Actually the big benefactor of this farm subsidy is not the farmer but the consumer. If the farmer was getting a fair price for his goods and his investment in accordance with other American industries and the government was not paying part of the food bill, can you imagine what your monthly food bill would be? I seriously doubt that you can.

Our efficient agriculture has almost been too efficient for its own good, but this efficiency has been the foundation of our economy and has helped Americans to have the highest level of living in the world.

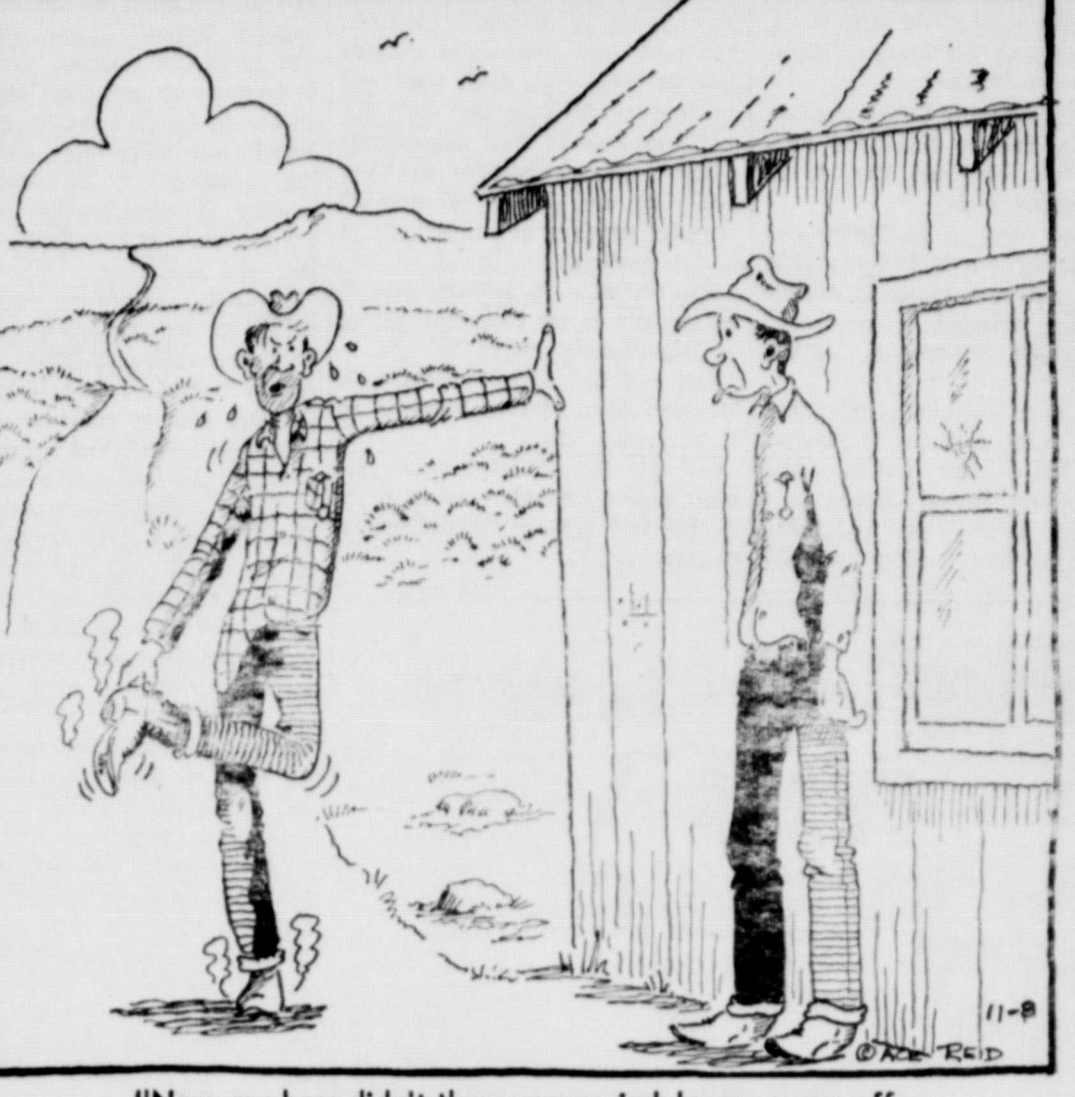

light toward the target. Just as I pressed the trigger, the great buck plunged forward about 20 feet, and fell motionless to the ground.

The maddening report of my heavy rifle seemed to crack in different directions, but as the big buck tumbled forward, I jumped up from my hiding place, and started in a run toward my prize. At the same instant, another man tumbled out of the brush on the opposite side of the clearing, and he too headed toward the fallen deer. Before my amazement had time to accept this man across the way, still another man came tearing out of the brush on my left, just offside the path the buck had come along so recently. We all three met face to face not near the center of the open area, and all were so startled on one spoke for several moments.
