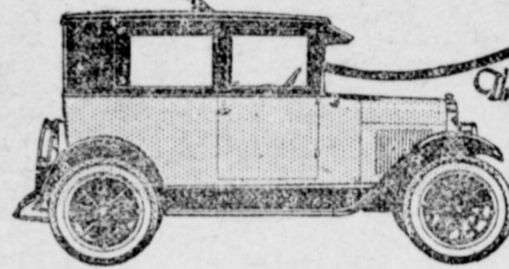

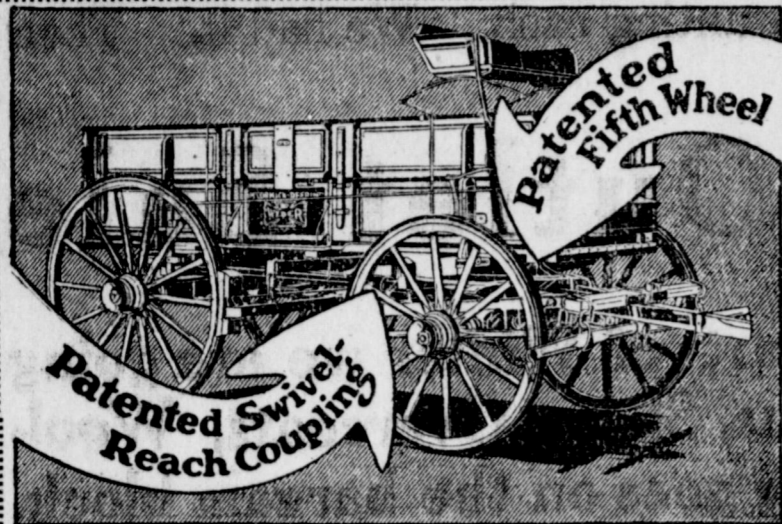

ORDINANCE NO. 1

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Muleshoe: Section 1.

That it shall hereinafter be unlawful for any person to allow or permit any cow, calf, steer, bull, bullock or heifer or any sheep, goat or hog or any horse, mare, colt, mule or jennet, owned or controlled by it, him or her to run at large or to be herded in or upon any street or alley and in and upon any enclosed vacant lot within the corporate limits of the City or be staked out any of the animals about mentioned upon any enclosed lot so that such animal so staked can cross over any street, alley and sidewalk in the City.

Section 2.

Any person who shall allow or permit any animals mentioned in Section 1 of this article owned by him, her or them or under his, her or their control, to run at large, to be herded in or upon any street or alley of this City or in and upon any enclosed vacant lot within the corporate limits of the City or stake out any of the animals mentioned herein upon any enclosed lot so that such animal so staked out can cross over any street, alley or sidewalk of this City shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction therefor, be fined in any sum not exceeding \$50.00.

ORDINANCE NO. 2

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Muleshoe: Section 1.

The following shall constitute

nuisance when allowed, maintained or suffered to exist within the corporate limits of the City of Muleshoe, and shall be punishable as hereinafter provided.

Section 2.
All the yards, lots, alleys, stables, pens, cellars, vaults, drains, pool, wells, cisterns, privies, sewers, grounds, premises or buildings of any character, which are not kept free of dead carcasses, decaying flesh, fowls, vegetables, stagnant water, or other stagnant liquids, slops, trash, rubbish, or other deposits or substances of any and every character, which are likely to or do become unwholesome, filthy, offensive, unhealthful or likely to create or engender disease.

Section 3

Keeping, having or operating or suffering or permitting to exist any slaughter houses, butcher pen or other places where animals fowls or birds are slaughtered or killed for the market.

Section 4

Permitting or allowing weeds, filth or rubbish to grow, be or remain on any lots, grounds or premises or permitting any weeds to extend from such premises into any street or alley adjacent to such lots, grounds or premises.

Section 5

Keeping any hog or hogs, in any inclosure less than five hundred feet from the nearest residence.

Section 6

Drying green hides, keeping or maintaining an establishment for such purpose.

Section 7

Whenever any nuisance as here in defined is found in any place in this City for the removal, abating or destroying of which no man can be held liable under the provisions hereof it shall be the duty of the City Marshall or City Physician to remove, abate or destroy same at the expense of the City.

Section 8

Any act or thing not hereinbefore enumerated which interferes with any personal right to be free from foul, noxious and unpleasant air, odor, gas and vapors and from the sights of foul and offensive thing and substances, shall create a nuisance.

Section 9

Any person, firm, corporation or association of persons who shall violate or cause permit or allow be violated any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10.00 or more than \$100.00 and each day that such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate and distinct offense and punishable as such.
