Miss Reynolds' entry, a lined wool cape and skirt, was the first place entry in the Junior Division of District VIII. The contest was held on the campus of Mary Hardin-Baylor College, and was directed by Dr. Edna Lee Capps and involved participants from 21 counties in the Central Texas area.

## Senior Writer Visualizes 'Harvest House' for Elderly

Recently it was my pleasure to visit the Harvest House in Temple along with a dozen other interested parties from West Texas towns.

Mrs. Mildred Anderson, Coordinator for the Senior Citizen Survey, embracing Hamilton, Bosque, Mills and Erath counties, with headquarters in Hamilton, Mrs. Fred McCleskey of Stephenville, Mrs. Karnes of Pottsville, and myself composed one group representing the counties mentioned.

The Harvest House is a modern brick center in the Temple residential area, and is a center designed solely for the elderly. You can't join unless you are 60 years of age or older. Membership now total: more than 1200, and a fee of one dollar per year is charged.

The Harvest House is a place to go and a place where there is always something happening. It is a very busy place.

The program seems to lift them—the elderly—out of dejection and moodiness. It gives them something to get up and get dressed for. Without a definite place to go, or something to do, they get the feeling they are no longer useful and have nothing to contribute.

These people come from across the street in the Autumn Leaves Public Housing units, others from various parts of Temple and throughout the county. Numerous people have moved to Temple to retire and purchased property near the Center.

One of the biggest drawing events

on the many ways of fraud and swindle and how to respond should they be confronted by one of the con men.

Free bus service is provided to members who do not drive or are too old to drive. The oldest member of the center is 92 years.

Free tours of points of interest are provided, and include places within 100 miles of the Center, including San Marcos, New Braunfels, Salado and others.

The center was financed without solicitation. A Government program known as "Older American Act" provides for a great deal of the expense, especially serving the daily meals. The national financial support amounts to about 30 percent of the total cost of maintenance with the balance of expense derived from voluntary contributions such as local clubs, churches, City Government, and others.

The entire project is a grand success and is something that Temple is proud of. Other Harvest Clubs will spring to life in neighboring towns and at Waco and Stephenville such places are now in operation.

With Hico's acquisition of the old railroad property within the City Limits, which includes the depot, which is scheduled to be remodeled and used as a community house, and with the probability of a number of low rent housing units to be erected in Hico, we will have the advantage over other towns and could very easily provide a Harvest House Club for our elderly which, according to the present survey, number more than 400.
