Social Security Questions & Answers

QUESTION: I was in an automobile accident several months ago. I haven't been able to go back to work. Is there any way I can get disability benefits under social security?

ANSWER: Yes, if you meet the requirement and your disability is expected to last 12 months or longer and prevents you from doing any substantial work. Special disability work requirement is that you have 5 years of social security jobs in the 10 years just before you were disabled. If you are 31 years of age or older, you are under age 31, you need social security work for half the time after age 21 and before the time you became disabled. A minimum of 1½ years is required. You should contact our office or our representative and application now.

ROLL 'EM UP ONE HOUR THIS SUNDAY

Nearly time to change time and save time—daylight time! At 2 a.m. Sunday, move your clocks ahead one hour to 3 a.m. The change can be made before going to bed, or even after getting up Sunday morning, but you better not wait or you could miss church on Sunday or get to work one hour late on Monday.

Through the summer months you can enjoy an extra hour of daylight because of the change. If you get off work at 5 p.m., for example, your clock will say 5, but the sun time will be 4.

It all comes out even next October 25, when standard time will again be in effect.

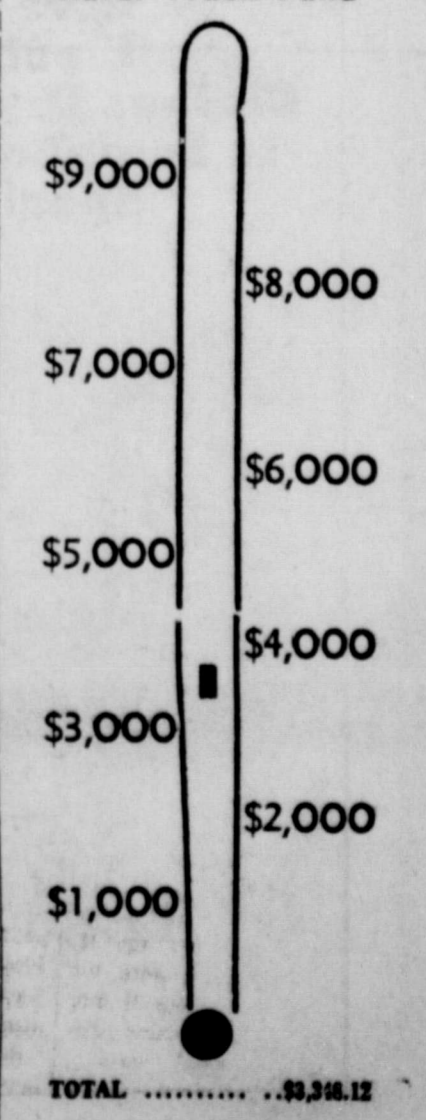
COUNTRY CLUB PARTY SCHEDULED SATURDAY

Family Finance' Topic Review Club Program Given by Mrs. Bulloch

In planning outside income one should take several matters into consideration; for instance, federal time saving certificates presently bear from 5 to 7 percent interest but are not so readily cashed as bank savings accounts, which bear a lower rate of interest. When buying a home, the prospective purchaser should be sure to check on the interest rate. Home savings and loan companies usually charge a higher rate than the town bank. Monthly income of \$700.00 after taxes, insurance and professional demands can easily melt away to \$225.00. Check your bank credit card to see whether there is a carrying charge interest involved. An unneeded issuance of a bank credit card is now illegal.

When buying household appliances carefully inspect warranties and guarantees, for they often vary considerably. Keep them together and purchase with the sales slips in case of future need. Automobiles are cheapest at the end of the season just before the models are out. Medical bills are soaring. Semi-private rooms have risen 88 percent. It may conceivably in the future cost \$200 a day to be hospitalized.

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C.—The 14th Amendment to our Constitution has been the launching pad for many controversial Supreme Court decisions in recent years.

Just a few days ago it entered another dimension unheard of or imagined. It embraced the extraordinary idea that an individual can claim welfare payments as a "property" right even when his eligibility to receive payments from the government is under question.

The 14th Amendment provides that no entity of government can deprive persons of life, liberty and property without due process of law. The Court by a 5 to 3 vote decided that welfare payments were a part of the individual's "property" and they can not be removed from the welfare rolls without a court hearing. There is little doubt that a government attorney will be furnished to represent the individual, although in other instances it is illegal for those in government to represent a client having a claim against the government.

The ruling strikes at the heart of the concept that welfare programs are an instrument of charitable support. Instead the decision portrays the collection of welfare benefits as an established property right.

In a dissent Justice Hugo Black said "Government's promise of charity embodied in our welfare programs considered to be a property right strains credulity."

An immediate consequence of the ruling will not only add to the already staggering cost of welfare but will lead to endless hearings before courts already burdened with overloaded dockets. In the meantime, those found ineligible by those responsible for such a determination will continue to be paid.

The elevation of public welfare into an obligation of the government to support every citizen is in danger of being written even more explicit into our laws when the Nixon Administration's "Family As-

sistance Plan" is enacted by the Congress.

The Administration's proposal assures every family that its income, for whatever reason, will not fall below a specified level.

Once people are on the welfare rolls, under the Court's ruling it will be extremely difficult for them to be removed, even though it is determined by local welfare administrators that their eligibility has ceased to exist. It will discourage efforts to remove those found to be ineligible for whatever reason.

It is not a matter of not being responsible to the genuine needs of unfortunate people. The American people have always responded in helping those who can not help themselves. Cities, counties, states, the Federal Government — plus countless private agencies, groups and organizations, provide aid to genuinely needy people. True charity is one thing but a Court's decision which says it is guaranteed under the Constitution removes the moral concept of charity and places those who are unwilling to work in a position to claim public money as a property right. It gives the lazy and shiftless a right alongside those in genuine need and who are unable to support themselves.

The court's decision is a violation of the property rights of the American taxpayer who is required to contribute a goodly portion of his earnings to those who have no inclination to better themselves. The decision denies property rights to men and women who get up every morning and go to their jobs. The court's action has the effect of confiscating property through taxation to be handed out in the name of charity which brings us to the point where there is no charitable duty or obligation except that of the government—where there is no moral concept except that which is set by the government—no conscience but state conscience. Perhaps the latter is even more serious to us as a people.

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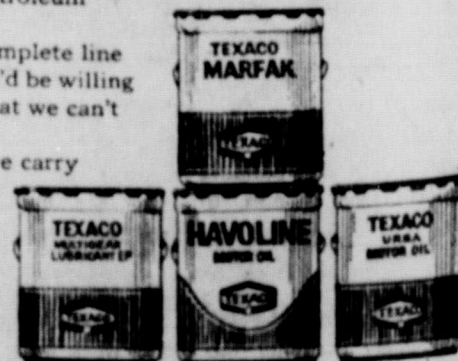

not a problem on young corn and grain sorghum, are beginning to cause some damage in Hamilton County.

Weather conditions have been favorable for the increase in aphid populations, and unfavorable for the increases in predators which usually keep them in check. A break in the weather, two weeks of warm

open weather, should force a rapid decline in aphid populations but fields already suffering should be treated at once. A heavy population can ruin a stand in two to three days.

The aphids suck juice from the plants, causing the plant leaves to turn yellowish, mottled or reddish. Small plants are often killed

when aphid populations are heavy.

I would advise checking young grain sorghum and corn quite often for the next couple of weeks and spray quickly if heavy populations are noted.

Some of the recommended materials for control are malathion, endrin, parathion or methyl parathion.

On the Home Range

Americans eat a half billion pounds of peanut butter a year and cash in on its economy, nutritional value and versatility.

Peanut butter ranks near the top in lists for protein content, food energy, fats necessary to maintain body balance, phosphorus, thiamine and niacin.

Texas is the number two peanut producing state. Last year's crop totaled 213,000 tons worth about \$50 million to Texas farmers.

To help consume Texas peanut products, here is a recipe:

"New Orleans Peanut-Banana Bread"—one-third cup shortening, two-thirds cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1 cup chopped sated peanuts, 1 cup mashed ripe bananas, one and three-fourths cup flour and 1 teaspoon soda. Cream shortening and sugar. Add unbeaten eggs one at a time, and beat thoroughly (one minute, medium speed with electric beater). Add the chopped peanuts. Add the mashed bananas alternately with the flour and soda which have been sifted together twice. Mix lightly, being careful not to overbeat. Turn

into a greased 8½x4½ by two and a half inch loaf pan. Bake (350 d.) an hour and 10 minutes or until done.

Let the clothes dryer do your ironing for you with permanent press clothing. Just sort and wash all permanent press articles as you do the rest of the laundry. Tumble drying eliminates virtually all wear and wash wrinkles.

No new wrinkles will form as long as you remove the items when the dryer stops.

No dryer? Use hot or warm wash water, then a cool rinse so fewer wrinkles will form during the spin cycle. Some new washers offer special permanent press cycles.

Pressing can be kept to a minimum, too, by washing the items in cold water.
