Commenting on the Saturday election, Mayor O. L. Davis said that to keep abreast of needed improvements, the council had only two things to consider-to either raise taxes or vote the sales tax measure. He

pointed out that Hico was no different from any other small community, and rising costs of maintenance and a growing need for a continuous improvement program were the main reasons for the called election.

A rough estimate of funds to be derived from such a tax. if passed, ranged from six to eight thousand dollars per year. However, the figure could be deceiving as Hico is a trade center for a wide area, and local merchants do a large volume of business each year. Some estimates have ranged as high is \$12,000 annually. For instance, Meridian, a town of similar size to Hico, collected \$2,090.00 for the fourth quarter

Hico is one of the last cities in this area to vote on the proposition, as Stephenville, Dublin. Hamilton. Meridian. Clifton, and other towns in the immediate area have passed the tax measure, and are now collecting the one percent.

Should the vote carry Saturday, residents will have a fourmonth reprive from paying the tax, as it will not go into affect until October 1.

It is best to water plants twice a day or submerge in a pan of water daily and soak 15 or 20 minutes, then take out and drain. 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




