



The lofty white cross, already familiar in the Erath Gardens of Memory, is to be enhanced by the erection around it of a garden-type mausoleum of 48 crypt capacity.

The mausoleum itself will be of cross shape, the 40-foot tall white cross rising from the center of the plan. Sixteen crypts will be housed in the arms of this cross, at left and right, eight more in the top, and the remainder in the long stock below.

This widely admired and widely used Texas material is quarred from the "granite mountain" near Marble Falls. It will be used in polished form for the most part with panels of it in parts of the new building in rustic form, to provide background for participations.


