field. Funny part about the call was that the flag was thrown at Tiger end Bobby Ramey who was wearing a line-man's numeral. Bouquets must go to tackle Carl Lamb for his one-man stand late in the game. Brother of Hico Man Dies at Merkel After Critical Illness

Oscar J. Adcock, 87, longtime Merkel resident, early day postmaster, and longtime elder in the Church of Christ, died at 5 a.m. Oct. 3 following a critical illness of several weeks. He was a brother of Ellis Adcock of Hico. Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday in Merkel Church of Christ, with the minister, Billy Patton officiating. Burial was at Merkel also. Born Feb. 25, 1880 in Navarro County, he lived in Hill and McLennan counties before moving to Coryell County in 1884. A graduate of Belton Academy, he taught country school in Bell County before moving to Taylor County in 1905. In 1907 he began delivering mail on a rural route out of Merkel and in 1926 he became a postal clerk and later postmaster. He retired in 1936, and five months later he was recalled to duty as a money order clerk and served until 1946. Mr. Adcock served as chairman of the Merkel School board from 1926 until 1936. Although he never claimed to be a preacher, he had filled pulpits in a number of West Texas towns, baptizing quite a few and preaching funerals for others, most of them oldtimers whom he had known. Survivors other than the Hico brother include his wife, three sons, one daughter, two sisters, and four other brothers.

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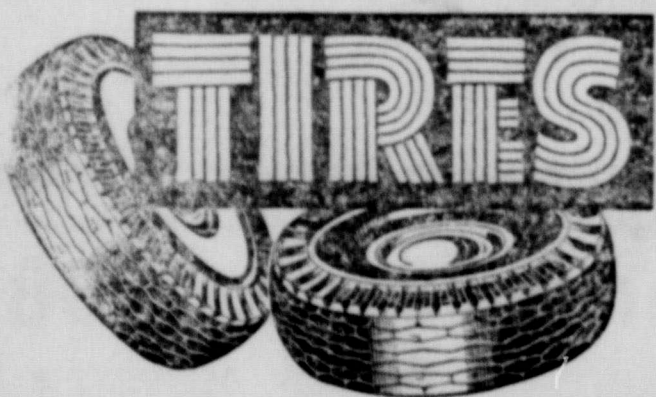

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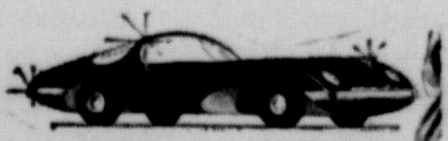

No need to let left-overs cool down to room temperature before refrigerating. Modern-day refrigerators are capable of handling even a freshly roasted 25-pound turkey. Uncover and leave as much surface exposed to the cold air as possible. When cooled, the meat and leftovers should be covered or wrapped to prevent excess drying and absorption of off-flavors.

Fall brings sweet potatoes to the market place. The best ones look fresh, plump, medium-sized and firm. Buy just the amount you can use in a short time because they are not cured.

Good breakfasts and good school grades go hand in hand. A child who habitually skips breakfast often have a lower mental alertness and letdown in energy.

Pampering your laundry goes a long way towards saving ironing time. To get good results from easy-care fabrics and prevent laundry wrinkles follow these suggestions:

Wash in small loads—big loads can compress garments and wrinkle them.

Wash easy-care fabrics often. Don't wait for heavy soil to build up. Fresh soil and stains are easy to remove. The longer the delay in washing, the harder it is to get out stains.

Pre-treat greasy soil with clean-

ing fluid, full strength liquid detergent or detergent paste. Work detergent into fabric and soak 10 to 15 minutes for color fast fabrics.

Wash only long enough to remove soil.

Rinse in water that feels cool or cold to the hands (below 98 degrees F.)

When clothes are nearly dry, tumble for 10 minutes without heat.

Remove immediately and hang.

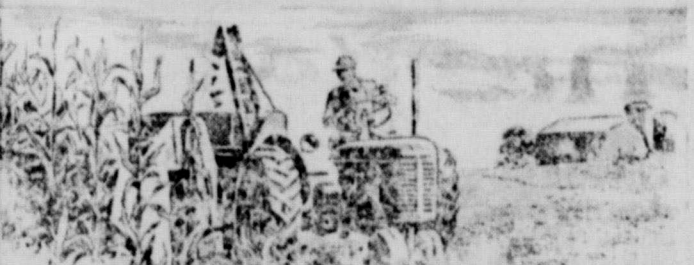

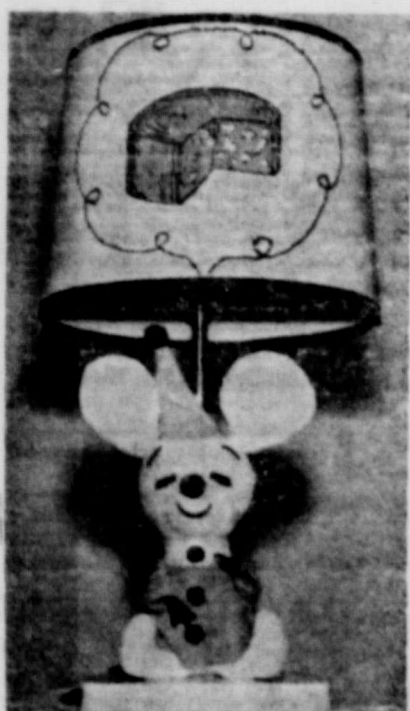

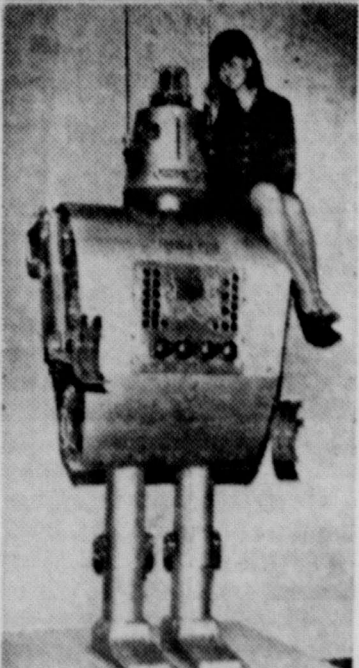
HURRICANES

Some bodies were so badly decomposed when found that they were beyond identification. Many more were not found for months or year, while some were presumably never found. Why was the storm so destructive? Many before and since were as intense as this one. In the first place, there was no sea wall there at that time and second, the warning system was very poor as compared to later warning systems.

In 1915 there was another tropical hurricane and Galveston was near its center but a sea wall had been erected and the warning system was much better, these by giving people a chance to get away before the hurricane approached land. However, many chose to stay and to take the consequences of the storm, and some perished despite all efforts to save them.

There have been several storms as large or larger since then, but because of a good warning system and transportation, loss of life has been negligible, but the loss of property (as Buelah) has been very considerable several different

Fractured 'Philosophy...

"Daddy's Shoes"

I recall, when I was twelve, of entering Daddy's and Mother's bedroom. I do not remember what the reason, but Dad and Mother were gone from home, and Daddy's old work shoes were setting out in the center of the room. What possessed me to take notice of the old, badly worn shoes, I shall never know, but some compelling force gripped my attention, and I sat down on the side of the bed, and looked long and hard at those old shoes. I can well remember many thoughts that came to me as I sat in reverent silence. I am convinced it was not the appearance of those shabby old shoes that held such persuasive appeal to my imagination, but rather my love and admiration of the one who wore them.

It was here, in silent respect, I saw my Dad as the man he really was. Dad had but very little education, and he was quite plain in dress, speech, and action. He made no effort to conceal the fact he lacked many of the polished and finer points so often associated with a better educated person. In an abrupt, home-spun way, Dad possessed a remarkable sense of humor, and good, hard, common horsesense.

Dad had no patience with anyone who made any pretense of anything. He did what he did in complete open honesty. He never pulled any punches in regard to the truth. Not once can I remember Dad ever attempting to mislead on any occasion. His word was his surety, and if he told anyone something, you could stake your life it was that way, or Dad was ever ready to correct his mistake.

Dad was not only very honest, but he was frugal in conserving that which he was permitted to have in his possession. He was not what one would call stingy, or miserly, but he thought what we were privileged to have, had come by virtue of hard, honest toil, and should be used with reasonable-ness.

My Dad was always kind, considerate, and concerned with the welfare of those about him. He would neglect his own work or needs to help a neighbor, or anyone else who needed his assistance. Dad's life was filled to overflowing with the simple things he deemed suitable, and if my Dad had one enemy, I have never known who that person was. Many men were of greater physical stature, but Dad stood head and shoulders above many who lacked the sincere values of those things that mattered most. My Daddy was a giant.

Many years have past, and as I reflect my encounter with those old work shoes, I am reminded of an earnest resolution I made that day. I resolved to try in every way I knew how to wear Dad's shoes. I am well aware it was a big order, and I know too, I have failed in many ways, but through the years, I have had an example ever-shining before me. Dad's example has presented a continuous challenge; a challenge that has taken the best I had to offer, to try to keep step with the feet that so nobly trod the path of life in a sadly worn pair of old, rough, brogan shoes. I must admit I am found wanting, and I realize my determination to fill Dad's shoes is rendered far from fulfillment of my resolution.
