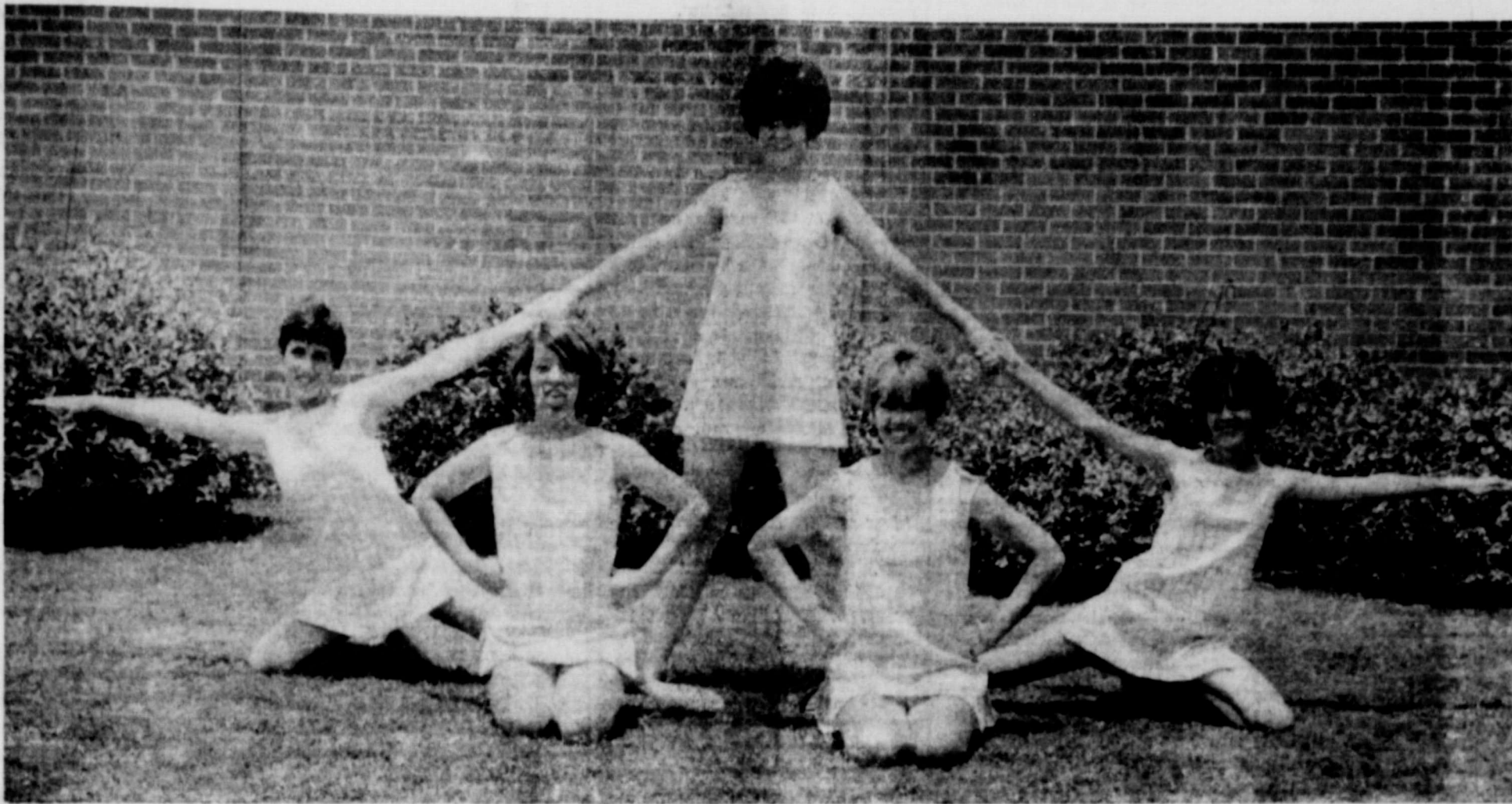

Grass Fires This Week Bring Caution

Two grass fires, on Monday and Tuesday of this week, caused Hico Volunteer Firemen to caution everyone to be especially careful while burning trash and rubbish.

The fires, both around noon, were quickly extinguished. The first occurred about 12:50 Monday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Hyles, north of the football stadium. Burning trash was given as the cause. Firemen answered a call at approximately 12:15 noon Tuesday near the Killebrew residence on Highway 220.

High, hot winds the past ten days has dried out grass and other vegetation, and created a serious hazard. Foliage is perhaps the most dense in recent years due to the above-normal rainfall, and firemen foresee a hot, busy summer of battling grass fires if people are not careful.

They have asked for the cooperation of everyone in helping to prevent these fires during the next few months.

Trucking Safety Experts to Join Holiday Patrol on Hiways

Trained trucking industry safety men will take to the roads July 4 and Labor Day to participate in a unique Holiday Road Patrol.

The Texas program is being sponsored by the Texas Motor Transportation Association and its Council of Safety Supervisors, a statewide organization representing the motor carrier industry.

Jack C. Bryan, Director of Safety for the Texas Motor Transportation Association said about 25 to 30 road patrol cars will be on the most heavily traveled highways of the state during the peak traffic hours during the holiday weekends. The cars will be manned by experienced members of the Texas Council of Safety Supervisors, who will be particularly alert for motorists in trouble.

The Holiday Patrol Vehicles will be equipped with tools, spare fuses, warning flags, first-aid equipment and gasoline safety containers. In addition, many of the cars are radio equipped to allow the Holiday Patrolmen to summon repair equip-

ment or additional help.

"While these men will not have arrest powers," Bryan emphasized, "we will cooperate with the State Highway Patrol in every way possible."

Col. Wilson E. Speir, Acting Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, commended the Texas trucking group for its cooperation and said:

"We welcome the added assist from the safety men of the trucking industry. Their wide experience on the roads and their record of assistance to motorists will aid substantially during this period of high density traffic."

The trucking industry spokesman pointed out that truck traffic is expected to be light on the highways over the holidays since most firms restrict movement to only essential shipments. The Holiday Road Patrol will closely observe these drivers as they do during their normal year around road patrol operation to assure courteous and safe operation of the trucks.

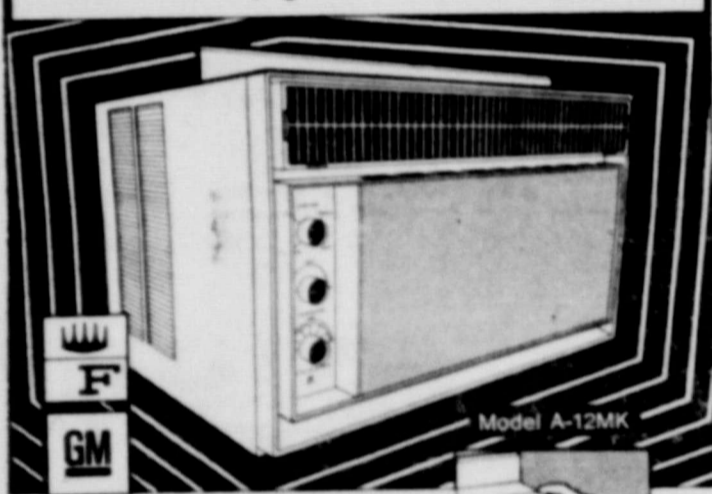

Following World War I, Mr. Persons and Mrs. Persons settled in Hico. They moved to Haskell in 1928.

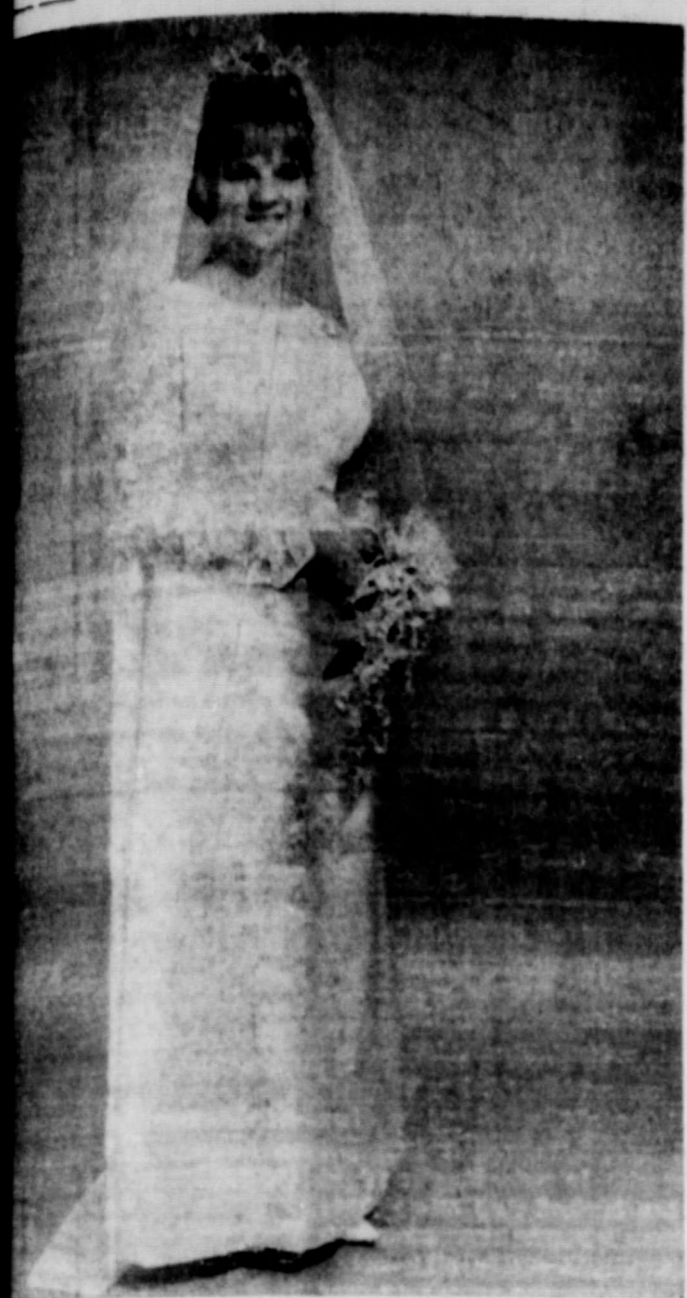

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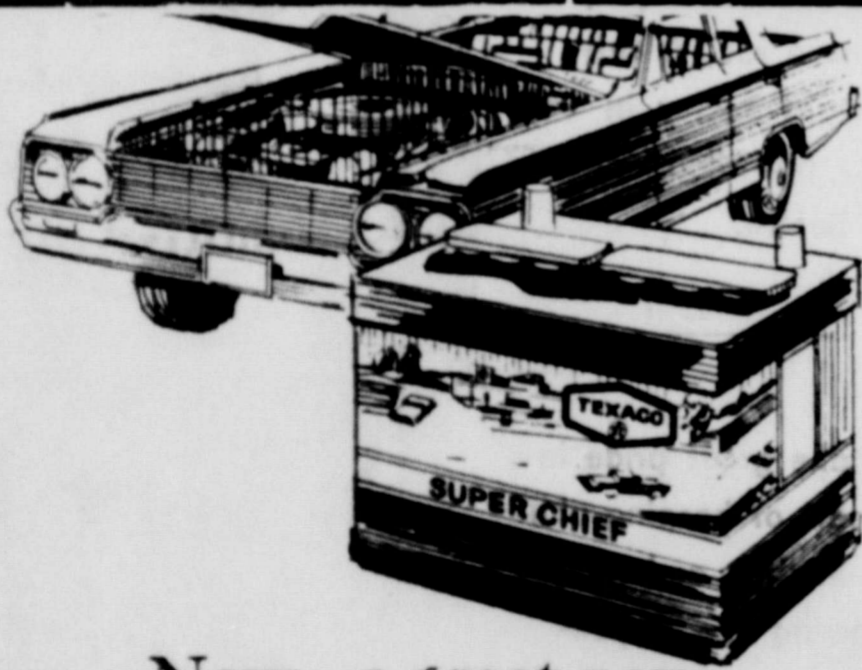

"Wal to 'gin with, I'll tell y'awl about that thar editor from the Hico paper. He come out hyar to see jist how much damage the storm did do, an' you know what, he can't spell 'Swashbuckle', cause he said the worst part of the wind wuz down on Plum Holler, an' I knowed it hit the hardest up hyar at the Ridge. So you see, it had to be that Hico editor couldn't spell 'Swashbuckle', so's he jist moved the wind to a place he could spell when he printed it in the paper."

It was needless for me to ask questions, as all I had to do was listen. Oscar continued, "That thar wind wuz so stout it shore did do some funny things. Ma's old cast iron wash pot wuz a settin' out yander by the smokehouse, an' when the wind hit it, it jist turned that old pot wrong-side out. It shore does look funny now with the three legs on the inside, instead of whar they b'long on the outside. COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Sorghum midge infestations remained light this past week. The early grain sorghum which has already bloomed has escaped heavy damage from this pest. Producers that have grain sorghum that is heading and still in the boot should watch it very closely and be prepared to spray when you find a damaging midge population. Check for midge on heads that are in the early bloom.

Fields checked Monday morning indicated that the midge population is building rapidly.

Homeowners should mark July 23 on the calendar as a Landscape Workshop will be held in Hamilton. Those of you having or expecting problems with home lawns should plan to attend. I don't think that this would leave out many.

Phil Hamman, entomologist, and Jerral Johnson, Plant Pathologist, will be in charge of the program. Insects and diseases are a constant problem in our home lawns and these Extension Service Specialists are quite knowledgeable about lawn problems.

Swine production has been rather limited in Hamilton County in the past, but this is now on the upswing and could become very profitable for growers if they follow a few guidelines.

The litter size at weaning is an important consideration in raising hogs, and the more pigs produced, the more return to the producer. An average of nine pigs per litter is a realistic and profitable goal. By raising the average from seven to nine pigs at weaning it is possible to lower costs by \$1-2 for each pig.

Market hogs should weigh 200 pounds at 154 days of age for economic production. Not more than 375 pounds of feed should be required per 100 pounds of gain in the herd, including sows.

A desirable product must be produced by the hog raiser and it should be what the consumer wants and demands. Approximately 90 percent of the market hogs should grade Number One.

Today's producers must shoot for the meat-type hog with a loin-eye area of about four and one-quarter square inches. An even better indication of the amount of meat a hog is carrying is the back-fat probe—an ideal hog is one with a back-fat measurement of about 1.4 inches or less.
