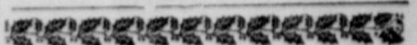

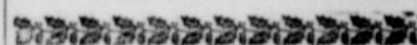

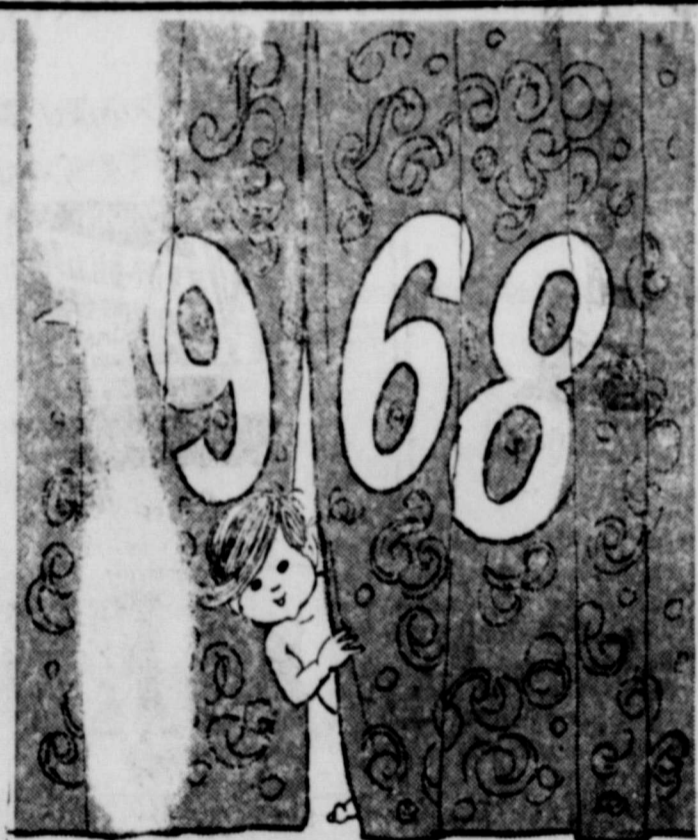

Senator Word Named To Committee on Government Economy

Austin (Sp.)—Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith this week named Senator J. P. Others named by the Lt. Governor to the committee include Senators William N. Patman of Ganado and Charles Herring of Austin, and representing the public, Harry Dulick of Morgan and Arthur Dilly of Corpus Christi. The committee is charged with the responsibility of determining ways to eliminate unessential spending and developing management and other procedures whereby state services may be more efficiently and economically provided. Under terms of the resolution creating the committee (S.R. 279), it will report to the Senate "at such times and in such manner as it may deem desirable." All state departments, agencies, and institutions are authorized and directed to cooperate with the committee.

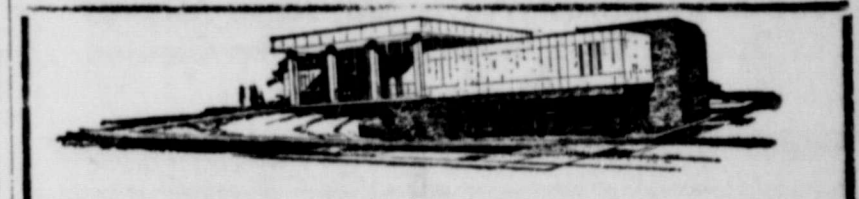
