Long anticipated vacation came to an end Sunday and I was hardly ready to work Monday. I was so tired I thought I was tired when I left the week before but found I was in good shape then. Vacations are wonderful, I guess—have never been the kind to go many but I had heard so much about Colorado and the mountains, thought surely it was the next heaven in beauty, so that's how I talked Leslie into going. He tried to bribe me out of the trip, but I was determined to go and go we did, at 4 a.m. Sunday, Aug. 8.

The first day was spent getting to Texas and across New Mexico. We were so anxious to get to the weather we drove to Chama, the upper part of New Mexico where we stopped for the night. from the station and town. Sunday afternoon we drove over to Mesa Verde National Park. Before entering the park, off in the distance, I could see cars going up a high mountain on a narrow road. I vowed that if that was in the park I would not go but later on ours was one of the cars going up. It was a very nerve-wrecking drive but I lived through it and enjoyed seeing where the Indians used to dwell in the cliffs along the canyon walls.

Sunday night we toured the shops along the main street of Durango along with all the other tourists. After getting back to our motel we talked ourselves out of the 4:30 a.m. arising and decided to sleep a little later and drive over to Silverton on the Million Dollar Highway. This drive was truly beautiful but 49 miles of more mountain roads. We ate breakfast in Silverton at the Bent Elbow Saloon. The atmosphere here was of the early mining days and quite a place. We went through a ghost mine and I panned for gold but I guess that's not my talent either, because I didn't see even a speck that resembled gold.

After leaving Silverton we decided we had about all the mountains we could stand, so we started back to Texas, sightseeing enroute. Tuesday night we attended the drama of "Texas" in an open air theatre in the Palo Duro Canyon. This was one of the highlights of our trip. The sound effects of a thunderstorm during the production is so real it makes you almost look for shelter. We saw Verma and Steve Parks at the show, and decided it was a small world after all. The next day we drove to Hico which was so dry and hot, but looked good to us. Our trip wasn't a long one, but we enjoyed every minute of it.

School Lunch Room Menu For First Week is Released

The following menu will be served in the lunch room at Hico Public School the week beginning Monday, Aug. 24:

Monday: Steak and gravy, English peas, carrot sticks, rice, rolls and jelly.

Tuesday: Meat loaf, baked potatoes, green salad, whole kernel corn, cornbread, cake.

Wednesday: Meat balls, green beans, hominy, sweet pickles, cornbread, jello.

Thursday: Pinto beans, potato salad, cabbage, beet pickles, cornbread, banana pudding.

Friday: Beef tips and gravy, cantaloupe, blackeyed peas, fried okra and potatoes, bread, ice cream.

All meals are served with milk.

A "full house" of children is expected Monday when Hico schools open their doors for the 1970-71 term.

And if they are packed in like last year, then school officials and teachers may have problems. Last year's opening day count was 342. When classes were dismissed at the end of the year, the count stood above 360 students, largest group in many years.

However, officials anticipate no particular problems in seating the expected large enrollment, saying "the more, the merrier."

Hico faculty members are busy this week attending workshops required under the new ten-month teaching program.

Monday they were at the media center in Waco studying and using media equipment (how to tape, laminate, show film, etc.).

Thursday, faculty members were in Lampasas to attend a Crime and Narcotics Seminar. A course in this subject will be taught this year in the fifth through 12th grades, as required by the last session of the Legislature.

Friday morning at 8 o'clock a general teachers meeting will be held in the high school library. Also at 8 a.m. Friday, school annuals will be issued in the high school office. Students are asked to bring their receipts.

At 9 o'clock Friday morning, high school registration begins. A general assembly Monday at 9 a.m. will launch the school year. Classes will be dismissed at 2:30 on the first day. All parents and patrons are invited to attend the opening program.

Lunch will be served the first day, and Supt. O. C. Cook has asked that students pay for meals weekly. If necessary to pay by the month, arrangements should be made at the superintendent's office. Officials said that no lunch bill will be carried longer than one week without these arrangements.

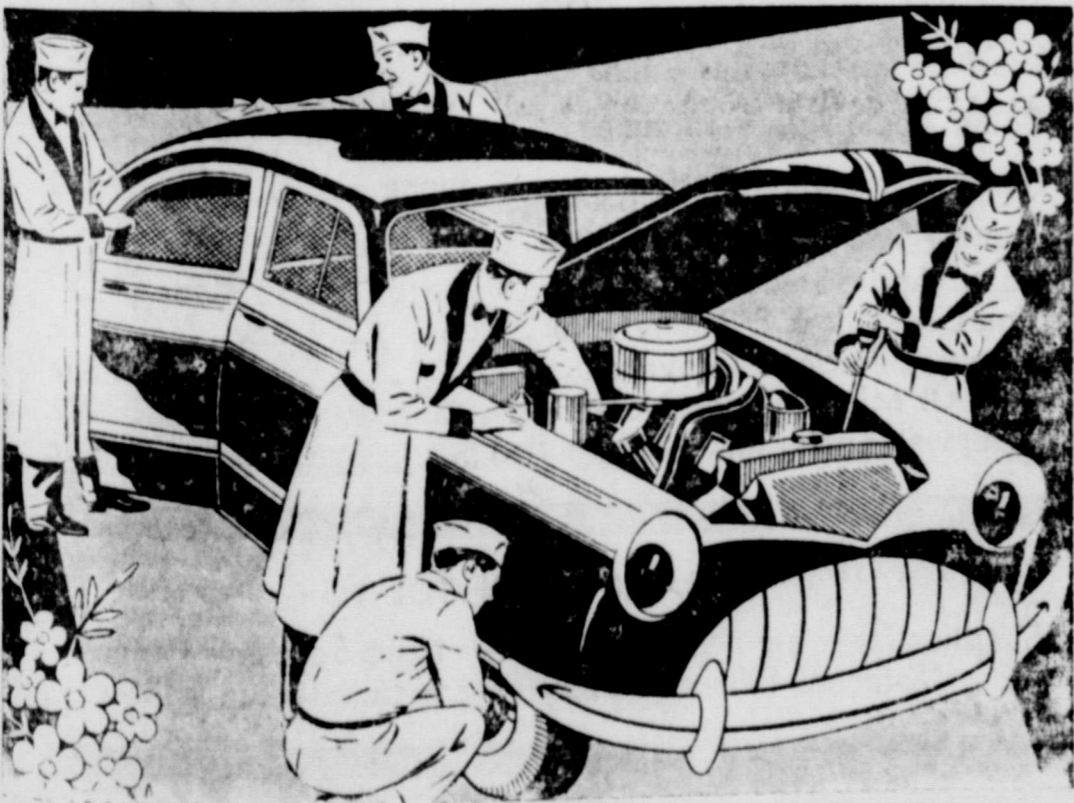

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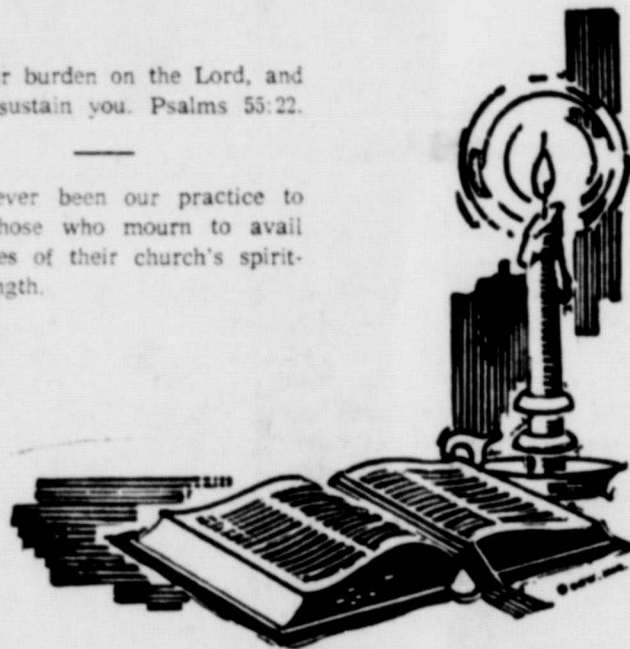

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)
 General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)
 General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors." "Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

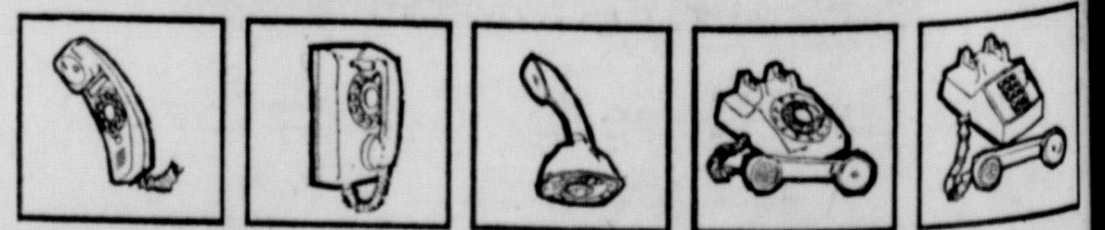

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a

home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE
STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company.

(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such dis-

trict or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:

(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.
(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.
(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved

roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxpayers electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."
