

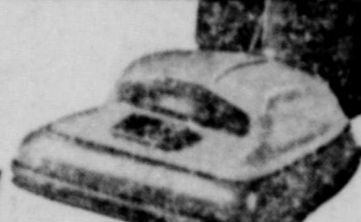

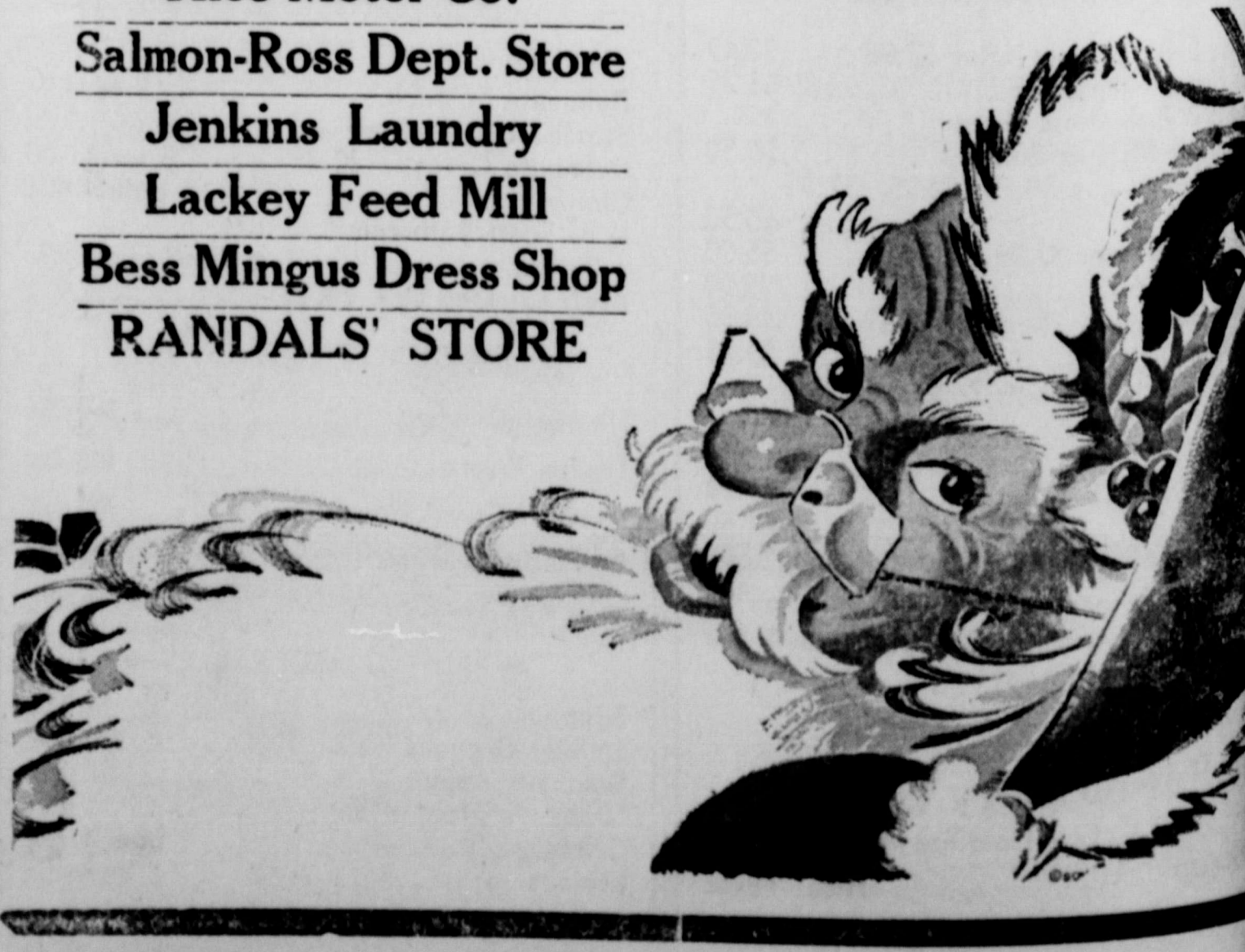

## CPS Wins Eighth National Driver Safety Honors

For the eighth time in the 21 years during which it has competed, Community Public Service Company has won top national honors for outstanding safe driver performance in Group One of the utility division of the National Fleet Safety Contest conducted by the National Safety Council. The utility company's fleet, consisting of 316 vehicles and 306 drivers, was awarded first place in its class at recent ceremonies in conjunction with the 55th National Safety Congress and Exposition in Chicago.

The award was based on safety performance from July 1966 through June 1967, during which period CPS drivers operated 4,936,743 miles and had only 3.24 accidents per million miles of operation. All accidents were counted in the contest except those occurring when a vehicle was properly parked; and winners were determined after an inspection of records by an auditor appointed by the National Fleet Safety Contest committee.

Community Public Service is also leading the field in the industrial safety contest, another competition being conducted by the NSC. This contest extends over the 1967 calendar year, and at the end of August, the utility company ranked number one with the lowest number of accidents per man-hours worked by any company in Group C, which is made up of utilities averaging between 80,000 and 200,000 man-hours per month.
