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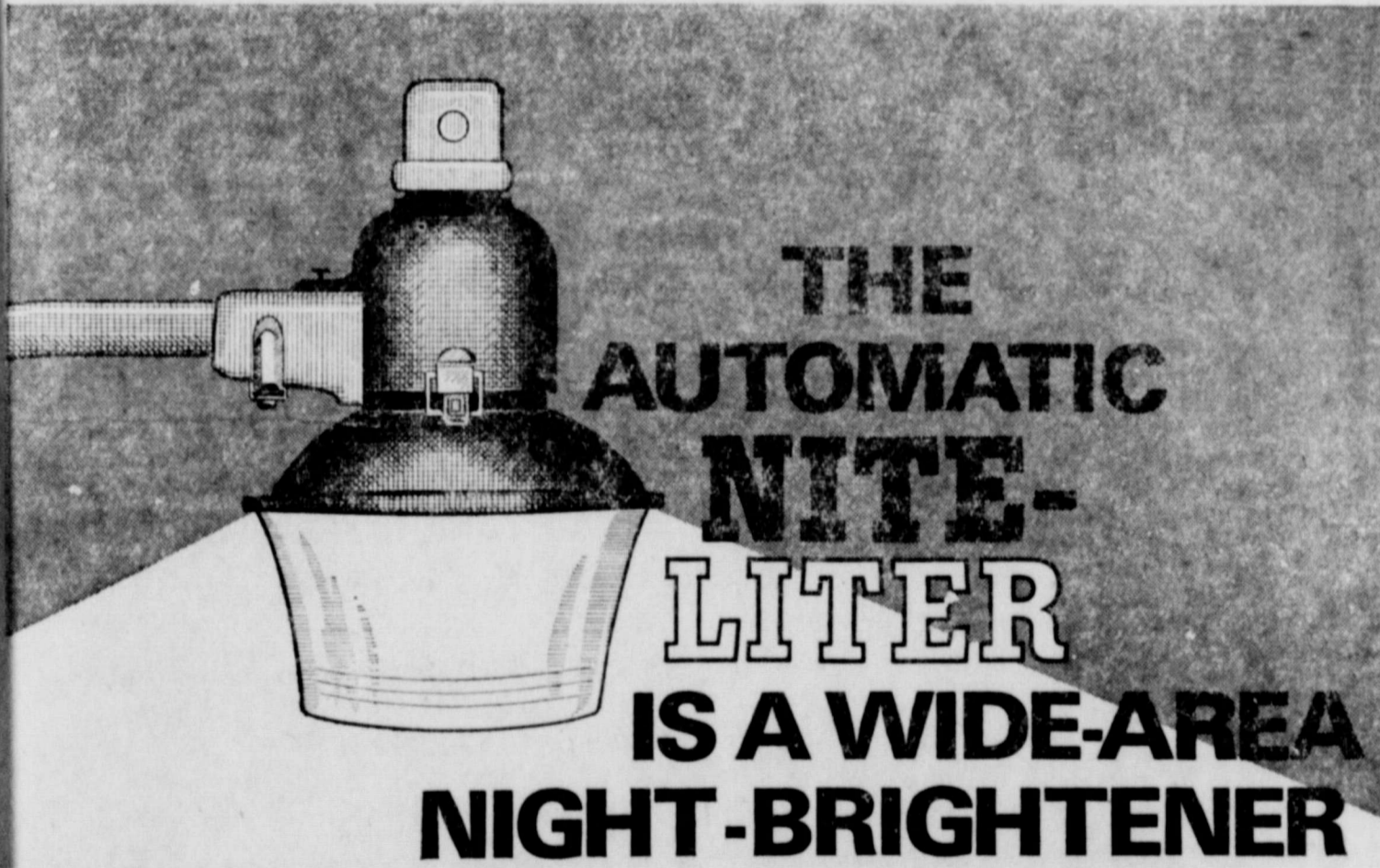
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# A Look at the Past

### COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

A Swine Clinic for Hamilton-Coryell swine producers will be held February 2 at 9:30 a.m. in the Civic Room of the National Bank in Gatesville.

W. B. Thomas, Swine Specialist with the Extension Service, will be in charge of the meeting. Items to be discussed include swine management, diseases, sanitation, equipment and recent research information.

Many swine producers from the county attended a similar meeting last year, and anyone interested is encouraged to participate in the 1970 version of the meeting.

Nitrogen top dress time for small grains is here. The top dressing season is beginning with adequate soil moisture, in fact

excess moisture may hamper this operation. Good moisture means that a good response to added nitrogen may be expected.

If small grains were planted early and grazed, it is reasonable to expect that all of the preplant nitrogen has been used by the crop. Chemical analysis of highly fertilized oats in the fall of 1969 showed that this crop contained 2.50 percent nitrogen (21.57 percent protein). At this concentration each ton of forage would remove 70 pounds of nitrogen.

Because maximum profits can be obtained only by producing high yields of high quality product, grain or forage, nitrogen top dressing of small grains is a must.

Top dress small grains in January or February with 30-50 pounds of nitrogen per acre depending upon the condition of the crop, previous fertilization, and variety being grown. In cases where the entire crop is to be used as forage, higher rates may be necessary.

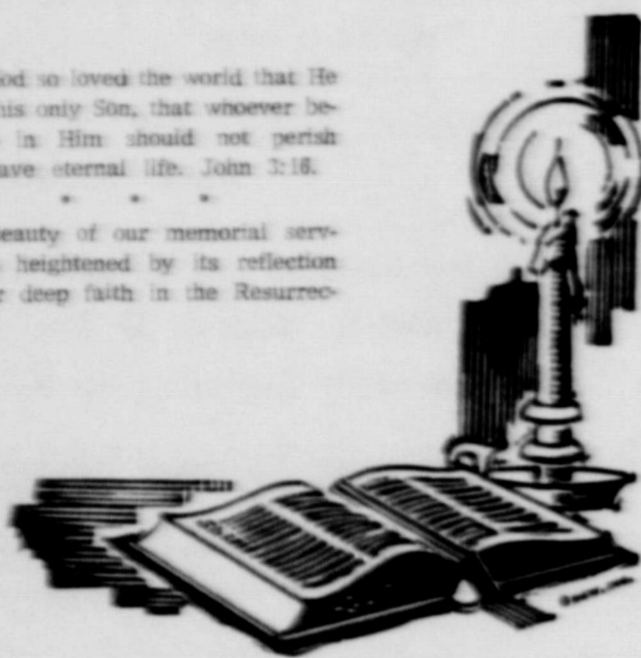

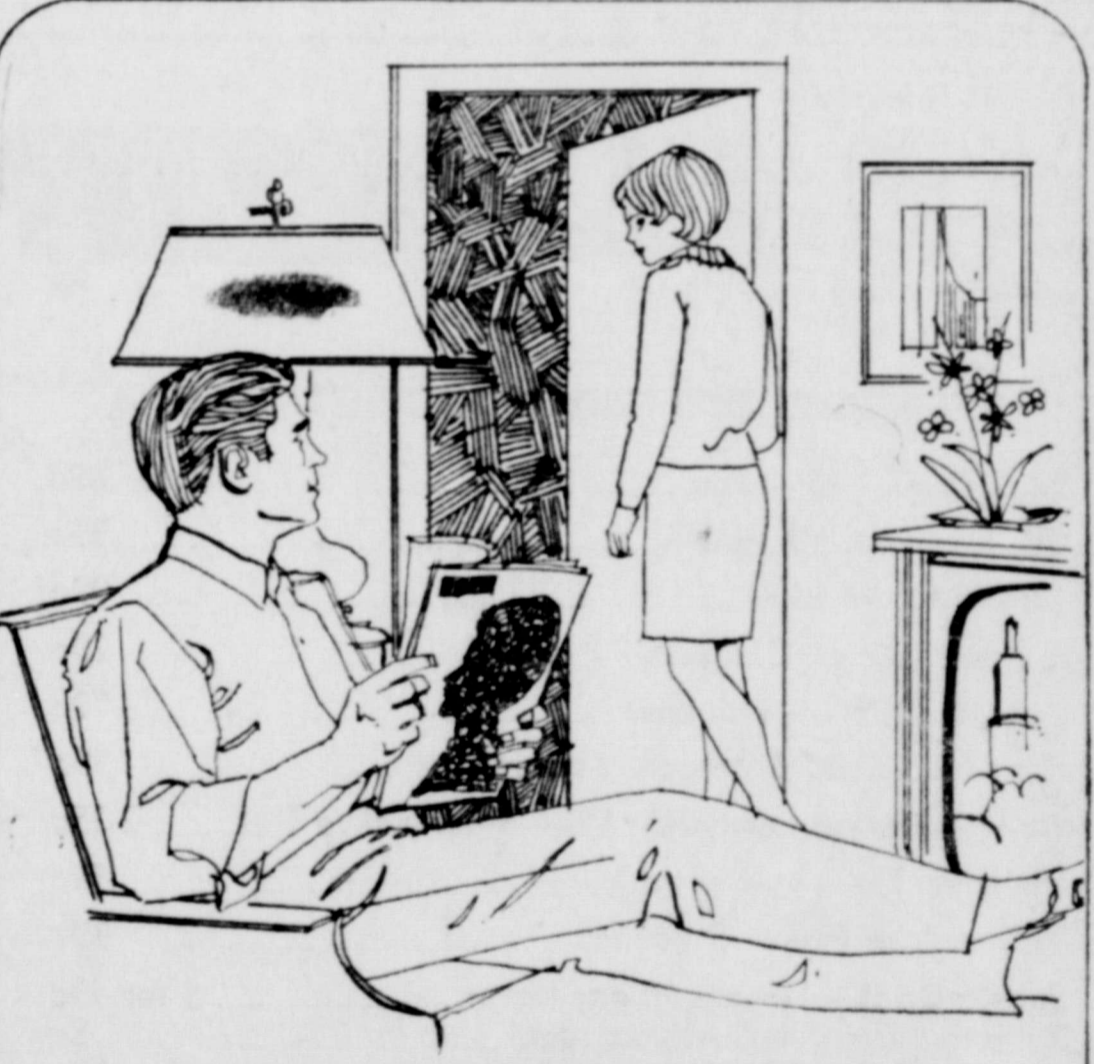

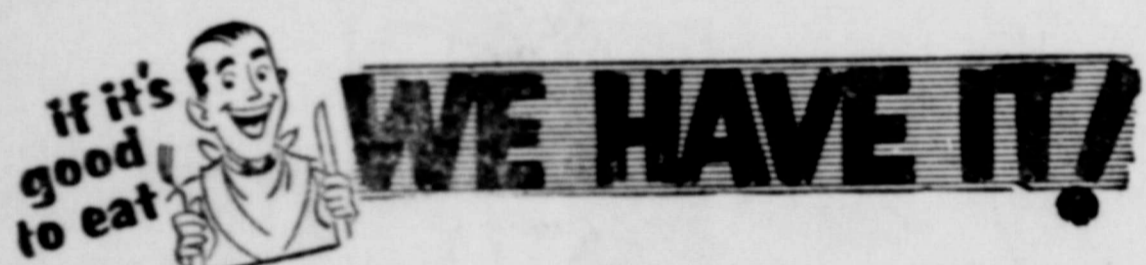
