Hico, Carlton Teachers Attend Homemaking Meeting at Dublin

Mrs. Jane Gleason and Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, homemaking teachers at Carlton and Hico, attended a group planning meeting for homemaking teachers of Comanche, Erath and Hamilton counties Tuesday evening, Nov. 5 at Dublin High School.

Mrs. Rosellen Davis, group chairman from Stephenville, assisted the group in planning innovations for their homemaking curriculum. The teachers analyzed an evaluation device compiled by Mrs. Sammie Pittman, Area IV Supervisor for Homemaking Education, to be used in evaluating each teacher's program at the close of the school year.

Eleven homemaking teachers attended the planning meeting.

Deadline For Destroying Cotton Stalks is November 30th

While most farmers in the area have already destroyed their cotton stalks and plowed under debris, many fields still have standing cotton stalks. Recent inspections of fields in this area show that a heavy boll weevil and pink bollworm infestation is present and is building up. These fields are producing large numbers of those insects to over-winter and infest next year's crop.

Entomologists in charge of the USDA Cotton Insect Laboratories urge all of Central Texas farmers to complete the cotton harvest as soon as possible and destroy stalks and plow under debris immediately thereafter. This can be the first step in reducing the number of such pests as the boll weevil and pink bollworm that would infest the 1969 crop. Stalk destruction destroys the food supply and stops the continuous breeding of these insects and will reduce the number that would over-winter.

Although the mandatory stalk destruction deadline is November 30 in the Central Texas counties, farmers are urged to do so as early as possible or immediately after completion of harvest and not wait until the last minute.

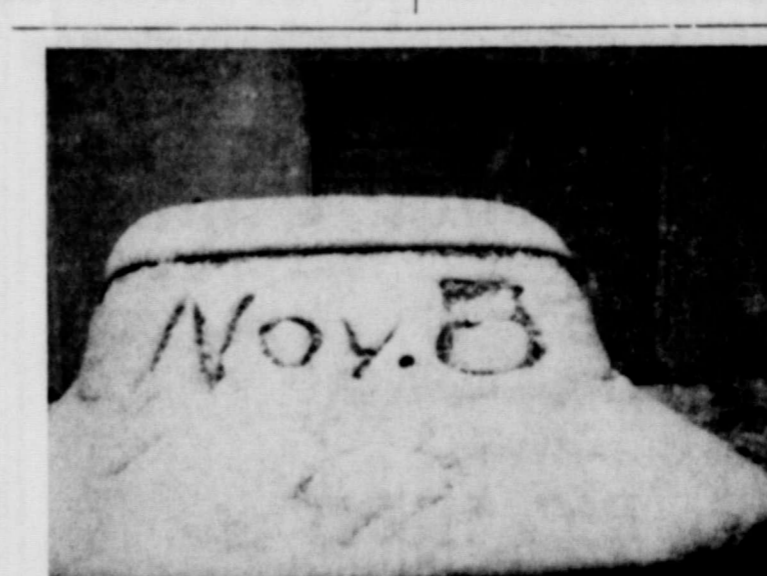
LOUIS HAZELWOOD RITES

Well we were really glad to be home again after a ten-day stay at Brady. We left our sister, Mrs. Myrtle Enger, as well as usual. She has been ill all this year. She was under heavy sedation when we arrived and looked awful bad. She has to be fed every bite she eats. When not under heavy sedation she is able to talk to us and friends some. The sedation was cut in half and she was doing much better and was able to talk to her daughter and I just before we left. The daughter thought she would have her taken to the nursing home this week, and she planned to go back to her job. However she would try and be with her mother at meal time and try and see that she is fed, as they don't have nurses to do this. The Brady hospital is a two-story structure and our sister has never been able to get a room on the first floor and it is work to climb those stairs several times a day.

On the Home Range

Versatile beef is a favorite choice of homemakers. Although each beef cut can vary in quality depending upon the carcass from which it came, all are nutritious and can provide good eating if properly prepared. The secret lies in suiting the cooking method to the grade and cut of meat selected. The grade most widely sold at retail is USDA Choice. Retailers have found customers like this grade best.

Regardless of quality grade, some cuts of meat are more tender than others. Cuts from the active muscles such as the shoulder, flank or round will be less tender than the cuts from the less-used muscles along the loin and rib sections. The more tender cuts which are in greatest demand make up only a small portion of the beef carcass.

Dry heat methods are used to cook the tender cuts; whereas, less tender cuts should be prepared by moist heat methods. Dry meat methods include broiling, roasting and grilling. Pot-roasting and braising are examples of moist heat cookery.

Meat spoils, especially ground beef, readily unless it is stored properly. Unless it is frozen, it should be used within 24 hours. Steaks and roasts may be kept two or three days in the refrigerator. Left-over cooked meat may be held in the refrigerator for four or five days without spoilage.

If fresh meat is to be kept more than three days, it should be frozen. Meat stored in the freezing compartment of a refrigerator may be kept up to 30 days. Beef stored in a food freezer may be kept 6-12 months. Frozen cooked meat should be used within two or three months. Do not re-freeze meat after it has

been thawed. . . . Is having too little time one of your biggest problems in meal preparation? The growing popularity of convenience foods in the past 15 years has helped solve this.

Meals prepared from convenience foods may cost up to one-third more per serving than foods prepared from home recipes or they may cost less. The average convenience food meal for four costs only 23 cents more than the home-prepared meal.

Some convenience foods actually are cheaper than the fresh forms because they are more compact to ship and store and have a longer shelf life.

Some of the products to be found to be more economical than the unserviced product include frozen orange juice concentrate, instant coffee and canned or frozen peas and beans.

Frozen dinners and desserts, ready-to-serve baked products, and other specialty items usually cost more than the same food completely prepared at home.

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

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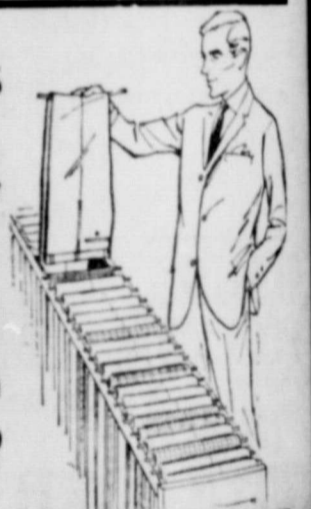

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

The end of the growing season is an ideal time for taking and getting soil samples tested. Don't wait until the spring rush of field work to do this important job.

Common tests are for PH, and for levels of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. In addition, suitable methods have been developed for testing for the micronutrient zinc.

Soil sample boxes, information sheets and tips on how to take soil samples are available at the County Agent's office. I would welcome the opportunity to discuss soil sampling and testing with interested persons.

The soil sample must be carefully taken if it is to reflect the actual plant food situation in a given field

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or pasture. Several samples must be a composite sample.

Each composite sheet should be numbered and the information sheet covering the field completely filled out. This information sheet is valuable to the soil scientist when he makes fertilizer recommendations.

By taking soil samples as soon as the crops are harvested, time can be saved and needed fertilizer can be applied when the soil is prepared for next spring's crop.

Fall or early winter application of fertilizer insures that it is out and ready when spring time rolls around. Last year Hamilton County farmers applied fertilizers because of rains, and failed to make a crop in an excellent crop year.

On most Hamilton County fertilizer can safely be used the land in the winter and be ready to plant as soon as weather will allow next year.
