Let me put in a word of caution at this point. When purchasing seed make sure you are getting the genuine article. Make sure you specify TAM Wintergreen Hardingrass or Kleingrass 75. These two grasses have been selected and proven over the years to be drouth resistant and cold resistant under our climatic

I am afraid some people in the county have bought imported Kleingrass and Hardingrass. It can be purchased for about one-half the cost of the improved varieties but you generally get what you pay for.

and too late to plan how to fight it. The time to do the planning and training of family members is when there is no fire to fight

How well are you prepared to fight fire or hold it in check until help arrives? Are you familiar with the location of fire departments which are available in the county? Valuable time is sometimes lost in getting in touch with the nearest department and such loss could mean the difference in saving the property or its complete loss. It's a good idea to have equipment available, including tools, for fire fighting but perhaps equally important is to have one or more persons who know how to use the

Perhaps the most important tool is a fire extinguisher. Make sure it is adequate in size and filled with the proper chemical to fight the kind of fire expected. Look for the "UL" or "FM" label of approval on extinguishers before they are purchased. These letters on the extinguisher means that it has been

Extinguishers should be strategically placed in all fire danger areas, including the kitchen, barns, machine sheds, and near the storage tanks for gasoline and oil. Remember also that different chemicals are required for different types of fires. Make sure the extinguisher is always in top operating condition by regular checks and keeping

#### ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT AN OFFENSE FOR THE OWNER OR OPERATOR OF ANY MOTOR VEHICLE, AUTOMOBILE OR OTHER TYPE OF CONVEY-ANCE TO LEAVE SAME PLAC-ED, STANDING OR PARKED OR IN ANY MANNER UNATTEND-ED FOR MORE THAN SEVEN TY-TWO CONSECUTIVE HOURS IN OR ON ANY PUBLIC STREET, ALLEY, SIDEWALK, PARK, OR OTHER PLACE OF THE CITY OF HICO, PROVID-ING PENALTY AND DECLAR-ING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF

Any owner or operator or other hicle, automobile, or other type of conveyance who shall place or leave same standing, parked or in continuous hours shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon and each day that same continues after expiration of said continuous period seventy-two hours shall constitute a separate offense.

Section Two
