noon at the Hico High School Auditorium. The parade will start at 10 a.m. and will proceed through the city streets. The parade committee is headed by Mrs. Conda Salmon, who was appointed Miss Reunion Contest Chairman last week by Manager Ray Keller, and has released rules pertaining to the beauty pageant. Mrs. Salmon will be assisted by Mrs. Von Scott, who will be in charge of the Little Miss contest, and Mrs. Dwain Wolfe.

The pageant will be held Friday night, July 31. In releasing the information, Mrs. Salmon said that any young lady interested in entering the contest should contact her or leave names at Salmon-Ross Dept. Store. Little Miss contestants are to be entered with Mrs. Scott.

Recognition to Miss Bailey and her family, the City of Hico choose her and say thank you for many hours she has spent in giving speeches in other towns and proclaiming the virtues of

America and warning against the complacency of the American citizen. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. B. Bailey, she has spoken before 22,000 youth and adults throughout Texas and other states. "This year's parade has a three fold purpose," explained Miss Louise Blair, parade marshal. Miss Blair noted that the parade is designed to show that Hicoans do believe in good old fashion patriotism and love for their country; and that this year's parade may be still another way of saying "thank you" to each mother and father who has given their sons for the service of this nation in order that those still at home could know freedom. And the last purpose, Miss Blair said, is to recognize Hico youth—the citizens and lead-

ers of tomorrow, and to point out that the potential of youth is unlimited when encouraged to do one's best and given the opportunity. Miss Bailey is a spring graduate of Hico High School, and was selected "Best All-Around Student" by the faculty. She served last year as President, Area IV, Future Homemakers of America, is a graduate of the Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar, and was chosen "Outstanding West Texas Scholar" by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Farm Safety Week Proclaimed County Judge Standifer

County Judge Herman Standifer proclaimed July 19-25 as Farm Safety Week in Hamilton County, at the request of J. H. Franks, Farm Bureau president. The local farm organization is cooperating with the county judge in the special farm safety program. The Farm Bureau leader said the death rate for farm and ranch accidents in Texas averaged 250 per year during the 1960s. "Unwelcome Harvest" is a reversed and the needless deaths and losses substantially reduced by each of us must have a concerted effort," Franks said. In his proclamation, Judge Stand-

ifer said "the citizens of Hamilton County are proud of our farm families from whom comes our abundance of food and fiber; therefore, our citizens are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of this segment of our population as they go about the sometimes hazardous task of producing the commodities needed by the entire population."

The proclamation said the week-long special Farm and Ranch safety campaign is a coordinated effort by Farm Bureau and various local and state agricultural and safety groups. The judge urged farm families "to become more safety conscious, not only during this special week, but every day of the year."

Contest Rules

Rules for the pageant were listed as follows:

1. Two divisions will be held, a Little Miss division for girls age 3-6 and the regular senior division for girls age 14-18.
2. Both divisions are open to any area girl. Local area is considered to be Hico and trade territory, including Iredell, Fairy, Duffau, Clairette, Olin, Carlton and Chalk Mountain.
3. The young division is open to girls age 3 through 6 who have not attended school. They will not be sponsored but must be entered by parents and pay registration fee.
4. Senior division is open to local area unmarried girls age 14 thru 18. The contestants must be sponsored by a Hico business firm or area organization.

5. Deadline for entry is Saturday, noon, July 25.

6. Older contestants will be judged in formal or semi-formal wear, and younger girls will be judged in street-dress attire.

7. Entries will be judged on poise, personality and beauty.

8. Registration fee of \$3.00 must be paid in advance to the Reunion Association, and contestants will not be qualified until fee has been paid. Registration fee will be paid to committee when contestant is entered.

Jackson Will Retire As Hico Postmaster

Robert B. Jackson, Postmaster at Hico for the past 28 years, this week made application for retirement from the postal department. Effective date will be July 31.

Mr. Jackson, who was appointed postmaster Jan. 1, 1942, will re-enter the teaching profession.

He taught school here for 7 years prior to accepting the postmaster position, and will return to teaching at Chapel Hill, an 8-grade school near Cleburne. He will serve as principal, and will teach seventh and eighth grade social studies and English.

Mrs. Jackson will continue to reside here and teach first grade in the local schools. Mr. Jackson will reside in Cleburne during the week, but will maintain his home here.

The Postmaster gave two reasons for the hasty decision to accept retirement at this time. First, the postal department offered an attractive incentive in retirement pay, and secondly, he wanted to get back into the teaching field.

Upon Mr. Jackson's retirement, an acting postmaster will be appointed to take over his duties.

Hico and Iredell Businesses Are Hit by Burglars

Burglars hit Hico and Iredell businesses last Saturday night, carting off several hundred dollars worth of merchandise and money.

Businesses entered were Toegen Feed Mill and the News Review at Hico, and A. & J. Grocery and Helm Hardware in Iredell.

Hardest hit was the Iredell grocery, owned by Arthur Guinn and his son, James. They reported two adding machines taken, along with 4 boxes of cigars, several packages of cigarettes, \$200 worth of record albums, and an Avon sample kit belonging to Mrs. Guinn. However for some reason, the yeggs left a cigar box containing money that was in the sample kit.

At the hardware store, the burglars took small change from the

cash drawer, but left the one and five-dollar bills. This was the second time in the last two months that the Helm store had been broken into. Around \$300 in merchandise was taken in the first robbery. Toe Horton said that about \$25 in change was taken from his feed mill.

Entry was made at the News Review, but nothing was found to be missing. Officers theorized that the burglars were scared away by the nightwatchman or some other person.

Entry to each of the businesses was made by breaking glass doors. Rear doors were entered at all except the grocery store, where a large double glass door at the front was shattered.
