Dwain Fail, 1966 graduate of Hico High School, appeared in the lead role in Lewis John Carlino's "The Brick and the Rose," presented by the Drama Department of Cisco Junior College last Thursday and Friday nights.

principal spillway pipe which runs under the dam. Invitations to build two more sites similar to this have been issued for construction of Sites 25 and 28 west of Hico on the J. B. Putty and R. C. Fowler farms.

Bids Sought For Watershed Sites 25 and 28 Near Hico

Invitations to bid on the construction of two more flood water retarding structures in the Upper Bosque River Watershed have been issued by project sponsors. Marion Porter, of the Soil Conservation Service, said that additional funds have been received to permit advertising at this time.

The invitations to bid are for Sites 25 and 28 which are located in the lower portion of the Watershed.

Site 25 is located on Spring Creek about three miles west of Hico on the John B. Putty farm. Site 28 is to be constructed on Little Gilmore Creek on the R. C. Fowler farm.

R. G. Burwell, contracting officer for the Erath and Hamilton County Commissioners Courts, said that bids would be accepted until 2:00 p.m. May 23, 1968 in the County Clerk's office in the Erath County Courthouse in Stephenville.

Bids will be publicly opened in the Erath County District Courtroom by Burwell and his assistant, Bill Croft, Erath County Clerk.

Burwell said that the two structures will contain some 490,300 cubic yards of compacted earthfill material. The contractor will have some 407 calendar days to construct the dams after the contract is started.

Awarding of these contracts will bring to 21 the number of structures in the Bosque Watershed on which construction has been started. Construction is complete on 15 sites and the other four now under construction are due to be completed by Sept. 1, 1968, Porter said.

Funds for the construction and vegetation of all flood prevention structures are provided by the Federal Government through the Soil Conservation Service, to local project sponsors who serve as contracting agency. The Erath County

Court will represent the sponsors which include the Hamilton County Court, Hamilton-Coryell and Bosque Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and the North Bosque Water Control and Improvement District.

John Curtis is project construction engineer for the SCS, and will supervise construction of the two structures. He will assign an inspector to work with the contractor to see that the work is carried out according to plans.

Porter said that starting of construction on these two sites would leave only seven more sites remaining to be constructed. Plans are to issue additional invitations to bid on two more sites in the coming weeks.

Overall, construction in the watershed is ahead of the original schedule because project sponsors and landowners have cooperated in carrying out local obligations, Porter said.
