## Amendments 1, 5 and 6 Fail in Hico Box; 55 Votes Cast

Hico voters turned down three Constitutional Amendments, while approving three in an election held last Saturday. Only 55 votes were cast in the local box.

While voters in Hico failed to put blanket approval on the amendments, voters over the state did, with all six propositions on the ballot carrying.

Amendments Nos. 1, 5 and 6 were defeated here. Amendment No. 1 authorizes counties to place all their tax revenues in a single general fund, rather than separate, special-purpose funds.

No. 5 would authorize a \$75,000,000 state bond issue (supported by an admission fee at selected parks) for park land buying and development.

No. 6 would permit non-elective state officials and employees to serve on state and federal boards and commissions if there is no conflict of duties.

## Funeral Services Held Sunday Afternoon For Frank Dickson, 87

Eighty-seven year old Frank Dickson, longtime resident of this community, was found dead last Friday afternoon at his home here, an apparent suicide victim.

Mr. Dickson had been residing at Hico Nursing Home the past several weeks, but made daily trips to his home located east of the school. He had gone to his home Friday afternoon, and when he failed to return for the evening meal, Mrs. Louise Rushing, nursing home administrator, became alarmed and went to see about him.

Local Constable Tom Odum was called after Mrs. Rushing found a note at Mr. Dickson's home, and an investigation by Odum revealed the body in a back bedroom. Peace Justice Grover Renfro returned a verdict of suicide by hanging.

Funeral services for Mr. Dickson were conducted Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock in First Baptist Church, with Rev. R. E. Tatum officiating. Mr. Dickson was a member of the Baptist Church.

He was born March 15, 1880 in Texas, and had resided in Hico for 15 years, and in this area for many years. He was a retired farmer.

Survivors include two sisters, Miss Alma Dickson and Miss Italia Dickson, both of Hico; and one brother, R. L. Dickson of Fort Worth.

Burial was in Hico Cemetery, with nephews serving as pallbearers.

## 'A Man Called Peter' to Be Presented By Drama Club

"A Man Called Peter," a three-act play dramatized by John McGreevey from the best-selling book by Catherine Marshall, will be presented by the Hico High School Drama Club, beginning at 8 p.m. Saturday, November 18, in the school auditorium.

The play presents authentic incidents in the life of Reverend Peter Marshall, Scotch immigrant who served as chaplain of the U.S. Senate during the late 1940's. As pastor of the famous "church of the Presidents," the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church of Washington, D.C., this dedicated clergyman was a well known and greatly beloved figure in this country a generation ago.

His compassionate understanding of the problems facing the young people of that time endeared him to the generation who bore the brunt of the suffering during World War II; and his common sense attitude toward religion inspired persons of all ages.

The role of Peter Marshall is played by Steve Knudson, a Hico High School senior.

Cherry D. Ramage, also a senior, plays the part of Peter Marshall's wife, Catherine.

Jamie Dayton, a first grade student, takes the part of the Marshall's small son, Peter John.

Other members of the supporting cast are Vicki Polk as the cantankerous Miss Judith Bickle; Nancy Davis as her timid sister, Miss Jesse Bickle; Neil Wade as their sensitive nephew, Alan Talbot; Steve Jones as an authority on juvenile delinquency, Senator James Knox Polk; Rodger Meek as a boy in trouble with the law, Joseph Keating; Brad Braune as a government employee, Steve Grant; Sandra Patterson as Steven's wife, Marian; Marv Beth Martin as the Grant's daughter, Susan; Frank Bonner as George Yost, who is in love with Susan; Bobbie Boyd and Judi Putty as high school seniors; Nancy Everetts and Barbara Logan; and Judy Donley as the Marshall's housekeeper, Hulda.

The action takes place in the cheerful living room of the Marshall's pastoral residence in Washington, over a six month period in the middle 1940's.

## Suggested Christmas Mailing Deadline Given by Postmaster

Postmaster Robert Jackson this week issued a reminder list of mailing dates for Christmas gifts and parcels.

The Hico postal official said that these are final deadlines suggested by the Post Office Department to make sure all mail is delivered on time.

"If the public mails on or before these suggested deadlines," Mr. Jackson explained, "there will not be a last minute jam up in the mail stream caused by a massive influx of mail which will be more than the already over-burdened postal system can handle."

"We are asking that the public cooperate by shopping early, mailing early and using Zip Codes to encourage the most efficient Christmas postal operation ever."

The Postmaster noted that special attention will again be placed on the delivery of mail to service-

men in Vietnam and the surrounding area, and encouraged the use of APO and FPO numbers on all overseas military mail.

The deadline for mail to all members of the Armed Forces abroad are:

Gifts weighing more than five pounds sent by surface postage rates, November 11.

Gifts five pounds or less, plus letters and greeting cards sent at surface rates (these go by air on a space available basis), December 1.

Air mail gifts and greetings, December 11.

Deadlines for domestic military and civilian mail are: Domestic surface mail gifts to distant states, December 4; Greeting cards to distant states, Dec. 10; Gifts and cards to nearby areas, Dec. 13.

Domestic air mail gifts and greeting cards, Dec. 19.

Mr. Thomas had never married. He owned farm and ranchlands in the Spring Creek area, other than his property interests at Gulfport. Relatives from here were met at Birmingham by Mrs. Abels' daughter and family, the Gonzales Rivers of Raleigh, N.C. Our deepest sympathy is extended to the relatives, who to them, this uncle was a great favorite. He had planned to sell his property interest there and move to Texas. The depth of the water in the Bayou was thought to be 15 or 20 feet deep.

## On the Home Range

The Hamilton County Home Demonstration Council will have its annual Achievement Day on Friday, Nov. 17, in the Perry Building on the west side of the square beginning at 9 a.m. Baked goods will be for sale plus pie and coffee. Education and craft exhibits will be set up for viewing. The educational exhibits will be on programs held during the year.

Of all the vegetables available, the potato is king. Food shoppers buy enough potatoes to supply about two pounds each week to every man, woman and child in the United States. One medium size potato has at least one-fourth of the ascorbic acid recommended daily, good amounts of thiamine and niacin, iron and potassium.

Don't overcook potatoes. Potatoes cooked only until done are at their best in taste, food value and appearance. Drain potatoes as soon as they are done, so they won't get waterlogged. Uncover to let the steam escape. If necessary shake the potatoes in the pan over low heat to help dry them. Remove skins of unpared potatoes, if desired.

For baked potatoes, scrub them well with a brush so that the skins may be eaten. Bake in a hot oven (425 degrees). Potatoes of medium size will take from 50 to 60 minutes. Potatoes usually are done if they feel soft when pressed. Or, if other foods are to be cooked in a moderate oven (350 to 375 degrees) potatoes may be baked along with them. In a moderate oven, medium-sized potatoes will take from 60 to 80 minutes. Remove potatoes from the oven as soon as they are done. Slash an "X" in the top of each potato. Force the soft inner part up through the opening to let the steam escape. This keeps the potatoes dry and mealy.

Turnip greens, kale and collards are among the excellent sources of riboflavin. Dark green, leafy vegetables also are notable sources of iron and calcium. And, did you know that the outer leaves of cabbage have more calcium than the inner leaves?

Greens, as a whole, are an important food group. Even though their nutrient content is low, they hone our health to a keen edge.

Be an individualist. Follow the look that looks best on you, not on someone else you admire. These guides can help develop an eye for good proportion which is a major factor in the "Look for Fall" 1967.

With short skirts, wear only short gloves—any longer than wrist length may give an unbalanced look. Short clothes require short heels. Nothing looks more wrong than a girl in a mini-skirt on tall heels. The heavier or more textured stockings are, the sturdier the shoe must be. The sheer or lacier leg look goes with more delicate shoes.

Use the luggage-look of bulkier bags with heavier sporty clothes; the neat, sleek look bags with neat, sleek dressier clothes.

Hems on short skirts must have perfectly even hemlines. Shirt cuffs are a marvelous show this fall with jeweled cuff links or clip-on earrings.

For tailored shirts, a collection of ties will add to your individualism. A wide variety is available.

Hair is to be kept neater. There are many kinds of clips, bands and barrettes to help keep hair in place. Clothes must fit well. Fit is one of the most important things about your look as an individualist.

# Fractured 'Filosophy'...

## "The Chimes of Death"

This is rather an incredible story, but it is true. It was told to me by my maternal grandfather, and it happened in the last decade of the nineteenth century.

The young doe followed the bell that her mother wore everywhere the old deer led. One day the deer wandered some distance from home, in the direction of Mr. Mitchell's. The sound of the bell carried far and clear. The two young staghounds were able to hear the melodious tinkle, and the luring chime led them to the deer. When they were aware the bell was not being worn by their mother, they gave chase and their speed overtook the deer just before she made it back home. The dogs mangled the pet doe badly. She dragged her broken body almost to the house before she could go no farther. Grandfather found her torn carcass, and took the bell with him. The young doe escaped without injury.

Two more years passed, and the fateful bell had been silent. Old Nell, the family mare, was expecting a foal in the not too distant future, and grandfather put the controversial bell on her, so she could be kept track of.
