With the U.S. Combat Air Force, Vietnam-Lt. Col. Louis I. Lawrence, whose wife, Frances, is the daughter of C. M. Langham of Hico has been decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross for air action in Southeast Asia.

Col. Lawrence, a B-57 Canberra navigator-bombardier at Phan Rang AFB, Vietnam, flew a night armed reconnaissance mission against a heavily defended enemy truck convoy carrying supplies to enemy forces. Despite intense anti-aircraft fire, mountainous terrain and adverse weather conditions, he destroved four trucks, caused six large secondary explosions, four small explosions and started ten secondary fires.

The Colonel is in a unit of the Pacific Air Forces, and is a veteran of World War II and the Korean War.
