World Walker Attends Tractor Maintenance Course at TSC

Harold D. Walker, Hico High School Vocational Agriculture Teacher, participated in a Tractor Maintenance School at Tarleton State College on June 19 and 20.

B. Morton, Agricultural Education Coordinator at the school, which is taught by Tommy Wells, Service Training and Warranty Supervisor of Ford Motor Co.

The school was designed to improve the competence of vocational agriculture teachers in the knowledge and skills necessary to teach tractor maintenance to students and young farmers.

Walker pointed out that agricultural machinery is second only to land buildings in the amount of investment in modern farms. Preventive maintenance, he said, is key to getting the dollar value out of this investment.

Walker studied and practiced all parts of preventive maintenance during the two-day school.

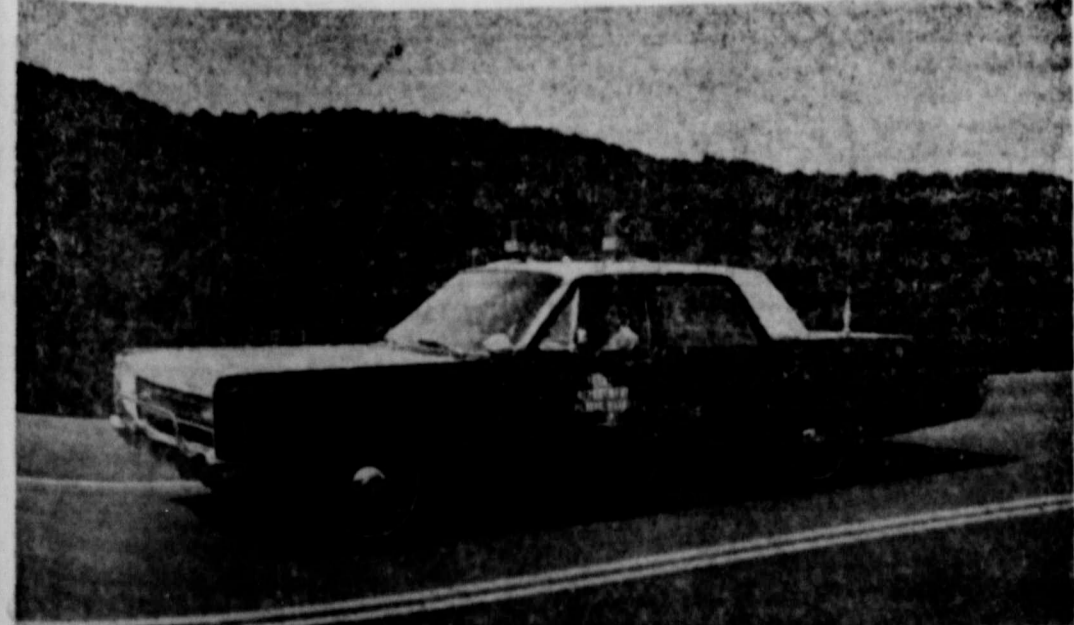

Two major features are expected to make the 82nd Annual Hico Reunion one of the best in recent years, according to Ray Keller, manager of the celebration. Dates for this year's production are July 31, and August 1, 2 and 3.

Keller said this week that the famous Leon Raush and the Bob Wills Band would play for the Tuesday night Street Dance, which opens Reunion festivities. Raush is the talented fiddler with the band that was so popular in the 1940's and 1950's, and became famous for Wills "Take it away Leon" comments. The street dance, started three years ago is a prelude to actual beginning of the Reunion, which is officially kicked off with the traditional parade on Wednesday afternoon.

Second added feature will be the appearance of nine performing units from Moslah Temple Shrine from Waco. The entire group has been committed to appear in the parade, assuring one of the most successful in recent years.

Shrine units coming to Hico for the parade this year will be:

1. Motor Patrol;

3. Band;
4. Clowns;

The Shriners will arrive early with the train, and offer rides during the afternoon preceding the parade.

Keller said that programming was almost complete for the four-day celebration, with only Wednesday night open at present. The manager said that the program would be secured within the next few days.

Thursday night has been set aside for the teenagers, with music and a dance at the park.

The ever-popular Miss Reunion contest will be held Friday night. Mrs. Von Scott has been named chairman of the beauty pageant, and has asked merchants to start securing their entries.

Saturday night will feature Herb Dooley of Wichita Falls, popular western and modern musician, who will come to Hico highly recommended.

A \$25.00 fee will be charged for space this year, but the Reunion Association will enclose all display areas, ready for merchant's exhibits. An effort will be made to sell all booths this year in a move to revive interest in this phase of the celebration.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

First of all, let me say that the sorghum midge I was referring to in last week's column are one-twelfth of an inch long and not an inch and a half. I have received just a little kidding about that mistake. I am sure that this error was due to my bad typing and no fault of the newspaper.

Remember that these insects are very destructive when heavy populations infest late grain sorghum, so beginning about June 25th check your grain sorghum daily for this insect. If spraying is necessary you will want to spray when 90 percent of the heads are out of the boot.

The 1969 crop-wheat program has been announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and features a national allotment of 51.6 million acres, down 13 percent from 1968. Diversion payments at the maximum rate authorized by law will be offered to farmers for planting less than their acreage allotment and diverting this land to conserving uses. Details on the program are or soon will be available from the County ASCS office.

Some of the people who are "in the know" are predicting better prices for our Central Texas cotton produced this year. It seems that the government carry-over is about exhausted, making the mar-

ket look up. This is not to say that the market will be good, but it is expected to bring a better price than it has for the last several years.

Agriculture currently ranks third among the nation's industries in accidental death rates. In 1967 about 8,000 farm residents were accidentally killed and nearly 750,000 more

suffered disabling injuries. Traffic accounted for about 40 percent of the deaths, followed by farm work and home accidents. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council is asking all rural residents to participate in the 1968 observance of Farm Safety Week July 21-27, and to join friends and neighbors in community programs to reduce accidents.

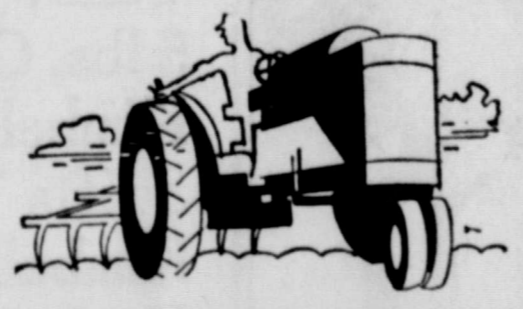

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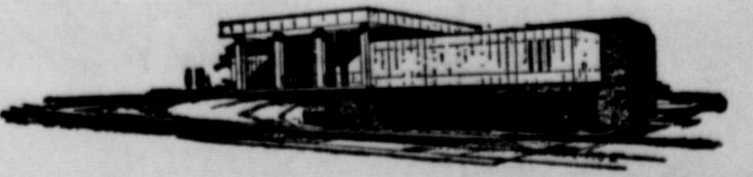

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C.—The following is a short speech made on the floor of the House of Representatives preceding the consideration of the Civil Rights Bill that was passed by the House of Representatives recently:

Mr. Burleson: "Mr. Speaker, obviously the House is proceeding today under sensitive circumstances. Frankly in my opinion we should not be in session at all and specifically, we should not be considering the legislation before us under prevailing conditions.

"There is not a member here who would not assure that I am opposed to the pending bill but let me say to those of you who support it that you would do well for the

country to wait for a more sober and a more calm atmosphere to act than is the obvious case at the present time.

"I think if I were for this so-called civil rights bill, with its open housing feature, I would not want to cast my vote for it while soldiers and marines are having to stand guard in front of this Capitol. I resent threats of force and duress in anything and if I had to legislate under such conditions I would walk out of this Chamber and not return.

"There is a way to honorably and with courage meet this issue, since apparently it is going to be acted on within the next hour or so. That is, to send this measure

to conference with the Senate. Let differences between the House and Senate bills be resolved and brought to each body for approval or disapproval under more calm circumstances.

"This matter has no deadline except the threats of those groups who look for any excuse to riot and demonstrate. If it is not this, it likely will be something else. When the drums call they will be there and it is high time we challenge the drummer.

"It is a sad commentary on this Congress if it yields to the pressures of the moment. I for one had rather yield my seat in this House than to do so."

The results of this legislation referred to is now well-known to everyone from press reports.

As one who has always taken pride in the House of Representatives of the Congress as the greatest deliberative body in the world, there is no reason today to be ashamed of its actions. The shame is not only the results of the vote but also because the House legislated under pressures and threats wholly and completely un-American.

On the vote, 89 Democrats and 106 Republicans stood firm against approval. 152 Democrats and 77 Republicans voted to pass the bill. As a part of the influences under which this legislation should not have been considered was the fact that flags all over the nation were flying at half-mast for a man who had never held any official position and the Presidential Proclamation ordering the action was without precedent.

The flags were not ordered lowered for Travis Crow, age 19 of Tallahassee, Florida, who was burned to death defending his father's small grocery store. The only use of the flag for a boy killed in Vietnam is to cover his casket. Travis Crow and the boy shipped back from Vietnam have not said they would obey only the laws which they thought were good and disobey those which in their opinion were bad.

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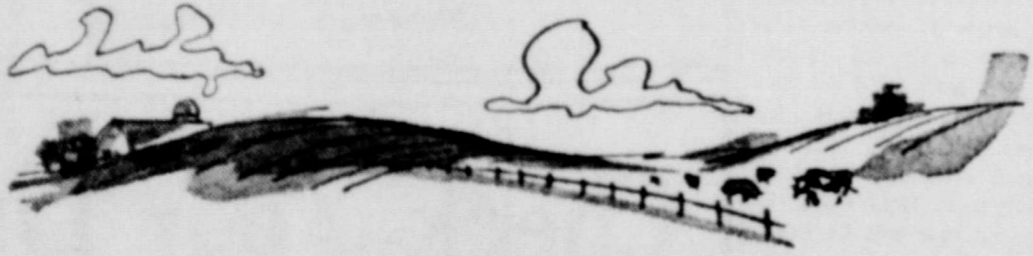
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ter to ask him certain questions in the hope of entrapping him to be brought before a Roman court for prosecution.
