## Patriotic Theme Adds Spice to Reunion Parade

"Our Priceless American Heritage" was truly demonstrated last Wednesday afternoon in opening ceremonies of the 84th Annual Hico Reunion, when officials seized upon an opportunity to honor one who has done so much to promote patriotism, and at the same time to promote Hico.

The parade, under the direction and guidance of Miss Louise Blair, carried the theme of Americanism, and was the most successful in years.

At a time when the nation is at the crossroads—a time when demonstrations and other un-American activities are predominant—more than five thousand people sat or stood in awed silence as tribute was paid to the local teenager for her efforts in promoting what she believes—in areas across the state.

Miss Barbara Baley adopted the theme of Americanism in the Spring of 1969 when she was elected Area IV President, Future Homemakers of America, and immediately the more than 25,000 youths and adults to whom she spoke accepted her motive as one "good and pure."

They accepted her philosophy that America isn't going to the dogs; they accepted her theory that youth of these days and times are not all bad; and they accepted the fact that Americanism and patriotism was "real", just as God is real.

Miss Baley has perhaps been influential in changing the lives of many teenagers, and at the same time renewing the faith of adults in a free country such as these United States.

J. Louis Evans of Stephenville, Director of Development at Tarleton State College, was master of ceremonies for the special program. Mr. Evans is a familiar figure in Hico, and his serving in this special capacity was only appropriate.

In honoring Miss Baley on her day, dignitaries such as the President of the United States sent messages of congratulation. Mr. Nixon's message read as follows: "It is easy to understand why the citizens of Hico are celebrating Barbara Baley Day. From all that I have heard about this fine young lady she certainly is an inspiration for all of her contemporaries. I am very proud to express my warmest admiration for her and to let her know how much I personally appreciate the fine example she has set."

Also included on the program was presentation of a U.S. flag that had flown over the nation's capitol, sent to Hico by Congressman Omar Burleson. Other telegrams and letters were received from Senator John G. Tower, Sen. Ralph W. Yarborough, Cong. Omar Burleson, Hugh W. Sloan, Jr., Staff Assistant to the President, Lady Bird and Lyndon B. Johnson, W. Thomas Johnson, Executive Assistant to former President Johnson, Governor Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes.

After being escorted to the reviewing stand by the Fort Hood Band in company of Bill Rutledge, Miss Baley and her parents watched raising of the colors by Hico Boy Scouts as the band played the national anthem. Supt. O. C. Cook led the crowd in Pledge of Allegiance, and Rev. Eddie Malphrus voiced the invocation.

District Judge Truman Roberts of Hamilton gave the welcoming address, and Mr. Evans introduced guests and read communications. Greetings to Miss Baley were extended by Dr. W. O. Trogdon, Tarleton President, and the honoree gave her response.

Mayor O. L. Davis presented Miss Baley with a plaque from the City of Hico, and Mr. Felix Mika of Panna Maria presented her with red roses. An added surprise was a plaque from the citizens of Hico, presented to Mrs. Marilyn Johanson for her role in accompanying Miss Baley during her many miles of traveling. Former mayor Bill Howard made the presentation.

As a Fort Hood buglar played retreat, the flag was slowly lowered and presented to Senator J. P. Word, who in turn presented it to Miss Baley.

Concluding the program Mrs. J. C. Braune led the crowd in singing "God Bless America."

### Hicoans Are Affected by Hurricane



## PUBLIC NOTICE


Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."
