Says Ft. Worth DA Secretary

No Crime in Hico

(Following is a feature concerning Janell Ogle of Fort Worth, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Ogle, that will be of interest to local readers. The feature appeared in Saturday's Fort Worth Star-Telegram.)

Driving to work one morning Miss Janell Ogle glanced in her rear-view mirror and saw a police car signaling her to pull off the road.

She did, but when the policeman walked to her car she began protesting that she hadn't been speeding.

The officer agreed. He only wanted to know about a criminal case being handled by the district attorney's office.

Miss Ogle, 24, was a good person to ask. She has been a fixture in the DA's office nearly five years. She started work under the administration of former Dist. Atty. Doug Crouch.

A native of Hico (Pop. 1020), Miss Ogle sometimes found the world of crime and criminals hard to believe.

"There was no crime in Hico," she said.

"There were a bunch of offenses I'd never heard of before."

And she felt sorry for many of the criminals.

"I used to apply every case to myself and think 'what would I do in a case like this,'" she said.

"I'd hate to be locked up," she added. "But then there are a lot of these people I'd hate to see out on the streets."

After five years, Miss Ogle has learned not to worry about most cases after she goes home. The one exception is a child-beating case.

"I'll go home at night and wonder what will ever happen to that poor kid."

For more than a year, Miss Ogle has been secretary to Dist. Atty. Frank Coffey—a complicated, demanding job never before given to anyone as young as Miss Ogle.

Her job involves general office work, supervising and hiring other secretaries in the office, serving as a matron to female prisoners and a myriad of other duties.

One day she'll do nothing but ordinary office work. The next she'll "be at some unheard of place taking a statement" from

a witness in a case.

"I'm on call 24 hours a day," she added.

Sometimes she is summoned at odd hours to come to the office at the Criminal Courts Building to take a statement.

"I've had dates sitting at my apartment and just had to leave them," she said. "I've dated people that found it a little hard to comprehend."

Once she was given 30 minutes notice that she was going to Hidalgo County to work on a big murder case. In that 30 minutes she had to pack for a month's stay.

But she's easy-going and takes most of her job in stride.

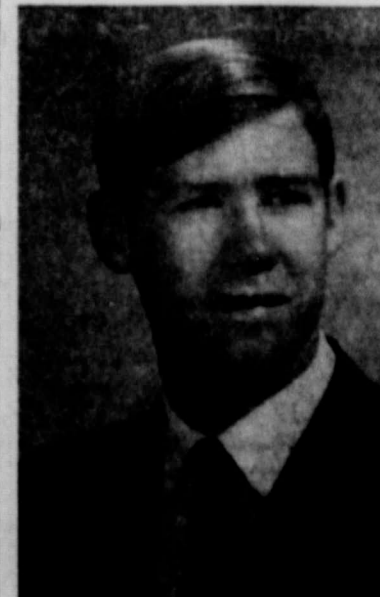
"I can't think of anyone I'd trade with," Miss Ogle said.

The one thing that bothers her are phone calls from irate persons.

Frequently, she is taken to task for something she knows nothing about, and she admits she sometimes has trouble controlling her temper.

Occasionally, she worries about the small margin of error allowed by her job.

"Anything you do affects somebody's life here," she said.

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C.—A question often asked is "What would happen to our economy should 'peace break out'?" It is a good question, and, of course, one to which thought and study has been devoted by responsible governmental agencies.

From these sources, together with some economists and political leaders it is the general opinion that the demands on some programs such as urban renewal, housing, highway buildings and the like, would in a short time, about fill the gap if spending was provided for these purposes. More important, at least for the immediate years following cessation of hostilities in Southeast Asia, is the refurbishing of our military machinery.

In many categories we have depleted surplus military material which must be replaced. Supplies, training and equipment of our Armed Forces would likely continue at a high rate, even if at a slower pace, should hostilities suddenly end.

From the economic standpoint this is important to our State of Texas. Our state is the second largest recipient of Government spending in the nation. According to Mr. Walter B. Moore, Editor of the Texas Almanac, U. S. spending in Texas totaled \$12,019,066,463 in the fiscal year ending last June 30th. It is the biggest business in our state.

Defense spending of \$6,064,962,000 in the year 1967-68 amounts to approximately one-half the total according to Mr. Moore's research. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare ranked next with an expenditure of \$1,751,000 (in round figures).

There is no comparison that any industry as a whole is near the Government when it comes to supporting our Texas economy.

Based on this arithmetic, the United States Government is spending around \$1,000 per head in our state. Although accurate estimates are a little elusive, Texans pay something like \$6 billion to the Federal Government in taxes. The state's income actually depends more on grants from Washington than upon any single state tax. So, in the economy as a whole, twice as much is spent in the State by the Federal Government than is collected in taxes.

In road building the various programs of aid and welfare, in education and many other activities, Texas shares well in total expenditures by the Federal Government.

As is clear, military expenditures maintain conditions conducive to continued expansion of our industrial base. A looming factor is the need for an adequate water supply which may be the key to the future of our state's economy. In this balance of our economic needs, a careful look-see must be given to the major facets of our economy: namely industry, agriculture, military and national defense activity. A stable labor situation will continue to be a great influence on the total outlook.

These are not the total assets to be offered by our citizens but enough to not only attract defense contracts and military installations but also private industry which must be looked to for the long range future.

This situation is on the mind and under consideration of not only officials of the Federal Government but by our state leaders to is the large item. There is a rea-

son for it, which is not always as political as we are often accused by other areas of the country. First, we have natural resources to support these activities. Second, we have a favorable climate, both weatherwise and in attitude influencing industry to locate in the state. Next, but not least, we have comparative stability in the labor market. Lastly, but not conclusive, there is "elbow room" and opportunity to expand.
