SCS Joins in Fight Against Countryside Pollution

A pile of junk is located near the Fort Worth, Waco and Dallas area, it would soon be a solid junk pile about two feet high if the way things are going now.

A small group of land owners told me the other day about dead hogs, chickens, goats, sheep and cattle that had been dumped on the side of the road near their home. This is a real health problem. This type pollution has a way of going on down stream to our rivers and lakes.

All of us have thrown candy wrappers, pop bottles, cans, and maybe dead animals in the county barrow ditches, and that is not good. There is a city dump at Hamilton, Hico and Evant where junk can be placed. Many other communities have dump grounds. It would be good if we had enough pride to haul our trash to these places.

Lady Bird Johnson plans to give cash prizes to counties of Texas that are judged the most beautiful. If every county in Texas joins in the contest, they will be a winner even if they don't receive some of her prize money.

The dump is open on Wednesday and Saturdays of each week.

For as long as they can remember, neighborhood pals Barry Biddle and Jim Smith have entered every contest that came to town.

Just last month the Pitch, Hit and Throw competition, sponsored by Phillips 66, rolled into Waco, and the Connally Street duo promptly swept the local meet.

Barry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Ray Biddle, won the 10-year-old division, then last week advanced to the district meet in San Antonio and won first place there too.

But he didn't leave his friend at home. Jim, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carroll (Hico) Smith, won the blue ribbon in Waco and matched Barry's feat in San Antonio in the 12-year-old division.

Now both boys spend each afternoon practicing batting and throwing a baseball for the upcoming divisional championship June 28.

Barry and Jim will head for St. Louis and Sunday compete for the title prior to the Cardinal-Philadelphia Philly game in Busch Stadium.

The winners in each age division will then earn a trip to Cincinnati for the major league All-Star game July 14.

So no doubt the boys are taking the contest seriously. "Our hopes

are really high," says Jim, a 5-7, 125-pounder seventh grader at University Junior High. "Barry and I have been practicing every day after baseball practice. We go out in the back yard or I go with Barry and his parents out to the field near Kendrick school."

Barry attends Kendrick Elementary and lives only a few doors down the street from Jim. Both are in the Waco Little League program—Barry plays pitcher and first base for Paul Stafford while Jim is a pitcher and catcher for Dan's Dairy Queen.

The Pitch, Hit and Throw contest is a test of both strength and skill. One phase of the competition is to throw a baseball into a target that resembles an airport wind sock placed 46 feet away.

Also the boys are tested on how far they can hit and throw a ball. Both boys hit the sock target two times in five attempts in the San Antonio meet.

Barry hit the ball 167 feet and threw for a 158 effort, while Jim hit for 204 feet and threw 188-6 feet.

Th contest isn't the first success for the twosome. Jim has won the Ford Punt, Pass and Kick contest four times. Also Barry won the local Astro's Run, Hit and Throw competition last year.

"I guess you can call us the Connally Street crew," laughs Jim. Sunday at St. Louis, they will have the best represented neighborhood in Texas.

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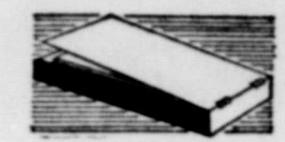
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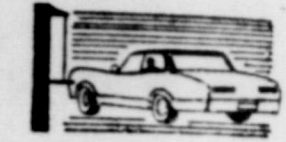
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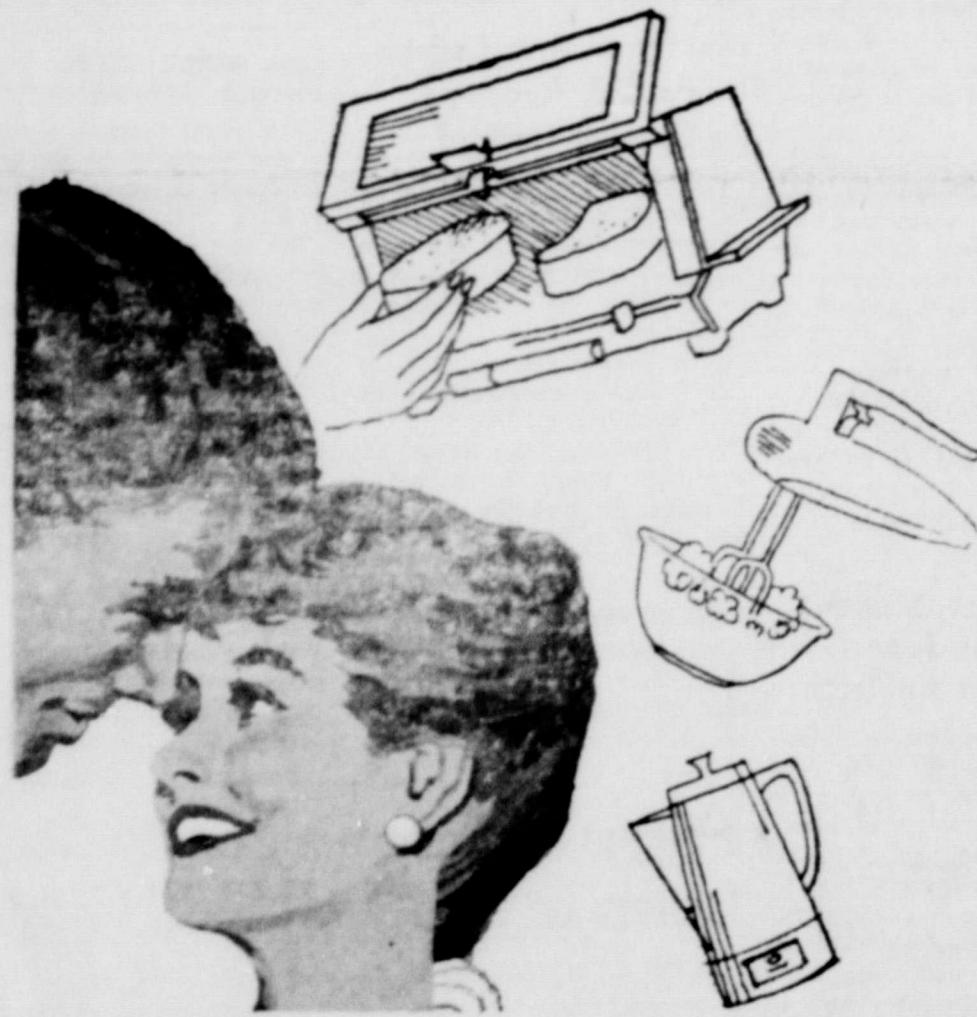
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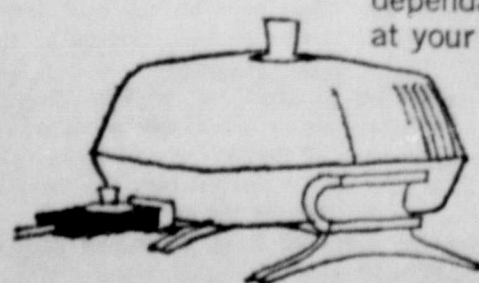
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COUNTY AGENT

Good winter pastures don't just happen, they are planned. The use of small grains for winter forage production is very important to Hamilton County and I would like to remind you that to obtain maximum benefits planning and seedbed preparation should start now.

Because little if any forage is produced in late December, January and February, forage utilized during this period must be produced earlier. To do this the crop has to be seeded early and it must come up and grow vigorously. Therefore, the seedbed must be well prepared and moist. To accomplish this, land should be plowed early and kept clean-tilled thru the summer to conserve moisture. This allows early seedbed preparation and planting.

The type of plow to use is not too important except that any compacted layer of soil must be broken up and vegetation must be controlled to stop moisture loss.

Final seedbed preparation and seeding should be planned for late August or early September.

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Dunn of Chattanooga, Tenn. visited recently with Mr. and Mrs. Frank Johnson.



There are a lot more young people in the "now" generation who want to improve America than the handful of radicals who want to burn it to ashes and start all over.

I can understand why the "majority" has broken its "silence." There's a growing impatience with agitation and controversy. But I feel we should continue to approach our nation's problems with a cool head and an open mind.

I've listened to the voices of dissent. I think I know what they're asking of their government.

One thing they want is confidence. They want the assurance that their public officials have the courage to meet the issues of the 1970s with imagination and integrity, and not with some form of "old politics" that thrashes around with problems but never quite locates the workable solutions.

It was my desire to answer this urgent need that prompted me in January to seek the office of United States Senator.

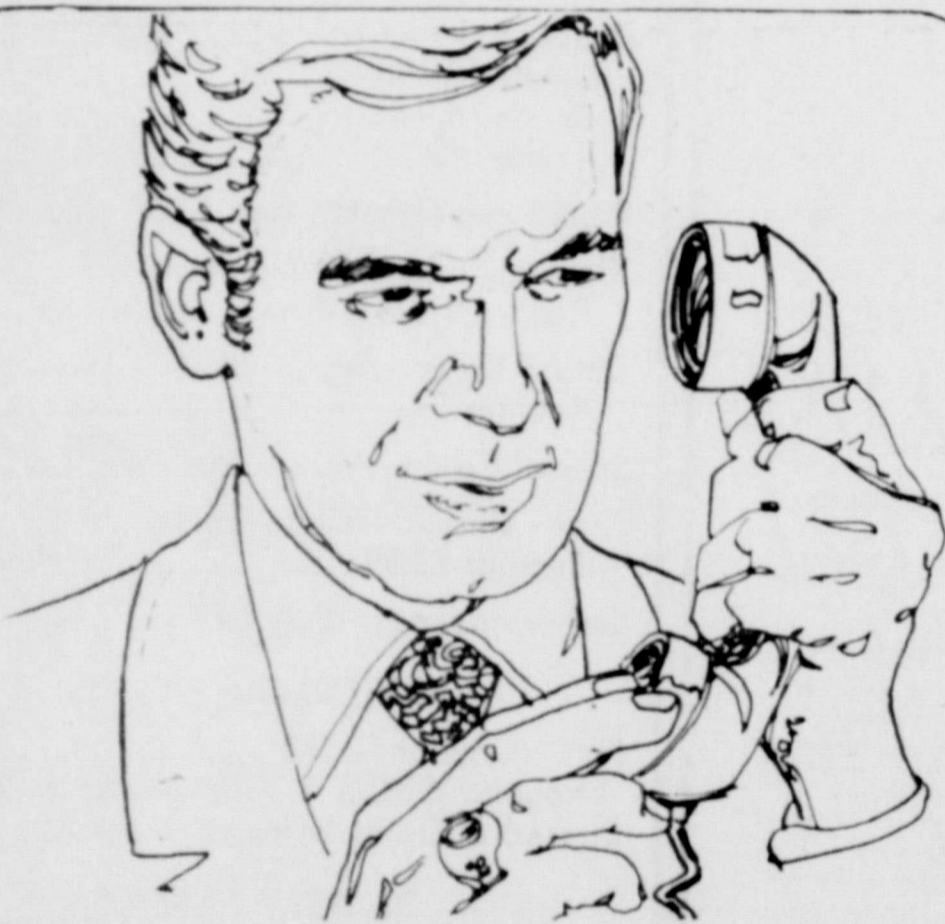

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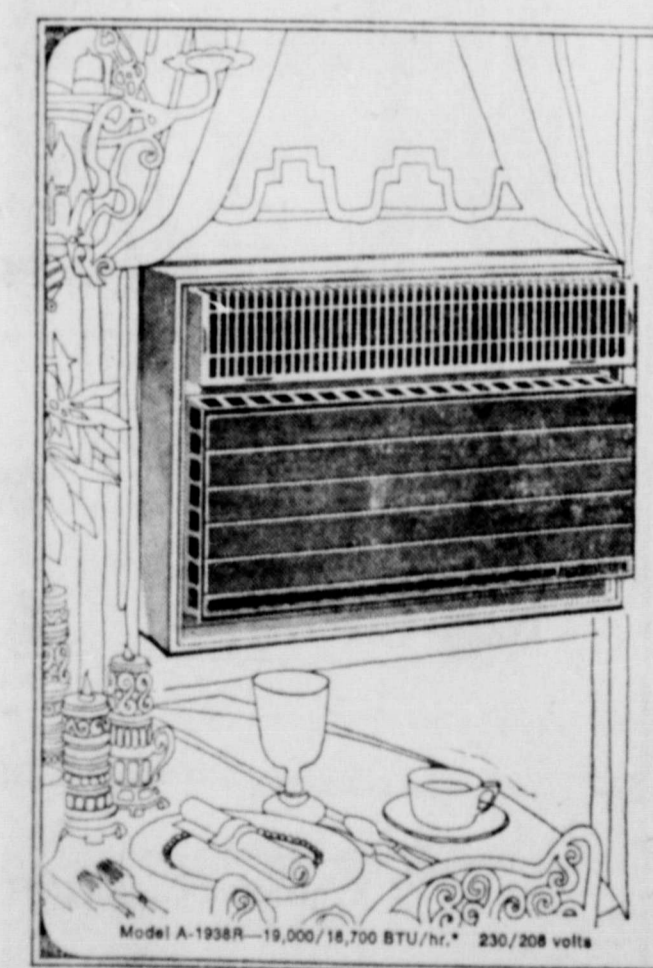

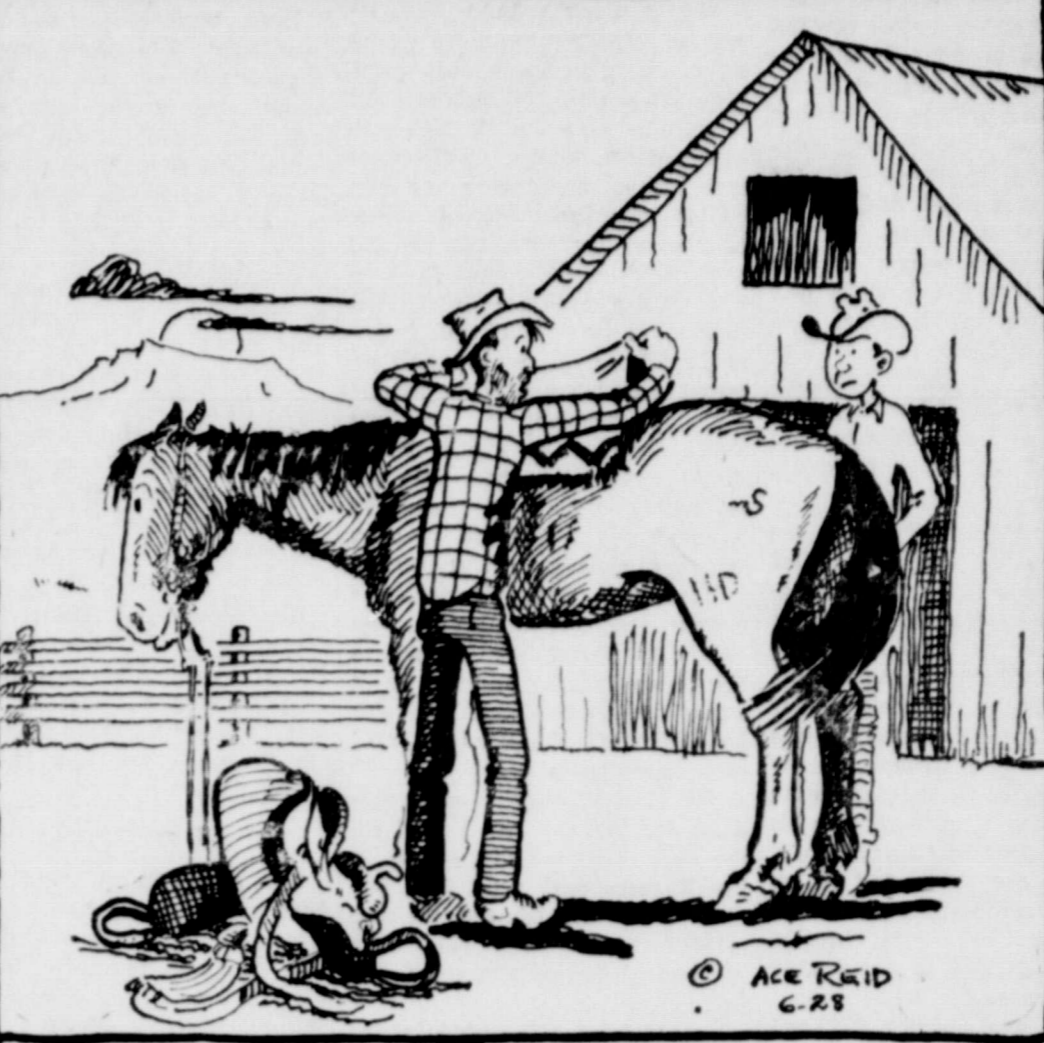

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

When the fish population in a pond becomes unbalanced with small stunted or rough, undesirable fish, it is best to remove all fish and start over with balanced stock.

If the pond contains adult fish, pond owners should not stock the pond with fingerlings obtained from the state or federal hatcheries. Certain fish are cannibals as well as predators, and a few of these adults can eliminate every added fingerling in short order.

The use of rotenone is recommended as an easy, safe and practical way to remove fish from private ponds. Increased rates will get even the tough bullhead catfish.

Fish killed with rotenone are edible. The material is not a poison in the true sense since it kills by suffocation. People, livestock, pets, snakes, frogs and other vertebrate animals are not affected when they swim in or drink water treated with rotenone.

The material is to be used only in private bodies of water for management purposes.
