## STATE REPRESENTATIVE—

### Chas. Isenhower, Republican Hopeful, Makes Statement

Charles Isenhower, Clifton businessman, rancher and former Mayor, announced his formal announcement as a candidate for State Representative, on the Republican ticket, for the 54th District made in Bosque, Hamilton, Johnson, and Somervell counties.

Isenhower served eight years as Mayor of Clifton and was active in the Municipal League which represents some 650 Texas cities. He is also Vice-President of the League and has made numerous appearances before Senate and House committees in Austin, on legislation affecting Texas cities.

Isenhower served two years as President of the Texas Egg Council and Director of the National Egg Council. He took an active part in farm work both at state and national levels.

Isenhower is fifty-one years old, is a Methodist and a Mason. He received his formal education at Abilene Christian College and the University of Texas. He is married to the former Opal Brown of Hico, Texas and they have one daughter, Mrs. Jeanne Stone of Hico.

Isenhower is a successful businessman and rancher, and was named "Outstanding Soil Conservationist in Central Texas" several years ago. Recognized as a civic leader, he is listed in "Who's Who in Texas," "Who's Who in Texas," "Outstanding Civic Leaders of Texas," and in "Community Leaders of America."

Isenhower stated he thought the people of the 54th District were in for a change . . . that there was a feeling of unrest and that people were concerned about the rapid increase in the crime rate, civil and large tax increases. He stated he would work for:

1. Increased vocational training facilities.  
2. Development of adequate water supplies.  
3. Water and air pollution controls.  
4. Improved standing for Texas in the field of education.  
5. A common sense approach to state fiscal matters.

Excessive speed and smooth, worn tires are hazardous and cause loss of control much more quickly than moderate speed and tires with a good deep tread. It is therefore recommended that wet pavement driving be done with care and caution.

The Department of Public Safety has found that tires should be inflated to 35 pounds pressure for both wet and dry driving for longer tire wear.

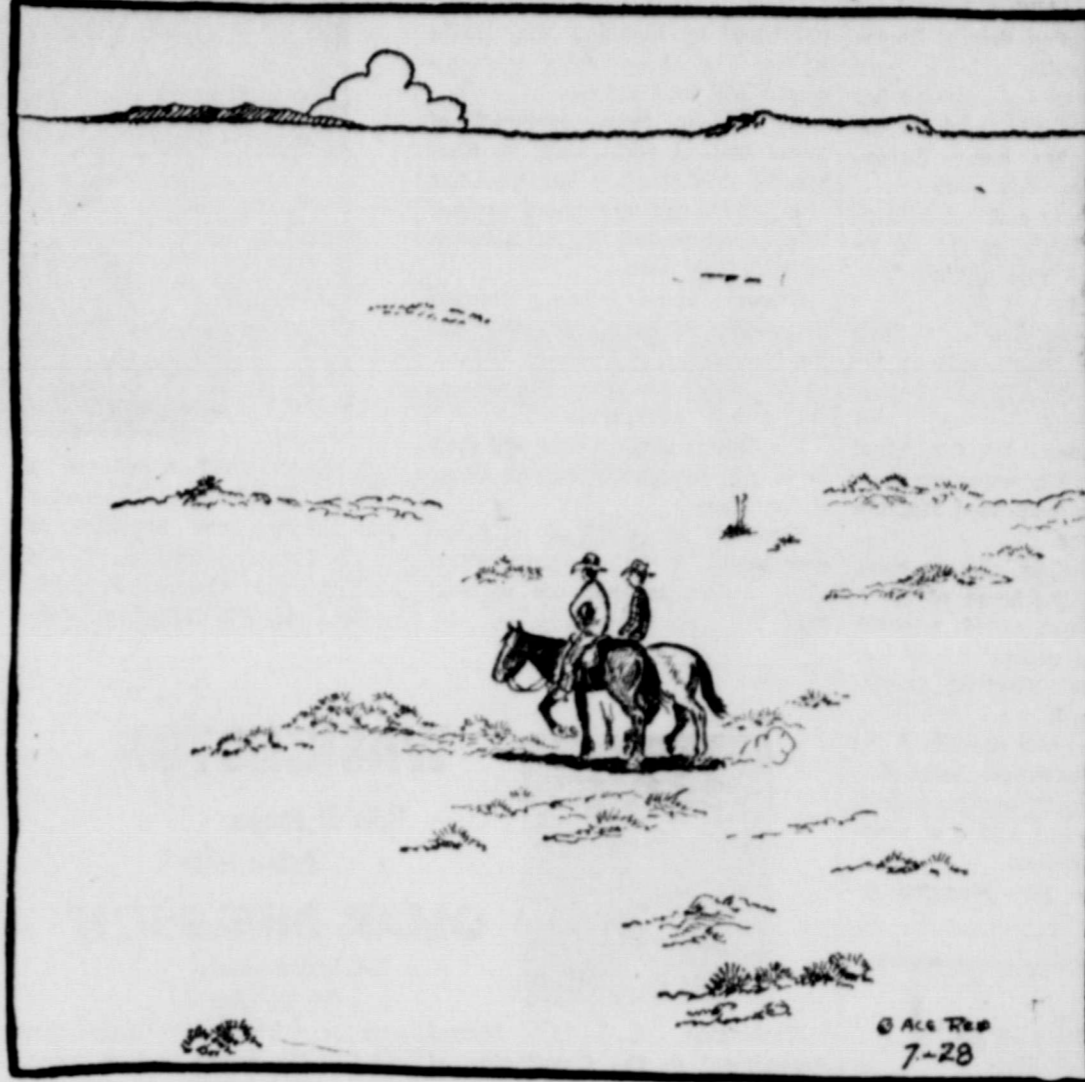

Washington, D.C.—The Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States says "A well regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed."

For nearly 200 years Americans have believed that they did indeed possess such a right as guaranteed by the Second Amendment.

The first Federal Gun Law regulating the shipment of certain types of firearms in interstate commerce was passed in 1934. This action was the outgrowth of sentiment created by the attempted assassination of President Roosevelt in Miami, Florida in 1933.

In 1939, in a case known as the U.S. vs. Miller, the Supreme Court upheld the conviction of Miller for possession of an unregistered "sawed-off shotgun" as a violation of this Act. The Amendment did not guarantee the right to keep and bear such a firearm for the preservation and efficiency of a well-regulated militia.

More recently, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, writing in the New York University Law Review on the formation of the Declaration of Independence, had this to say:

"Despite these safeguards, the people were still troubled by the recollection of the conditions that prompted the charges of the Declaration of Independence that the King has 'affected to render the military independent and superior to the civil power.' They were reluctant to ratify the Constitution without further assurances and thus we find in the Bill of Rights, Amendments 2 and 3 specifically authorizing a decentralized militia, guaranteeing the right of the people to keep and bear arms, and prohibiting the quartering of troops in any house in times of peace without the consent of the owner."

In 1941, shortly before Pearl Harbor, Congress passed what is known as the Property Seizure Act. It was made clear in the Law that nothing contained in the Bill should be construed to authorize the President to requisition or require the registration of firearms possessed by an individual for his personal protection or sport, nor that registration should be required. The Law said specifically that the President or any Board, Agency, or Officer, had no right to trespass upon the people in this respect.

The language of the bill further stated that "In view of the fact that certain totalitarian and dictatorial nations are now engaged in the willful and wholesale destruction of personal rights and liberties, it is appropriate for the Congress to expressly state that the law shall not be construed to im-

always, the people, no less than their Courts, must remain vigilant to preserve the principles of our Bill of Rights, lest in our desire to be secure we lose our ability to be free."

The right of people of the United States to keep and bear arms is guaranteed not only by the Federal Constitution but by the Constitution of thirty-five states.

Article I, Section 23 of our own Texas Constitution, says "Every citizen shall have the right to keep and bear arms in the lawful defense of himself or the State; but the legislature shall have power, by law, to regulate the wearing of arms, with a view to prevent crime."

At the present time a majority of the states are seeking through agreements and compacts, uniform firearm legislation. It would seem they should have time and opportunity to work their will.

Would it not be better to have local and state enforcement to keep guns out of the hands of criminals, addicts, minors and the mentally deficient, than to have Federal police knocking on our doors?

The point has been made that we register and license dogs and automobiles. True—by the States, Counties or Municipal governments.

### Fractured 'Filosophy...

#### "The Last Mile"

How does one choose the proper word, or words, to sound the need of urgency for you and I to respond? It is later than we think. We too shall soon traverse the last mile.

In the experiences we have witnessed, our positive conclusion can be summed up in one word—dedication. Those who have traveled the last mile may have been unsung actors on the stage of life, but the world is a better place for you and I because they and many others have given a complete dedication in sincere service to others.

A grizzled, old, snowy haired Negro preacher stood before the crowd of more than one thousand white men, and after telling of being the son of slave parents, of the terrible days of Civil War, and the chaotic time of reconstruction in these United States, lifted tired, trembling hands and concluded, "I am tired. I am old, but I have dedicated my life, pleading for a better understanding between men of all races, for a closer kinship through brotherly love, and an obedient acceptance of the Grace of God that gives a wisdom of understanding, and a closeness of love for each other." The old man fell into eternal sleep in the rear of the automobile he was being driven home in that night. He had traveled the last mile. The dedication of his life surely must not have been in vain.

An old family doctor started the climb up two flights of stairs to reach the crowded, cluttered flat of a family whose wife and mother was ready to be delivered of another child. Just before the worn, old doctor reached the landing, he slumped over the stair rail with a vicious pain in his chest. The old heart refused to carry on. In less than an hour the old doctor had traveled the last mile. The last spoken words to leave his lips, "I have dedicated my whole life trying to help suffering people. Who will take care of my friends and patients?"

A Sunday School teacher, who for more than 40 years had taught boys and girls almost every Sunday morning, was stricken with what she knew would lead to the last mile. Her concern was not that she recover, but who would dedicate themselves to her class group with the sincere concern she had always given. Please overlook a personal testimony, but I know my life has been enriched because I was a member of her class. Her concerned dedication has blessed many through the years.

It may be we cannot preach, cure those who are sick, or even teach Sunday School, but we can give of our best to those whom we have association with. It is imperative that we give ourselves in dedicated service. I am certain some have
