The meeting will start at 8 p.m. each evening.

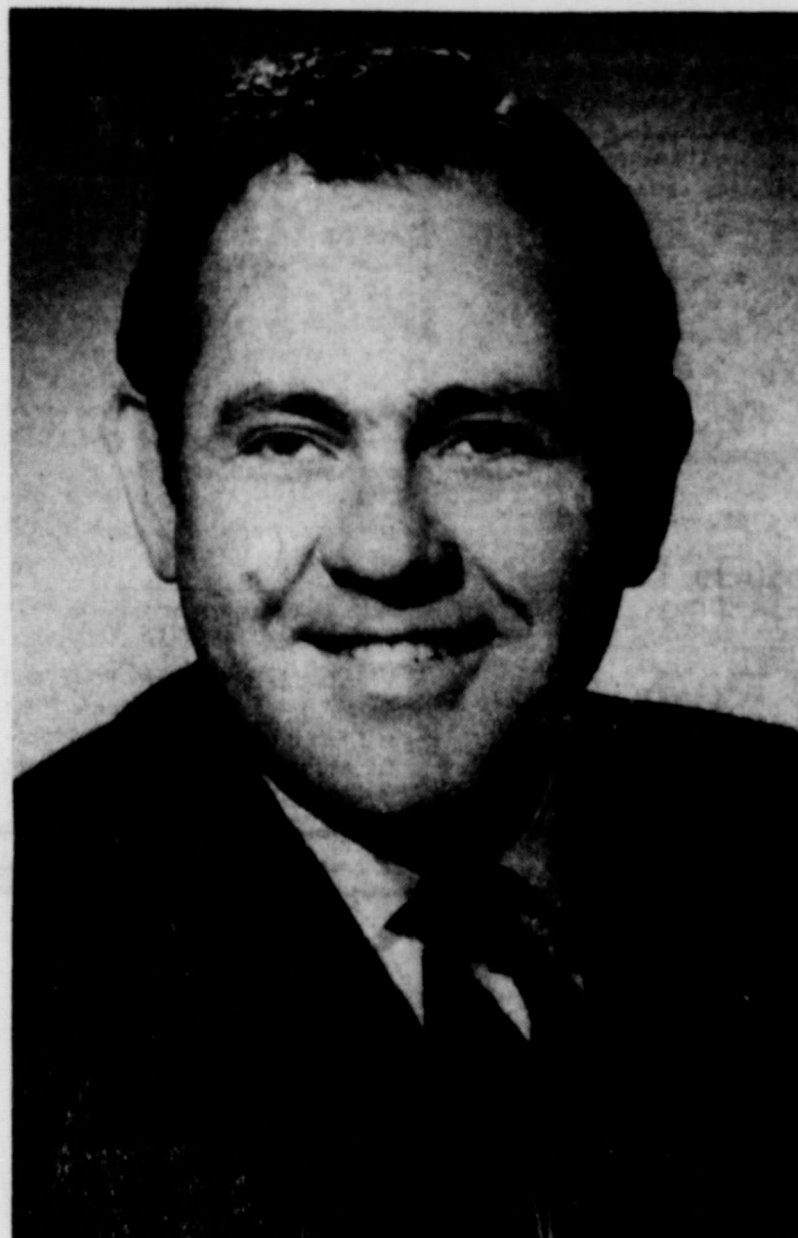
Dr. Quinn is a former pastor of the Carlton Church, and Daehnert was a recent music director at Hico First Baptist Church.

Leon Rausch is Pre-Reunion Entertainer Tuesday Night

Western music lovers will find one of the most exciting bands in the land when they hear Leon Rausch and his band, the former Texas Playboy group.

Rausch's band has been booked by Reunion Manager Ray Keller to furnish music for the annual street dance, set next Tuesday night, July 30, as a prelude to the 82nd Old Settlers Reunion beginning Wednesday.

7 P.M. Parade Will Signal Start of Annual Celebration

The 82nd Annual Old Settlers Reunion is set to get underway next Wednesday, July 31, with the huge street parade kicking off the four-day celebration.

As a preliminary to the Reunion, Manager Ray Keller has made arrangements for a big street dance to be held Tuesday night, July 30, beginning at 8 o'clock, with the famous Leon Rausch of Fort Worth providing music.

The opening parade, scheduled to start at 7 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, will form one street east of Main, near the Rainwater residence. After formation, parade en-

tries proceed down Main to Railroad Street, back up Main to the Church of Christ, then west and turn in front of Hico Nursing Home. It will disband at the railroad.

Clarence Christopher Day.
Prior to start of the parade, Clarence Christopher, long-time city nightwatchman, will be recognized for his long and faithful service to the city. Wednesday has been officially proclaimed "Clarence Christopher Day," and he has also been named honorary Parade Marshal.

Hico Mayor O. L. Davis will assist Judge Truman E. Roberts, parade speaker, with the presentation, to be held at the intersection on Main Street just before start of the parade.

Big attraction of the parade will be the Karem Temple Shriners of Waco. The Shriners will bring all performing units this year, including the Motor Patrol, Marching Patrol, Band, Clowns, Train, Migid Digs (small motorcycles), Overall Crew (midget autos), Divan (officers), and the Parade Staff.

The train, pictured on this page, will be here early in the afternoon and offer rides to the youngsters.

Several of the Shrine units have appeared here in past years, and always provide crowd-pleasing entertainment.

Following the parade, first night activities will get underway around 8 o'clock at City Park. Booked to furnish opening night entertainment is Fred Noland and the Westerners from Stephenville, who have made appearances here in past years.

Thursday night has been set aside as Teenagers Night, with the "Slow Motions" from Gatesville playing at the park.

Friday night, a full evening of entertainment is assured when the ever-popular Miss Reunion Contest and the second annual Little Miss Reunion Contest will be held.

Contestants are being entered daily, and a large group should be registered before the Friday noon deadline. Mrs. Von Scott, Mrs. B. C. Dayton and Mrs. Harold Walker are in charge of the beauty contest.

Reigning queens are Miss Vicki Polk and Little Miss Debbie Mayfield.

Saturday Night.

Climax of the four-day celebration will come Saturday night. Booked to entertain the huge crowd which is expected is Herb Dooley of Wichita Falls, popular western and modern musician, who comes to Hico highly recommended.

Everything considered, the celebration shapes up as another successful gathering, with many people returning to Hico to take part and meet and greet old friends.

Mail Service Cuts Affects Local Office

Beginning Saturday, July 27, postal service will be curtailed on Saturdays, according to R. B. Jackson, Postmaster.

Window service will be from 8:30 until 10:30 a.m. only under the new orders, issued last week by Postmaster General Watson. Post offices have been remaining open until noon on Saturday.

Also along with the closing order, discontinuance of selling all forms of postage and money orders will go into effect on Saturdays.

The move is the first phase of a plan to cut postal expenses, and also included closing of more than 300 smaller post offices over the nation.

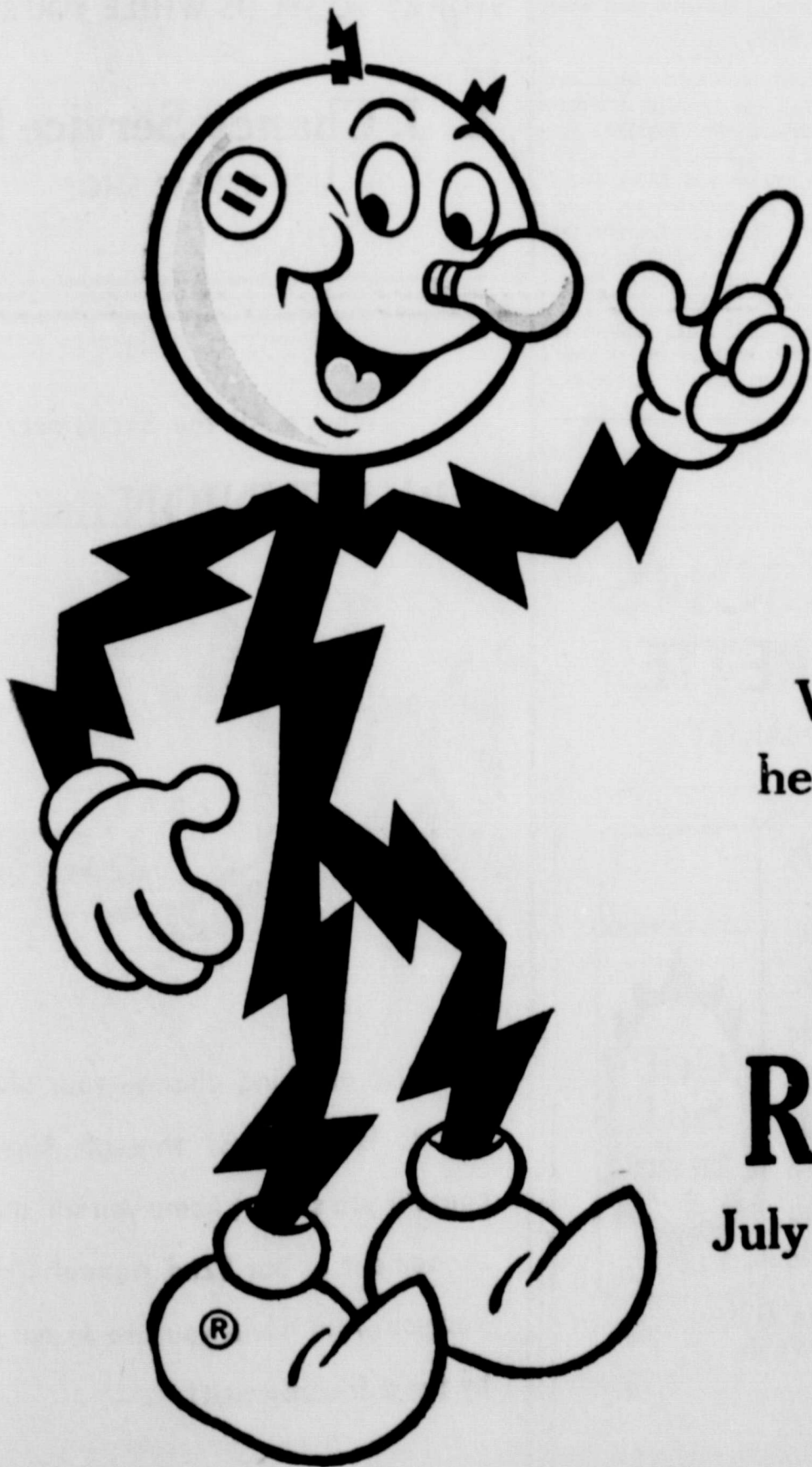

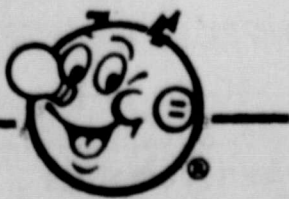

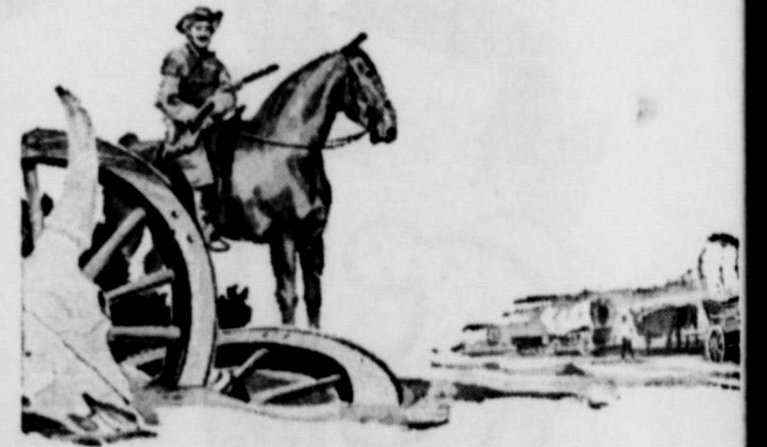

Fire Department Is Now in 60th Year

This year—1968—marks the 60th year of service to Hico and this area by the local Volunteer Fire Department. The department was organized in 1908, with twenty-four active and one honorary member. At the beginning the equipment consisted of two hose carts, as seen on the next page in the photo. Each hose cart had 750 feet of hose, and the company also had one hand-drawn hook and ladder wagon. Charter members of Hico's first fire department were E. A. Barbee, Chief; W. A. Nance, Assistant Chief; J. R. McMillan, foreman Company No. 1; W. P. Hendricks, W. H. Howerton, J. H. Atkins, W. D. Petty, M. A. Smith, H. J. Lee, Grover Atkins, and T. A. Randolph. Hose Company No. 2 was composed of W. P. Newsom, foreman; G. T. Powers, J. R. Runyan, D. Gage, J. R. Wright, J. G. Lee, W. M. McLaughlin, A. Phillips, and M. J. Wetzel. Members of the Hook and Ladder Company were J. C. Davis, foreman; P. D. Dillishaw, J. H. Viner, W. A. Nance, C. A. Waddell, J. L. Pratt, and M. A. Cole. The popular sponsor was Mrs. Lillian Collier. The picture at bottom shows the fire department in 1927 with modern equipment. Members of the department at that time (1927) were J. R. McMillan, Chief, M. A. Smith, W. D. Gage, J. Runyan and W. H. Howerton, all charter members. Other members were John Lacker, Earl R. Lynch, G. D. Leeth, G. Phillips, S. E. Blair, J. C. Barrow, G. A. Tunnell, W. C. Spaulding, J. H. Hardin, Lee Rainwater, F. Callan, C. Christopher G. Munnerlyn, W. L. Scott, T. E. Howerton, J. W. Leeth, C. W. Pittman and J. R. Massingill. An honorary member in 1927 was W. D. Petty and Rufus Phillips was mascot. The equipment in the 1927 photo consisted of two hose trucks and hook and ladder wagon. Each truck had 1000 feet of standard hose, and one truck was a combination hook and pumper with a 400-gallon water capacity. The other truck was equipped with 1000 feet of hose, ladder and was used as a general combination fire fighting apparatus. The other truck is still owned by the present day fire department. All members in 1927 had regulation state dress uniforms, and all firemen's regulation rubber coats and boots.
