Tigers Seek 2nd Win at Godley

A week of rest following a successful season opener, the Tigers will journey to Johnson Friday night to do battle with the Godley Wildcats. The Wildcats have two games on their belts, and should be a tough opponent for the locals. After a 54-0 washing from the Meridian Wildcats in the opener, the Tigers got all their marbles together last Friday night and scored a 50-6 loss on Class A Godley. Hico's opponent for the Friday game is Johnson.

Meridian game they showed a very definite weakness, and then looked very strong in last week's shocker of Grandview. The team is practically the same as the one that Hico shot down by a 38-0 count last year, and an all-out effort will be needed for the Tigers to bring home win No. 2.

Open House Slated Sunday Afternoon at Village Nursing Home

Village Nursing Home, Hico's newest care facility, has scheduled open house this Sunday afternoon from 2 until 4 o'clock. The ultra-modern home was completed recently, with first patients moved there the first of this month.

Mrs. Louise Rushing, administrator and co-owner, and Geo. Barron, the other owner, have issued an invitation to everyone in this area to attend the open house and view the new facilities.

The home is located on property at the western edge of town, along the old railroad right-of-way.

Containing 23 patient rooms, the home has been equipped with the latest equipment, and

features semi-private baths. Original plans for the new home called for a 47-bed facility, and Mrs. Rushing and Mr. Barron said this week that plans had been approved for the additional 24-bed wing, and that construction would start in the near future.

Mr. Barron is also owner of the original Hico Nursing Home acquired by the facility from Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Payne in 1966. The home contains 50 beds.

No program has been planned for the Sunday open house, but the owners said that guided tours would be conducted throughout the afternoon, and the Candy Strippers, local high school FHA'ers, would serve refreshments to visitors.

City Sales Tax Starts Here Wednesday

Hico joins over 350 other towns over the state next Wednesday, October 1, in collecting a one-percent city sales tax.

Local voters approved the additional tax in a special election held last May 10. Under law, the approval becomes effective in the second quarter after a vote of the people.

The one percent will be tacked onto the present three percent which goes to the state, plus another one-quarter of one percent added by the special session of the Legislature. That all adds up to 4 and one-quarter percent that merchants must collect for their goods.

Money derived from the local sales tax is expected to run between \$8 and \$10 thousand dollars annually, according to estimates by city officials, and will be used for general improvements.

Registration at 2,660 Record High at Tarleton

Stephenville (Spl.)—Final registration figures at Tarleton State College reached a record 2,660, according to figures released by the Registrar's office.

The final total represents an 8.2 percent increase over last year's 2,458.

Largest gain, and one which pleased TSC officials most, was in the senior class. This group increased from 402 in 1968 to 494. Another large gain was in the junior class, from 451 to 500. Registrar John Whiting noted that these increases represented the increased holding power of the school once a student completes his sophomore year.

Sophomore class had the lowest increase, rising from 584 to 587. The freshmen increased from 978 to 1,042. Special students, those taking less than 12 semester hours, fell from 42 to 37.
