The Hico High Sophomore Homemaking students placed four of the six given to the 60 students, to 16, competing in the Division. District VIII is one of 20 Texas counties.

The contest is sponsored in part by the Women's Auxiliary National Wool Council, the Angora Goat Association, the American Wool Council, the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, and the Texas Delaine Association.

Hico homemaking students in the contest were Misses Busby, Nancy Davis, Sandra B. Rebecca Martin, and Miss Polk. Miss Polk was unable to attend the Belton contest due to a knee injury received Friday.

Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Williams, modeled a red bonded wool slim dress featuring long raglan and extended neckline. She had black kid accessories and a single flower pin. Miss Doty, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. Baley, also modeled a red bonded wool dress. Her dress featured a slightly yoked and short sleeves. Judge Vic Hall of Waco Seeks Election To 10th Court Bench

District Judge Vic Hall, of Waco, has announced as a candidate for nomination in the Democratic Primary for Judge of the 10th Court of Civil Appeals. He seeks to succeed Associate Justice Jake Tiley, who is retiring from the 10th Court of Civil Appeals.

Judge Hall is in his second four-year term as Judge of the 54th District Court. After graduation from Baylor University Law School in 1953, and while practicing law in Cleburne, Hall returned to Waco to accept the position of assistant city attorney. In 1956, he was appointed, then re-elected Justice of the Peace. In 1958, he was elected Judge of the McLellan County Court-at-Law, where he served four years. In 1962, he was elected District Judge, and was re-elected in 1966. For the past eleven years, Hall has also lectured, parttime, at Baylor University Law School.

Judge Hall is 41 years of age, and married to the former Bettye Joyce Sheridan of Fannin County. She is a Baylor University graduate of 1954. They have three children, Lisa, age 11, Brian 8, and Keith, age 7. They reside in Waco, and are members of Seventh and Third Baptist Church there.

Hall is a member of the American Bar Association, The State Bar of Texas, the Waco-McLennan Co. Bar Association, and is currently serving on committees of each. He is a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the American Legion. For many years, he has served on the board of various civic organizations in McLennan Co.

The 16 counties comprising the 10th Court of Civil Appeals are Hamilton, Coryell, Bosque, Somervell, McLennan, Brazos, Ellis, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Johnson, Leon, Limestone, Madison, Navarro and Robertson.

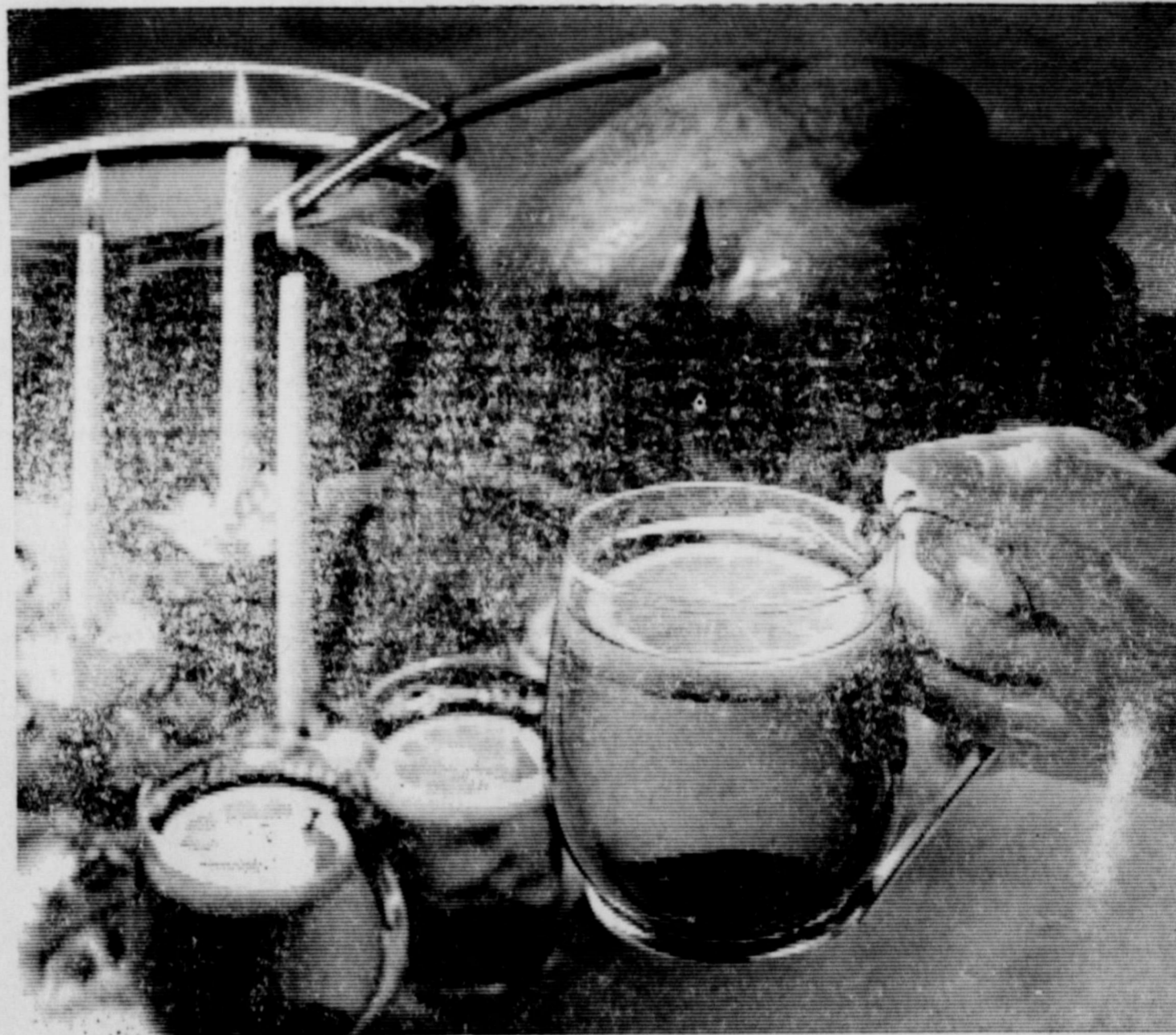

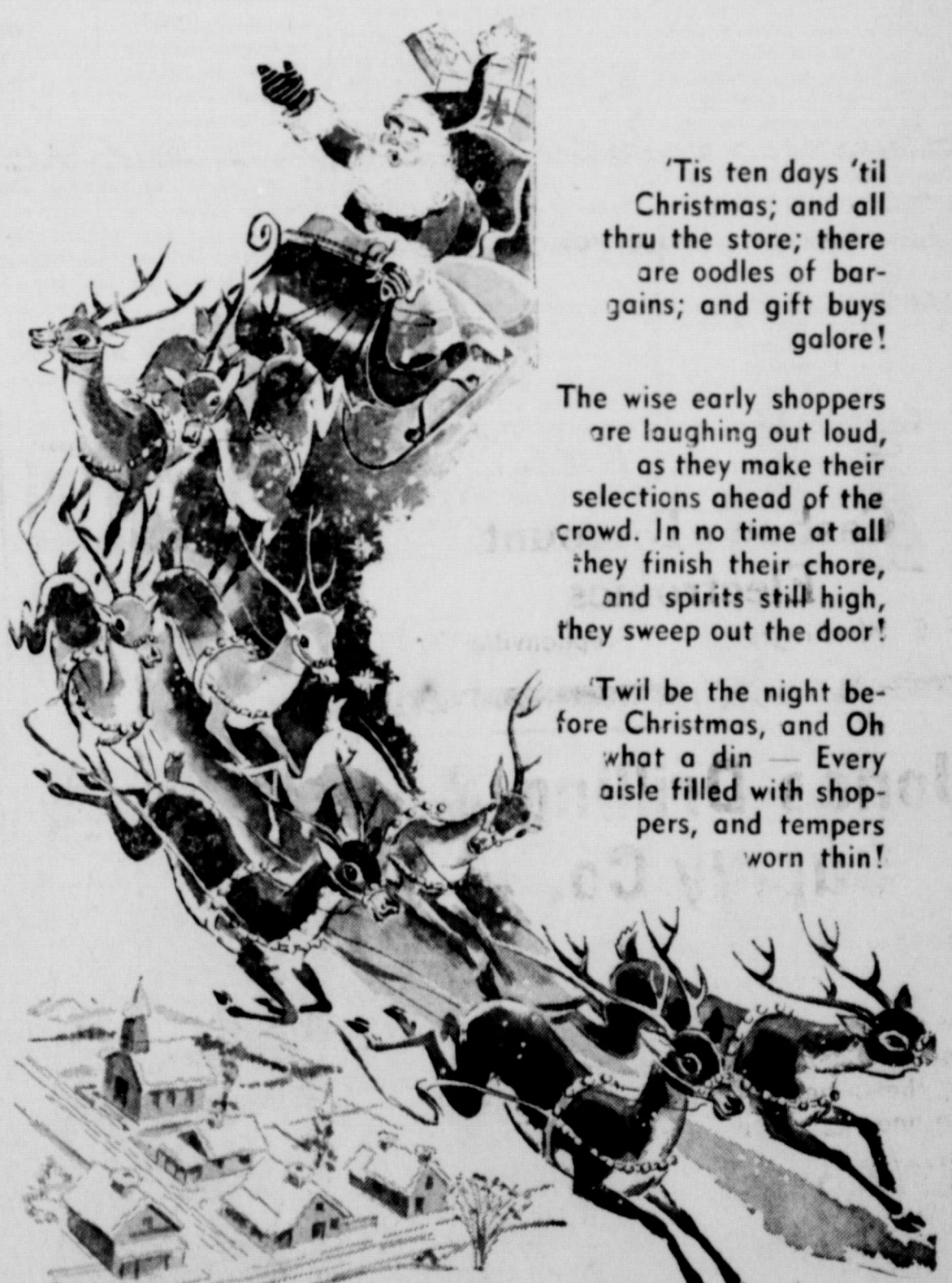

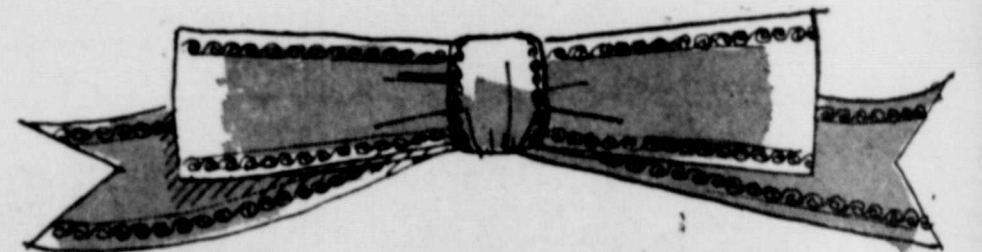
