Time for planting grain sorghum is just around the corner. Optimum planting dates in our area are March 10 to April 10. Generally speaking, the earlier you can get your crop in the better. Late grain sorghum is usually severely damaged by midge and dry weather.

Last year the drouth prevented early planting and it may be hard to get in the fields this year due to an unusually wet winter

Two things you should be considering or already have considered are fertilization and variety. To be the most effective, fertilizer should be applied in bands from two to four inches to the side and two to four inches below the point where the seed will be placed. A soil test is the best method of determining fertilizer needs, but in the absence of this consider 40-30-0 on upland farms and 60-40-0 on bottomland

As far as variety is concerned, the medium maturing hybrids are favored over a period of years. and there are a number of good ones available.

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
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

Educational Program Planned By Health Group on Measles

Within the next five months measles may be a thing of the past in Texas.

Authorities of two key health agencies have gone on state-wide television and radio to urge parents to have their children vaccinated against the dangerous disease which can cripple and even kill.

Dr. J. E. Peavy, State Commissioner of Health, and Dr. Sam Nixon Jr., chairman of the Texas Medical Association's Committee on Public Health, are telling Texans via TV spots that an effective vaccine is available to all children who have reached their first birth-

June had been set earlier by Gov. John Connally as the target date for measles eradication in the state. In one of the two statements made by the Health Commissioner -which will be viewed and aired on Texas stations from now thru June-Dr. Peavy points out that the goal can be achieved only if parents cooperate with their private physician, local health department and the State Health Department. He says further that local medical societies, health departments and civic groups must continue to get involved "if this measles eradication effort is to suc-

Thus far, 17 of the state's 354 counties have held measles immunization campaigns.

Local Health Officer Dr. B. C. Dayton said that the vaccine was available in Hico, and urged all parents to have their children im-



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

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
