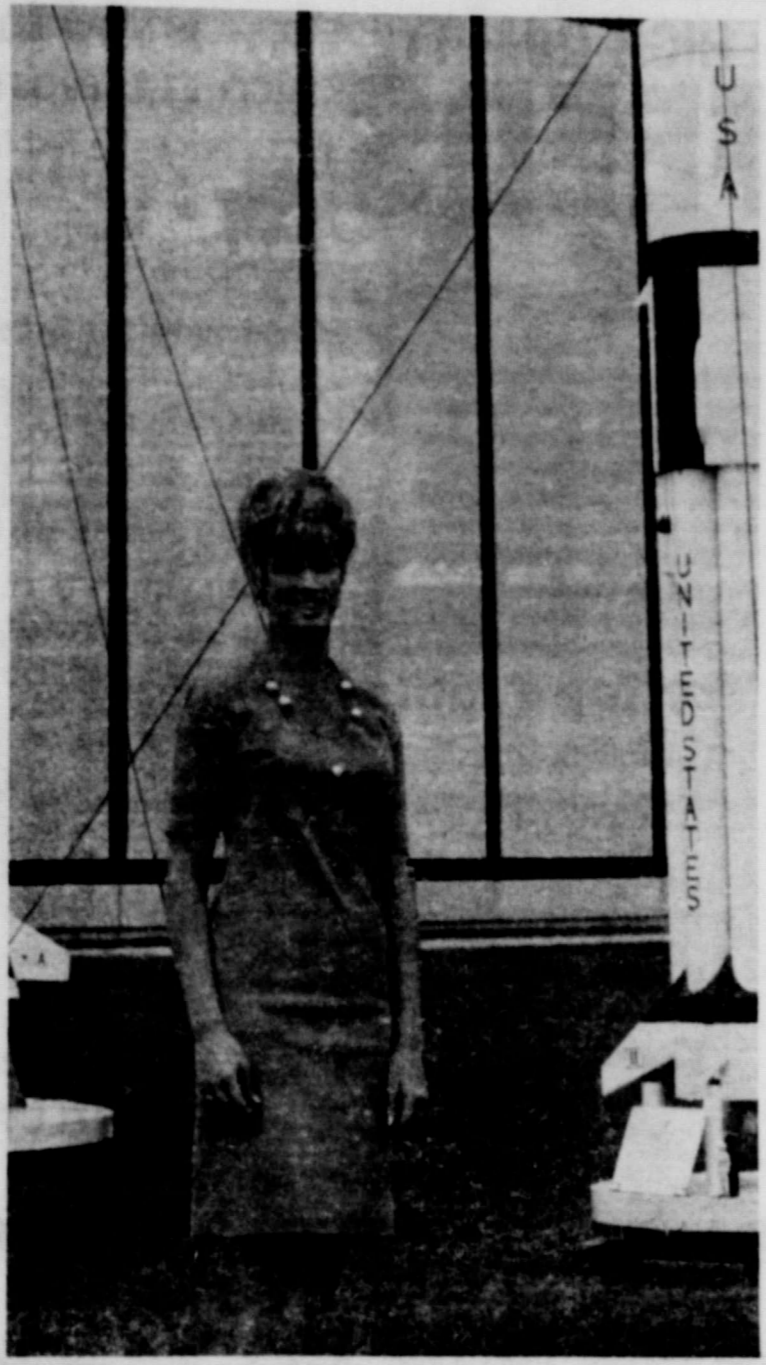
That just about tops everything the local yokels can tell, except for maybe Clarence Higginbotham. We're looking forward to some of his "windys" later in the year.

Former Hicoan Has Support Role in Manned Space Flight

Houston (Sp.) — Annette G. Chames, former resident of Hico, has a supporting role in preparations for the first manned flight of the Apollo spacecraft, which later will take three American astronauts to the moon and back.

Mrs. Chames is secretary to the chief of support operations for North American Rockwell Corporation, builder of the Apollo command and service modules, at the Clear Lake Facility for spacecraft testing.

The first manned test of the Apollo spacecraft is scheduled for later this year. Carrying a crew of three astronauts, the Apollo will be launched from NASA's Kennedy Space Center on an earth orbital mission designed to test spacecraft systems under conditions similar to those to be encountered on a moon trip.

Favored Grandview Shot Down by Tigers

Old pro footballer Fran Tarkenton of the New York Giants could take a lesson on scrambling from Hico quarterback Jim Wolfe!

And the Grandview Zebras, billed as the No. 9 Class A team in Central Texas and the highest scoring undefeated Class A team in the state—prior to last Friday night—would be the first to agree.

Wolfe, senior signal caller for the Tigers who has played only three games at the man-under slot, squirmed and wiggled his way for two touchdowns and passed for another in leading the Tigers to an impressive 22-6 win over the visitors from the east.

But Wolfe had much help. Behind the fierce blocking of the Tiger line—and Dennis Polk—he turned sophomore fullback Eugene Lindsey loose time after time for long chunks of yardage, and mixed in just enough passes to pull the Zebras out of a tight eight-man defensive line. While doing nothing fancy, the Tigers gained most of their yardage on a simple power sweep with Lindsey handling the ball and Polk taking out two, three and four defenders each time. Polk's blocking was something to see.

The Tiger line, both on offense and defense, played its best game to date, and must be given much credit for the second win in succession. From end to end—Rickie Jaggars, Brad Braune, David Ashby, Wayne Wells, Jack Shipman, Rusty Cryer and Mike Ferguson—the line did a tremendous job in containing the Zebras.

Hico set the pattern of the game on their third possession in the initial quarter. The Zebras had jammed the Tiger running game on two previous possessions, using an equivalent of an 8-3 defense, and the Tigers took to the air for the first TD. Starting at their own 37, Wolfe hit four consecutive aerials to light up the scoreboard. Polk took the first throw at the 40 and bulled his way to the Zebra 28 before going down. On the next play Barry Christian was the target and he got down to the 19. Throwing again Polk the ball was tipped in the air and Mike Ferguson ran under it at the five. Wolfe came right back with a 5-yarder to Ferguson for the six points. Another pass, to Rickie Jaggars, was good for two points, and Hico had an 8-0 lead.

The remainder of the first period, and the second quarter was scoreless except for one TD that was called back. On an attempted punt by the Zebras, Polk rushed in and blocked the kick. Jaggars picked the ball up went in for an apparent TD, but game officials ruled the ball dead at the 12 yard line.

Grandview came back strong starting the second half, and promptly marched for their only TD of the game. The visitors put together a 60-yard drive for the six points, but the conversion was no good, and the Tiger lead stood up at 8-6.

A fumble recovery late in the third period at Grandview's 44 set up the second Tiger TD. Wolfe got the score on a 1-yard sneak, upping the count to 14-6.

Hico's final tally came on a nifty piece of scrambling by Wolfe. Apparently trapped for a 15-yard loss back at the Zebra 45, Wolfe scrambled out of the impossible situation and threaded his way to the end zone on a play that officially covered 40 yards. Polk bulled in for the conversion points and a 22-6 final score.

The win put fans buzzing about the up-coming district race, which begins Friday night at Richland Springs. A move was underway at

On the Home Range

Are sweet potatoes a favorite with you? Then you enjoy a vegetable that enhances many Texas meals. Sweet potatoes are economical, delicious, nutritious, and easy to prepare. Serve them to your family today for a special mealtime treat.

Many Texas' diets are low in two important nutrients, vitamins C and A. One serving of sweet potatoes supplies the body with its daily vitamin A needs and approximately one-third of the daily needs of vitamin C. They also supply small amounts of the B vitamins and minerals. A medium-sized sweet potato contains 155 calories—not too many, but enough to supply the body with valuable food energy.

Choose sweet potatoes that are firm, smooth, reasonably clean and free from blemishes. Uniform sized potatoes will cook in the same time period, making "pot watching" unnecessary. Properly handled sweet potatoes should keep satisfactorily for two months or more in the kitchen. Store uncooked sweet potatoes at a temperature of 60 degrees F. or above—not in the refrigerator.

One pound of sweet potatoes provides 4 to 5 one-half cup servings.

FREEZING SWEET POTATOES

Use medium to large mature potatoes that have been cured. Wash and cook until almost tender in water, pressure saucepan or oven. Cool. Peel, cut in halves, slice or mash. To prevent whole sweet potatoes or slices from darkening, dip for five seconds in solution containing one tablespoon citric acid or one-half cup lemon juice to one quart of water. To keep mashed sweet potatoes from darkening, mix two tablespoons orange or lemon juice with each quart of mashed potatoes. Package and freeze immediately.

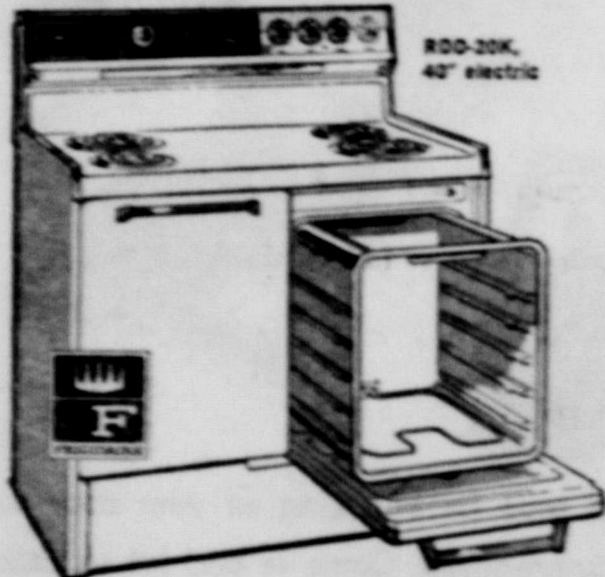

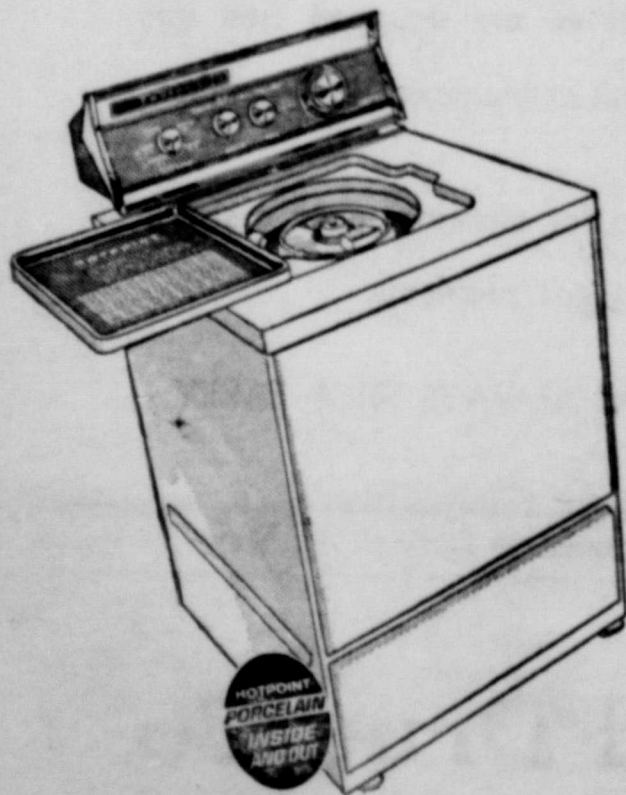

Mr. and Mrs. Carl King spent

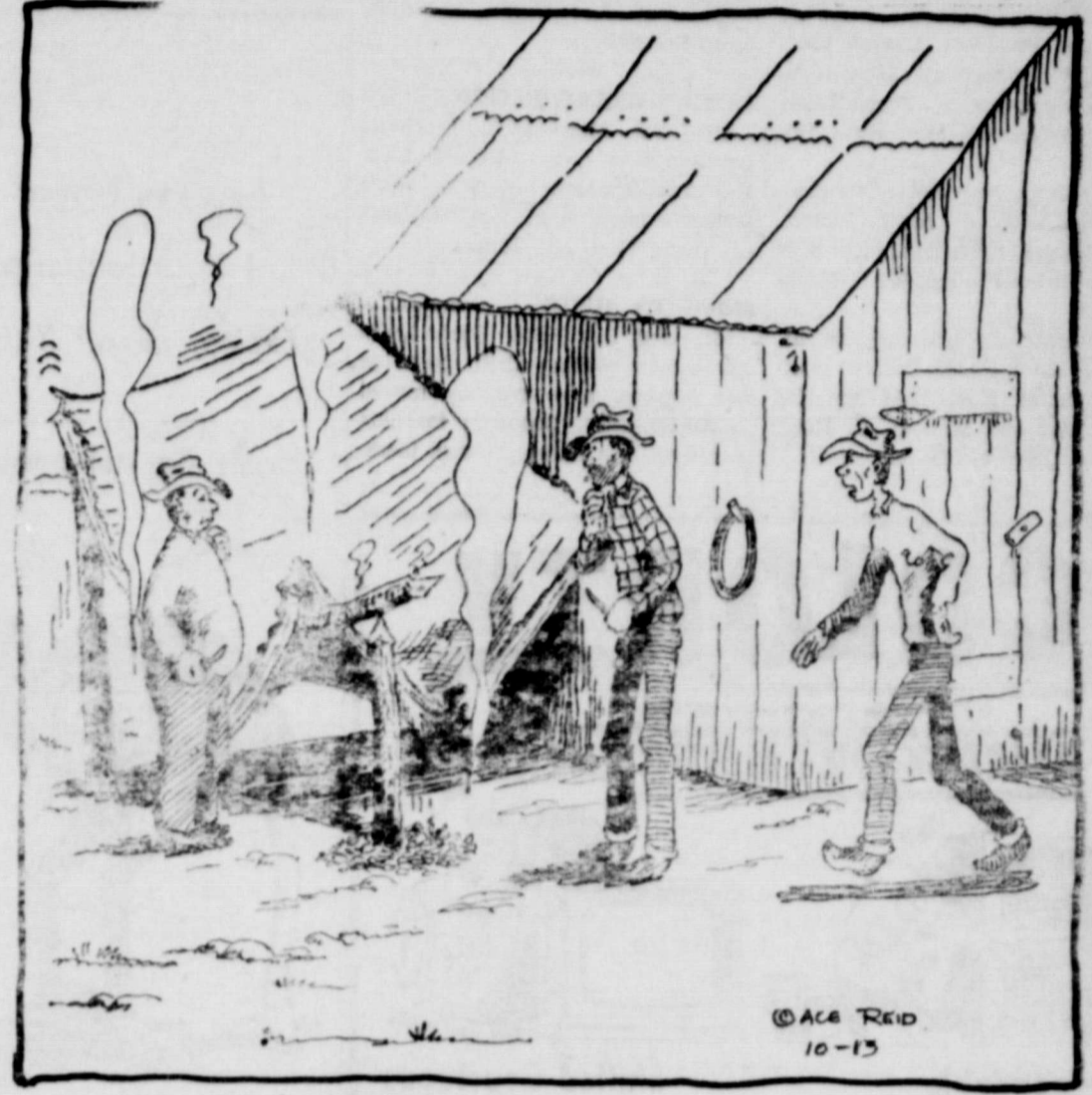
