So Judging Team Finishes 11th in National Meet

WILLIAM C. STEARMAN, FFA Chapter's range and judging team, Rickie Jag-son, Christian, Lee Ramage, William Stearman, accompan-ied by their advisor, Harold Walker, participated in the National Range and Pasture Contest at Oklahoma City last week, against 800 boys from 40 states and one foreign country.

Team arrived in Oklahoma Monday. Following a dinner, the team ate lunch at the rest of the afternoon for the Range and Pasture Contest was to be held on Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. The team at the land judging school from 11 a.m., and the pasture judging school from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. They learned very much about the Oklahoma contest which differed from the Texas contest. The team

returned to their motel for their own study session from 8:30 until 10:30 p.m. They awoke the next morning to do some more studying from 9 to 11 a.m. on some grass sights. They attended the Range and Pasture Contest at 1:30 on Thursday, and placed ninth in the National-International Contest. Oklahoma had the placings from one to seven, and Forestburg, Texas was eighth, winning the out of state trophy. Forestburg had a score of 635 and Hico a score of 620. Mr. Walker attended the adult contest and was fifth high individual in Adult National-International.

The team took Lee Ramage to the Will Rogers Airport to catch his plane so that he could play in the State Golf Meet in Austin. On Friday morning the team visited the National Cowboy Hall of Fame and enjoyed it very much. The visit was very educational, as was the Range and Pasture Contest.

Saturday Balloting Set On City Sales Tax Issue

Hico is expected to join the hundreds of other municipalities over Texas in collecting a one-percent Sales and Use Tax when voters go to the polls this Saturday to decide the issue.

The vote was called by City Council in a special session April 10.

Since announcement of the election, little or no "talk" has been heard either for or against such a tax, and one must assume that opposition is at a low level.

The special election was called after officials found that the city needed more money for

improvements and general maintenance. The vote was called under a provision of the 60th Legislature which authorized municipalities to collect the tax upon approval of the people.

Since the go-ahead was given by the state governing body, 353 cities have adopted the tax, which is more than 80 percent of all towns in Texas.

Commenting on the Saturday election, Mayor O. L. Davis said that to keep abreast of needed improvements, the council had only two things to consider—to either raise taxes or vote the sales tax measure. He

pointed out that Hico was no different from any other small community, and rising costs of maintenance and a growing need for a continuous improvement program were the main reasons for the called election.

A rough estimate of funds to be derived from such a tax, if passed, ranged from six to eight thousand dollars per year. However, the figure could be deceiving as Hico is a trade center for a wide area, and local merchants do a large volume of business each year. Some estimates have ranged as high as \$12,000 annually. For instance, Meridian, a town of similar size to Hico, collected

\$2,000.00 for the fourth quarter of 1968.

Hico is one of the last cities in this area to vote on the proposition, as Stephenville, Dublin, Hamilton, Meridian, Clifton, and other towns in the immediate area have passed the tax measure, and are now collecting the one percent.

Should the vote carry Saturday, residents will have a four-month reprieve from paying the tax, as it will not go into affect until October 1.

J. R. Bobo will be election judge, and people eligible to vote are those who reside within the city limits, and have a voter registration certificate.

Lone Star Gas Co. Seeks Gate Charge Increase From RRC

Austin (Spl.) — Lone Star Gas Company has filed with the Texas Railroad Commission an application for an increase in the intra-company gate charge for residential, commercial and distribution unaccounted for gas.

The company asked an increase from the present gate charge of 35.4 cents per thousand cubic feet of gas to 44.8 cents per thousand cubic feet.

When the Railroad Commission establishes the new intra-company gate charge, specific computations will be made for each Texas town. In those towns where earnings are deemed inadequate, individual rate action will be pursued with each town's ruling body.

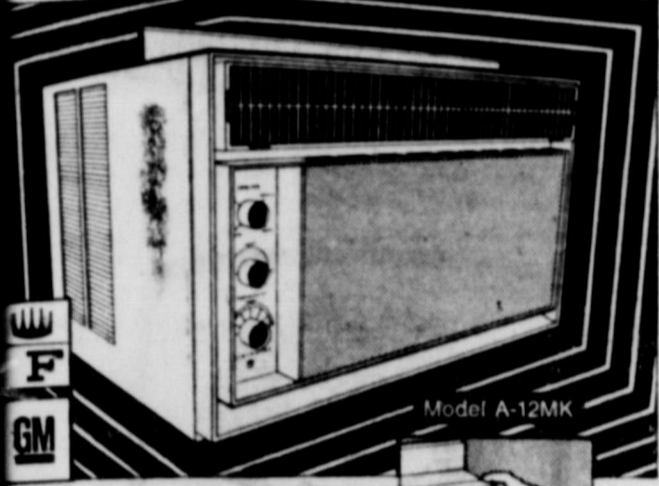

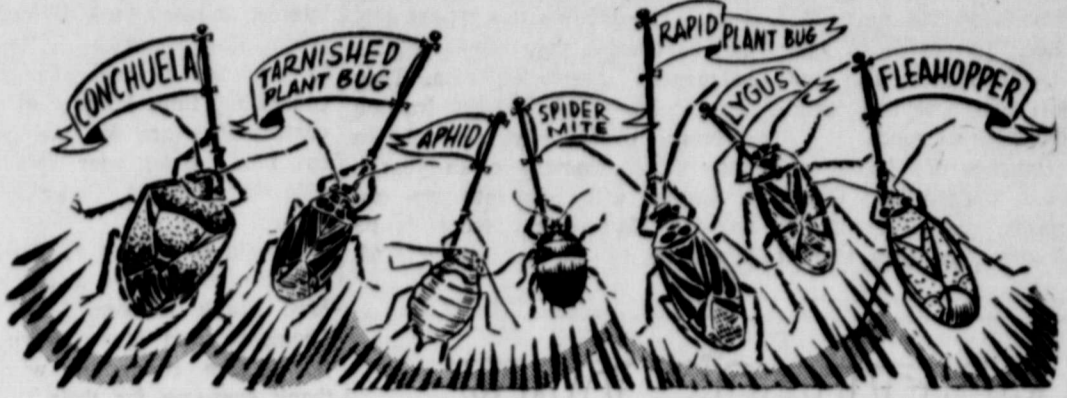

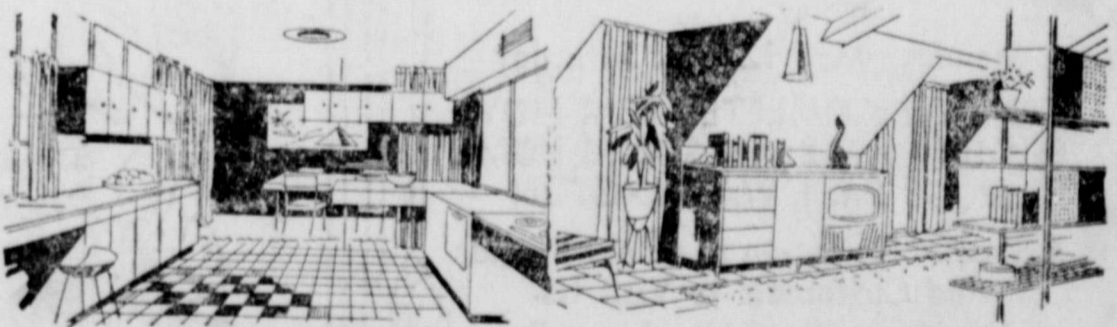

For those of you who receive Hydrangeas as gifts, keep them out of direct sun and water well. It is best to water plants twice a day or submerge in a pan of water daily and soak 15 or 20 minutes, then take out and drain. After plant has finished blooming, cut blossoms off and plant in a shaded area (north side of house). These plants are resistant to cold weather, but like all other plants, they need plant food occasionally.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition. The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR3)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding twelve dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition. The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR5)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

(3) Needy blind persons;

(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to

the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is authorized to modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition.

The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

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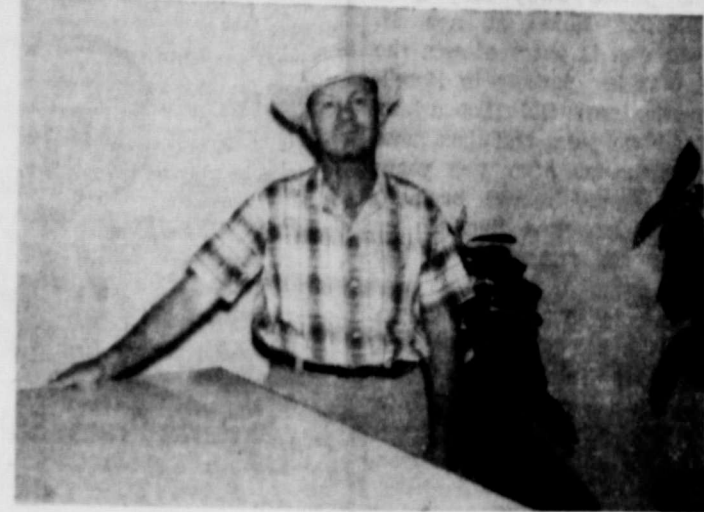
