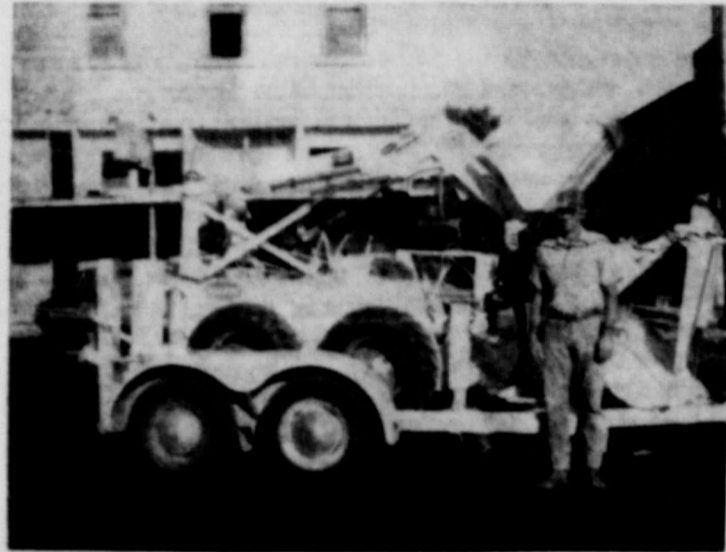

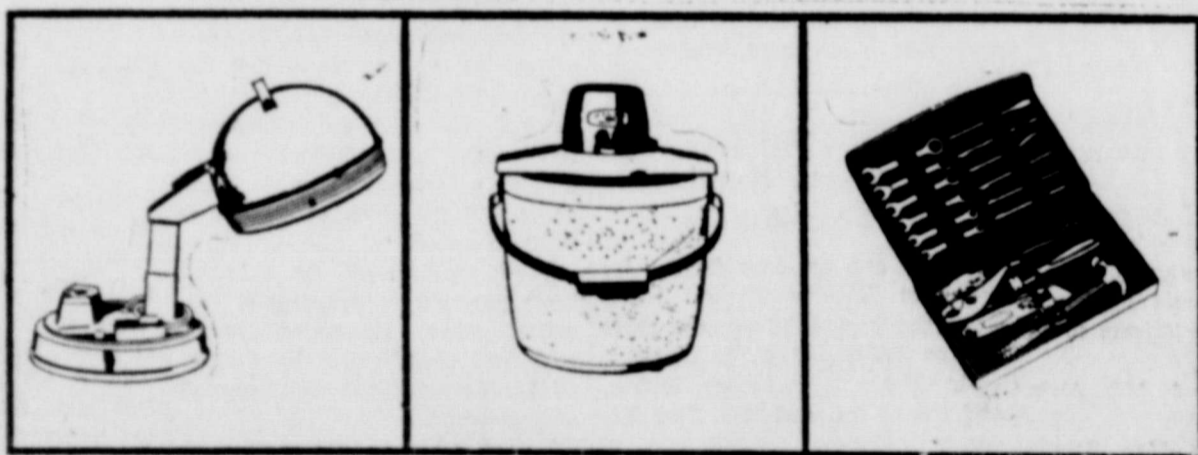

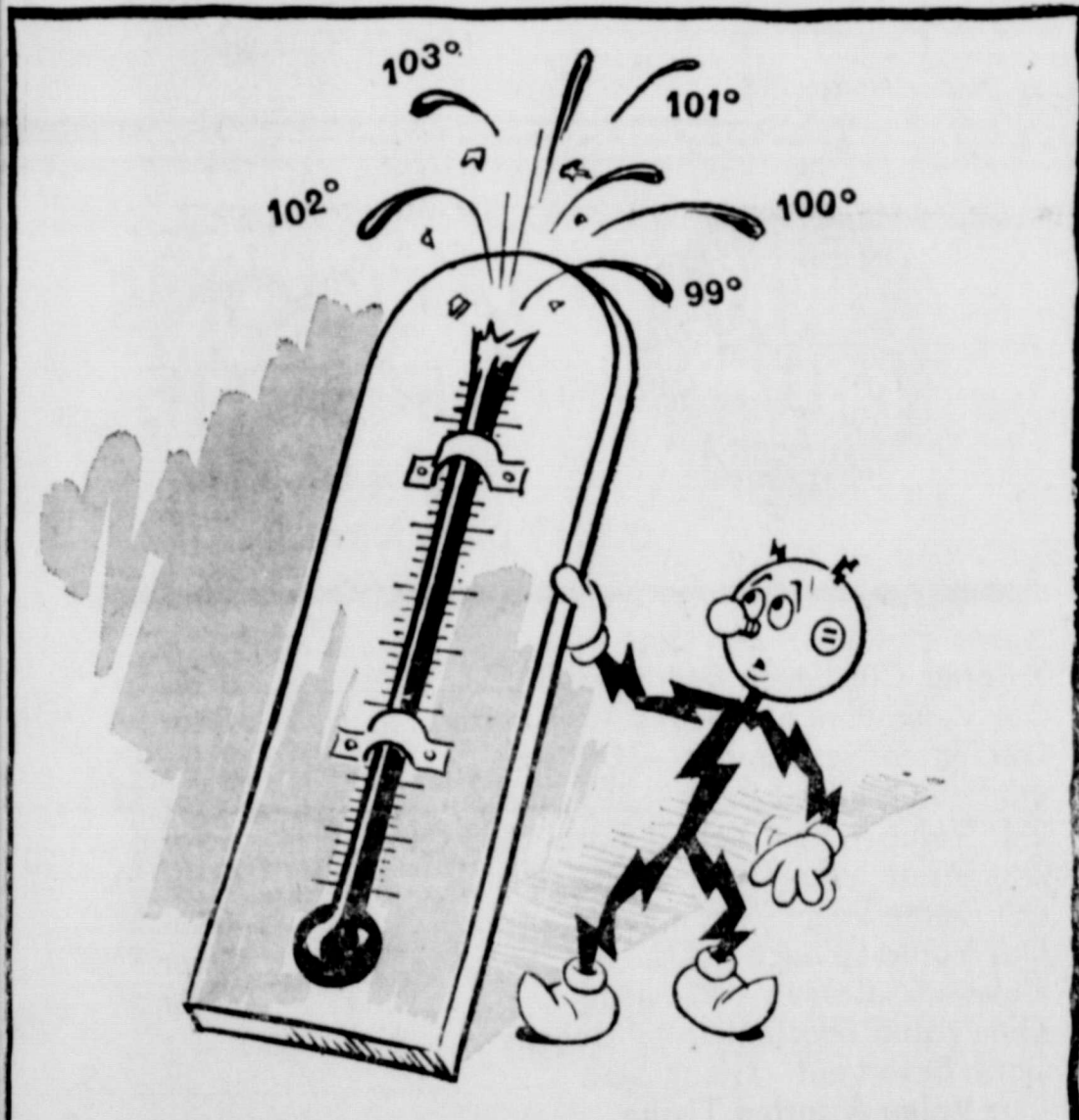
Work was resumed at the cemetery Monday, although looking quite rainy. We hope to get it completed.

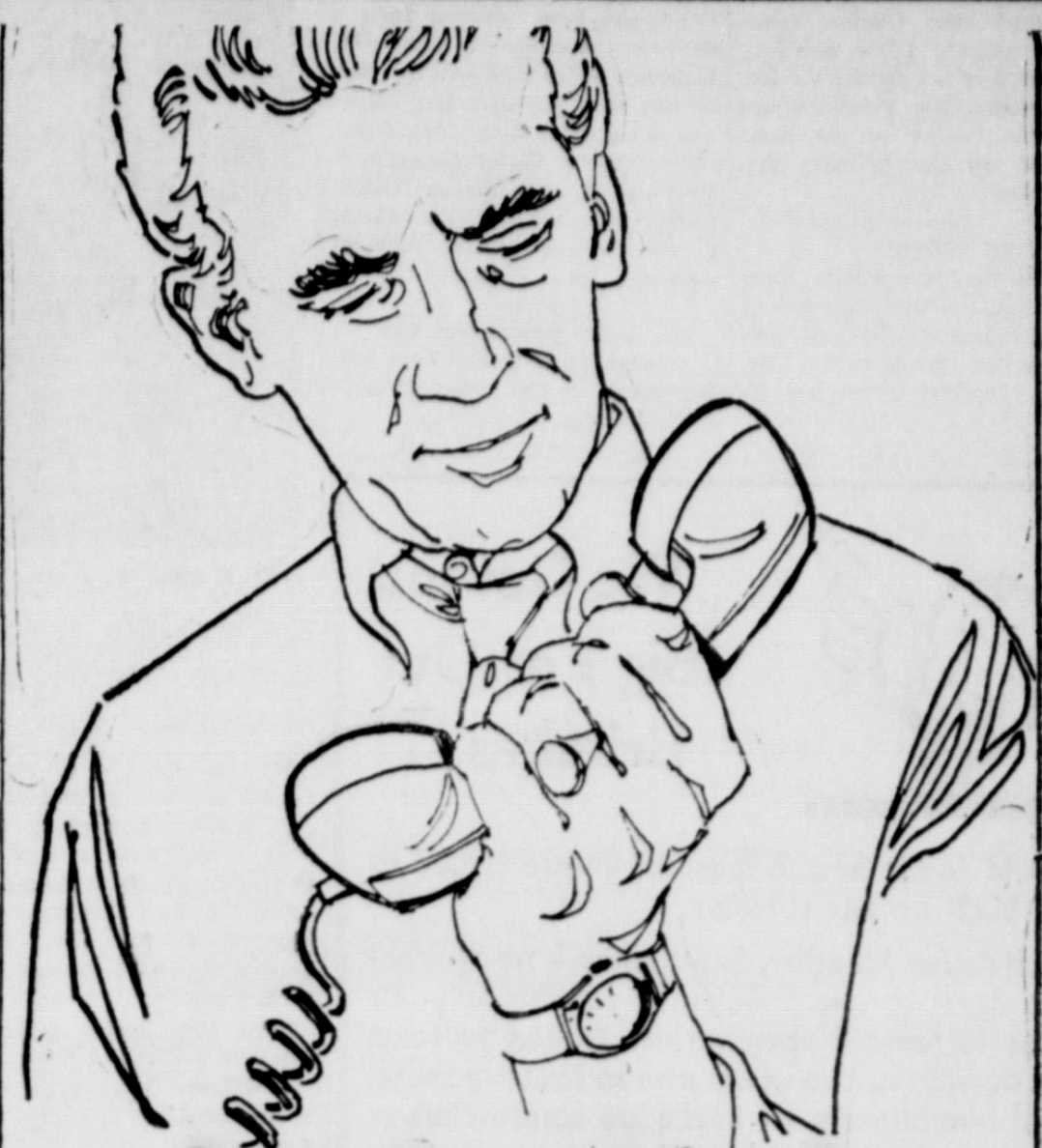

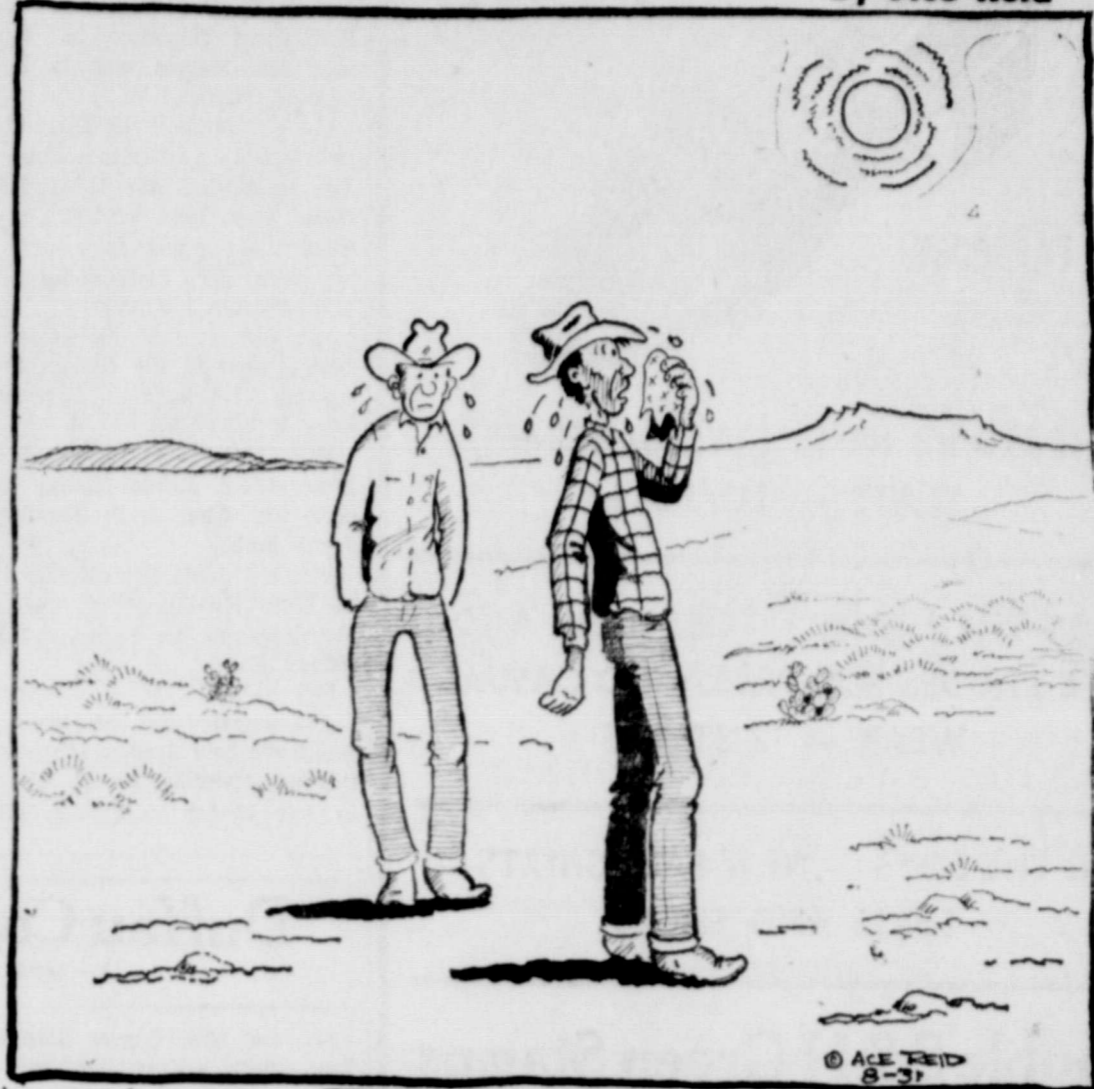

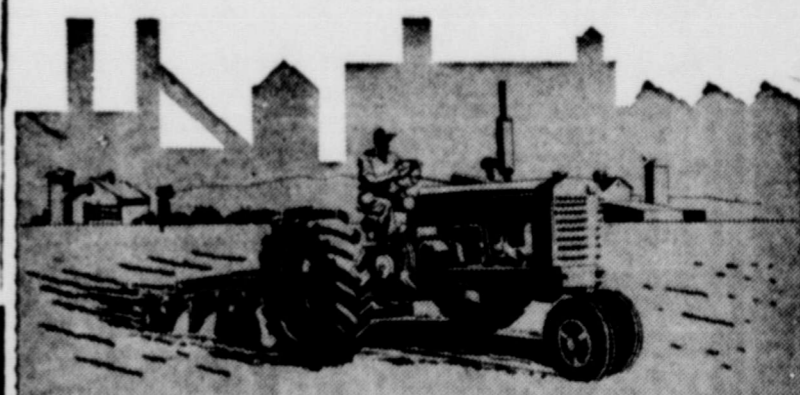
