## Marvin 'Cases Out' 50 Years With Postal Department

A career of public service that extended 50 years and eight months came to a close Tuesday morning when Marvin Marshall cased out mail to patrons on Route 1 for the last time. June 30th was retirement day for the congenial mail carrier. He could have continued until Nov. 1 had he so desired, but he chose to take his retirement at this time. "I've enjoyed every minute of it (the postal service), but I'm ready to retire," was Mr. Marshall's only comment about his sudden unemployment.

Mr. Marshall's career with the postal department began Oct. 1, 1919 in the South Texas town of Runge. His service there lasted until Sept. 1, 1930, when his request to be transferred was granted. All of his eleven years at Runge were spent on a 28-mile rural route.

## HICO POPULATION COUNT DOWN, UNOFFICIALLY

Hico's unofficial population in 1970 was given as 988, according to figures released by the Regional Census Bureau in Dallas. This is a 3-1 percent decrease in the past ten years, when the total was 1010 in 1960.

Hamilton's figures were the lowest since 1940 when the population was 2716. Their population now is 2729.

Hamilton County continued to lose population, with the 1970 figures showing 7132 people.

Official figures for Hico and Hamilton will be released in the fall by the Federal Census Bureau.

Area towns of Dublin and Stephenville showed an increase in population. Dublin's 1970 count was 2,452 compared to 2,443 in 1960; Stephenville showed 9,297 as compared to 7,357 in 1960.

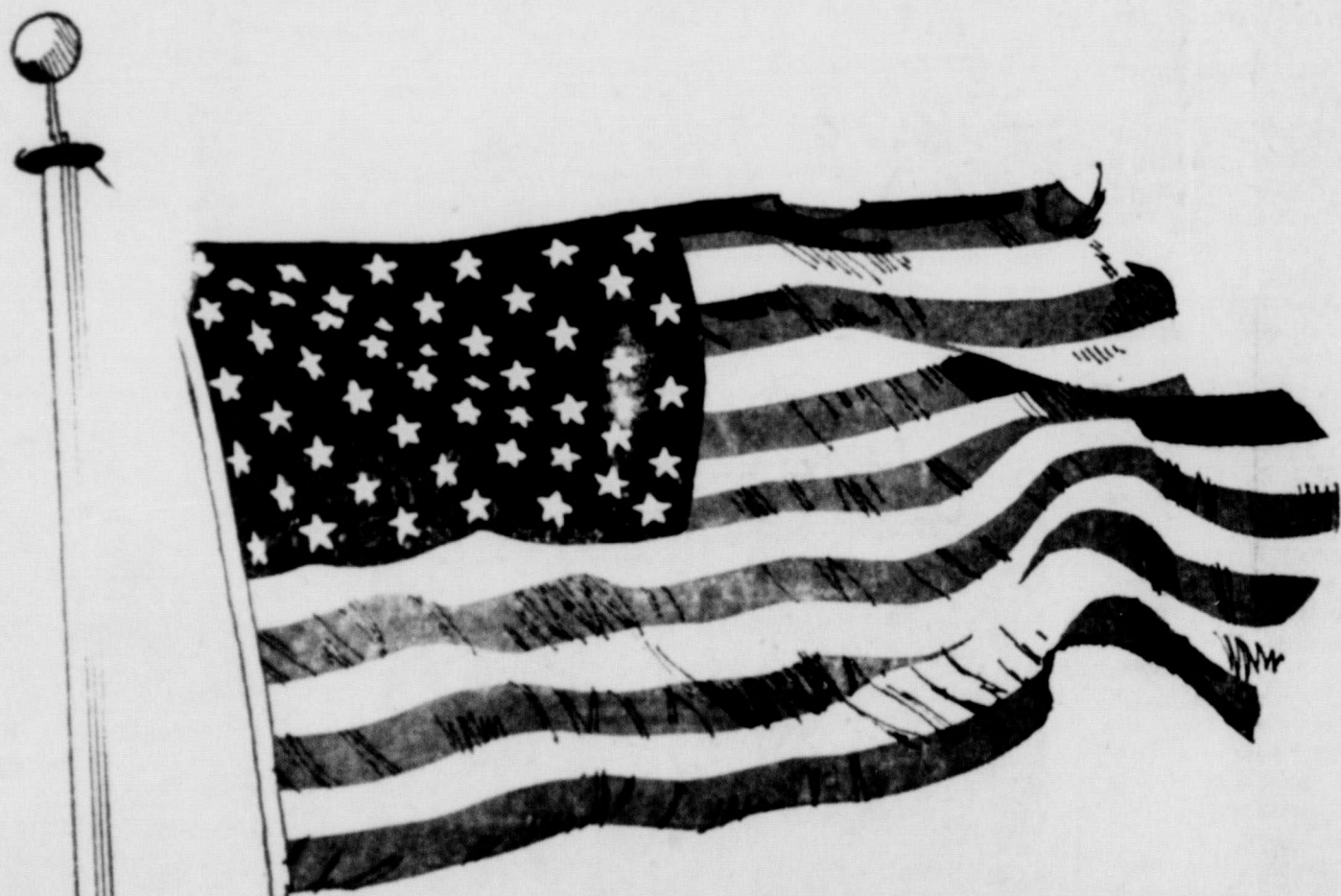

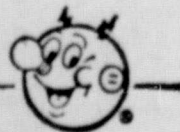

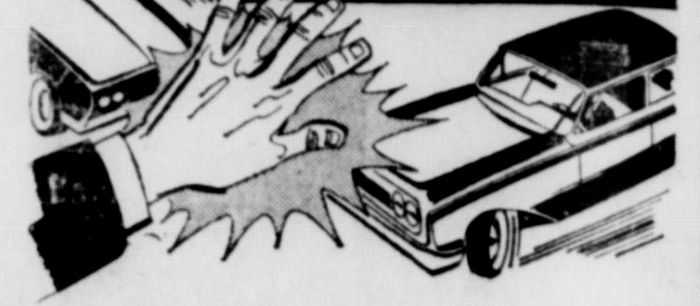

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Sorghum midge populations are building up over the County and from present levels I would expect economic infestations in certain areas very soon. I would encourage producers with late milo to watch their crop very carefully. This means daily if not twice daily.

Midge populations can jump from one or two per one hundred heads checked to five or one hundred per head almost overnight. Heads are susceptible to oviposition soon after they emerge from the boot. Treatments must be applied to coincide with head emergence for best results. Since several days usually elapse between first and last head emergence, a single application of insecticide is usually not satisfactory. Best results are usually obtained by applying insecticides when approximately 90 percent of the heads have completely emerged

from the boot. A second application should be made in 3-5 days.

The size of next fall and winter's litters may be determined by the management given sows during the hot weather months.

For larger fall and winter litters, swine producers should make every effort to keep sows and gilts cool during the hot summer and early fall months. Research has proven that heat stress or high temperatures during the early stages of gestation period reduces sow productivity.

Heat stress during the 15 days following breeding is detrimental to productivity, resulting in fewer viable embryos and a lower survival rate.

Sows and gilts can be kept cool quite satisfactorily through the use of a fogging system. On farms which have a pressure water system, cotton spray nozzles have been successfully used in constructing the needed fogging system.

**Social Security Questions & Answers**  
By JACK CALVERT

**QUESTION:** I have been off from work for three months. I plan to return to my job August 1. If I find that I can't work because of my disability when I return to work can I collect social security disability benefits for these past three months?

**ANSWER:** No. Under the social security disability law, a person has to be disabled for a full six-month period before cash benefits can be paid. The fact that you return to work on August 1 and then find that you can't hold your job because of your disability would not prevent us from using that three months in the six-month period to determine your eligibility. If, when you return to work, you find that you cannot work after trying to, see our representative right away to file for disability. All the facts will be taken into consideration at the time your claim is filed.
