## Truman Roberts Compared to Mid-Time Circuit Judge

The following, from the Hamilton County Journal, is a human story concerning Judge Truman Roberts of Hamilton, former resident, and is being reprinted as a matter of interest to our readers. It was written by Betty Johnson, a Journal staffer who covered the murder trial.

In the past week a quiet unknown man has slipped almost into the Criminal District Court short intervals to listen to the Rowland murder trial. In the proceedings by Judge Truman Roberts is triggered when he was presiding judge in Hamilton County during the first trial of the "hung" jury. Judge Roberts is the visiting judge in the 58th District Court in Hamilton County during the first Rowland trial. C. Matthews recused himself in Judge Roberts being the judge.

In the two-week court proceedings the fact the jury could not reach a decision, Judge Roberts requested to preside at the trial again, but declined. As visiting judge can provide experience for any of the judiciary, and Judge Roberts has served other districts in the past.

Congressman Omar Burleson of the 17th District is unopposed in the Democratic Primary, and Bradford Corrigan will run alone for County Democratic Chairman.

Monday, February 5th, was deadline for filing for places on the official primary ballot.

## City Sales Tax Vote Likely in March

Prospects of a City Sales Tax election for Hico became a reality this week, after Council members spent a long session on discussion of the measure as a source of added income.

The law enabling cities and municipalities to call for an election by the people to authorize collection of the one percent City Sales Tax was enacted by the 60th Legislature. Since that time, cities calling the election have met with more than 90 percent success, with only a very few towns turning down the measure. Stephenville, Dublin, and Clifton have all voted the tax within the last three months.

Hico Mayor W. C. Howard said Wednesday that in all probability, the local election would be called for sometime in late

March. It takes a 30-day time lapse from the time that an ordinance is adopted by the governing body of a city until an election can be held.

The mayor, in giving reasons for considering the sales tax, cited lack of revenue, and impending expenses as the two greatest factors. He further pointed out that the only revenue received by the city was from property taxes, and that this revenue was no longer sufficient to maintain and improve city facilities.

When questioned at length, the mayor said that improvements and additions to the city water works were major problems facing the council, and that damage to city streets this year as a result of the extreme weather has been severe, and would require an investment of

several thousand dollars to repair.

The sales tax, if adopted by local citizens, will be collected by the State in the same manner as the present state tax is collected. It will apply to all taxable items that presently fall under the state law. In simpler words, an item that now costs an additional two cents will cost three cents more if the city tax is levied.

Should the tax be voted on and adopted in March, earliest date for start of collection would be June 1, or the beginning of the third quarter of a taxable year. Howard said that a special meeting of the council would probably be called within the next few days to decide definitely on whether or not to call the election.

## Three Names Filed This Week For Hico School Trustees

Three names were filed with County Judge H. W. Standifer this week for places on the April 6th trustee election in Hico Independent School District.

Names filed were those of Guy Bulman, D. L. McCoy, and Tommie Johnson.

Three places are to be filled on the local board in the April election, with terms of M. I. Knudson,

Chester Land, and Bobby Needham expiring.

Bulman, who resides five miles south of Hico, is a retired Army man, and is presently employed at the ASCS office in Hamilton. McCoy resides in the Duffau community, and is engaged in ranching and real estate. Johnson, a native Hicoan, is owner of Hico Frozen Foods Lockers.

## Two Hico FFA Chapter Members Exhibit Calves At Fort Worth Show

Two members of the Hico FFA Chapter, Billy Stearman and Brad Braune, exhibited calves last week at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth.

Stearman showed his registered Hereford heifer to a 4th place in the senior heifer class. There were 25 entries in this class. His heifer was bred by McBride Hereford Ranch at Llano, and is being fitted for the Houston and Hico shows.

In the junior heifer class, Braune placed 4th with his heifer, while Stearman had the 6th place entry. Braune's heifer was bred by Arthel Henson of Abilene, and Stearman's heifer in this class was bred by Dr. W. F. Hafer of Hico.

These heifers placed well against some very strong competition.

A 1960 graduate of Texas A&M, Ross coached four years as an assistant at Alamo Heights, and three more at Jefferson before moving over to Edison two seasons ago as head coach.

Ross earned his masters degree at Howard Payne in 1964. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Watt Ross and is married to the former Karen Higginbotham, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Higginbotham, also of Hico.

## Carlton Man Among Graduates From Game Warden School at A&M

College Station —(Spl.)—William R. Hardin of Carlton is one of 33 game warden trainees who completed 20 weeks' instruction Friday, February 2, at Texas A&M University.

The trainees are to be commissioned game wardens by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in mid-February following tours of wildlife management areas and the San Marcos fish hatchery. At A&M as special students since September, the trainees have studied wildlife management, fish conservation, public speaking, first aid, physical education, records and reports, public relations, and boat and water safety.

The final week of instruction was a Civil Defense light duty rescue training course directed by A&M's Firemen's Training Division.

Field trips also were part of the training. Students toured shrimp, fish and oyster houses in the Seabrook area in conjunction with fisheries research.

## Cleburne Man is Candidate For Representative Seat

Herman L. Stone, Route 1, Cleburne, has filed his candidacy as a member of the Democratic ticket seeking a seat in the Texas Legislature. He will campaign for State Representative of the 54th District which encompasses Johnson, Somervell, Bosque, Hamilton and Mills counties.

A widely-known cattleman and youth leader, Stone's platform is built around greater educational opportunities for the youth of today, and a more positive action in establishing respect for law and order.

A resident of Johnson County for more than 13 years, Stone is a 1950 graduate of Texas Christian University with a degree in accounting. He has been an employee of the Arlington General Motors Assembly Plant for the past 14 years.

"I'm not a politician," stated Stone as he explained his purpose in filing for a seat in the House of Representatives. "But I am concerned about the population explosion which will, in the immediate future, affect the educational opportunities of our children. The 54th District needs better educational facilities, and now is the time to start doing something about it. I don't believe in waiting until there's no more room in our schools before we take action."

"The law enforcement agencies of the 54th District are doing a highly professional job," he continued, "but its capacities are taxed to the maximum. I believe our current system and its future requirements require a more detailed study than has been given it in the

past. Fortunately, we don't have a high incidence of crime in the 54th District, but I'm looking to the future."

Stone continued by saying "I'm confident that everyone wants a feeling of personal security at all times. However, that can't be achieved unless a greater respect for law and order is shown by the adults and youths of our area. Our law enforcement officials are working around the clock to preserve that security, but they can't do it alone. Everyone must join the crusade leading to respect for the law."

Stone is well-known for his livestock activities in the Southwest. A long-time member of the Texas Hereford Association, he is president of the Mid-North Texas Hereford Association, and is a member of the Board of Directors of the East Texas Hereford Association. An active leader in the Johnson County 4-H Club, he is one of the founders of the Junior division of the Mid-North Texas Hereford Association. At present, he is senior advisor to that organization.

Married in 1950, Stone and his wife have three sons and a daughter. He is an Army veteran of World War II, and spent more than two years in South Pacific combat.

The 45-year-old political aspirant summed up his observations by saying "My platform is oriented to the future. Personally, I'd prefer to sit back and let the world take its own course. But I can't. I'm compelled to take positive, direct action in helping develop the future economy, educational growth, and youth guidance in the 54th District."

Stephenville—2nd, 3rd, and 4th Mondays.

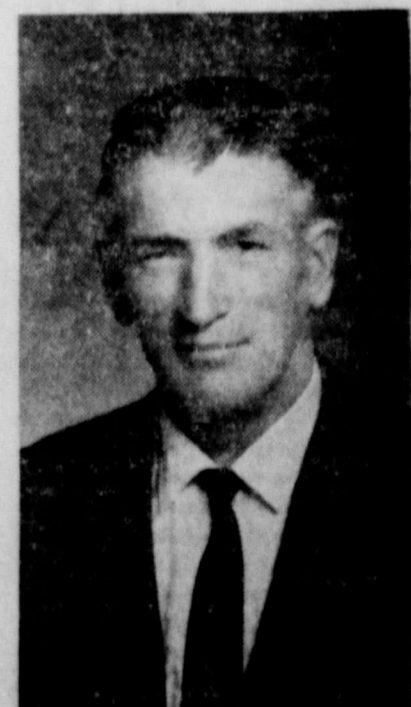
Dublin—1st Monday.

### On the Home Range

Delicate silk has a magical quality about it, but to keep this appearance, follow these suggestions: Don't let your silks become too soiled. The dry cleaner must handle silk very carefully and a heavy-handed cleaning job won't work. Perspiration stains or food stains should be removed as soon as possible. These stains contain sodium chloride which weakens silk and causes it to deteriorate.

Oranges play an important part in the family health as one of the best sources of vitamin C. Since the body cannot store this nutrient, oranges served regularly can help provide daily requirement.

An orange can be served whole, or peeled and sectioned for an easy desert. Broiled orange halves make a different meat garnish. Appetizers and salads containing fresh oranges and other fruits are very tasty.

Quality oranges are firm and heavy for their size, with smooth, thin skin. Skin color does not indicate ripeness or inner color of fruit. Most surface scars and russet spots do not affect flavor or juiciness unless the oranges have soft spots or are wet. Larger oranges usually are better buys because they have more juice and more sections. But size does not affect quality.

How essential the mineral—iron—is in your diet. Some of the top sources of iron are liver, leafy green vegetables and egg yolk; also molasses and dried fruits.

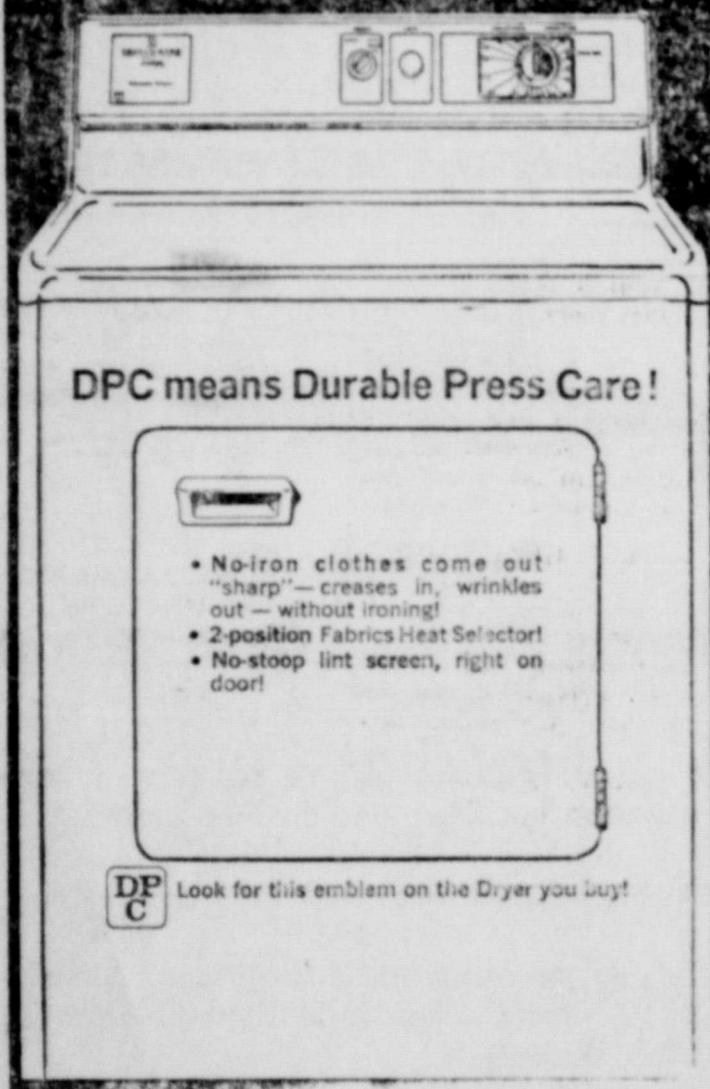
