

COUNTY AGENT By BILL MCCUTCHEON

Hybrid sorghum-sudan pastures, fast growing and excellent forage, can also be deadly, especially during the late summer and fall. The breakdown of the sorghum's plant material by its own enzymes results in prussic acid poisoning for the animals which eat the plant material.

The actual agent causing death is hydrogen cyanide, the same material used in state gas chambers for execution

There are two times during which poisoning occurs. After frost, where there is damage to the plants, high levels of hydrogen cyanide very common in the plants.

The second case is when plants perk up and begin fast growth after a very drouthy period during which the plants have burned up. The hydrogen cyanide is very colatile and therefore stays in the

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
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

tight land that. tends to waterlog or puddle when wet or cement when dry.

For planting, a well prepared firm hard seedbed is desired. The land should be plowed several months before planting and only shallow cultivation to destroy vegetation is recommended just prior to seeding. Avoid planting on loose seedbed following deep cultivation. Plant seed about half inch deep and then firm soil with a roller or culitpacker. One pound (PLS) should produce a stand on 36-40 inch rows; but for grazing, 3-5 pounds broadcast seems preferable. Early planting (Sept. 15-Oct. 15) should encourage fall growth and reduce the chance of freeze damage. Planting after Nov. 1 is risky because of freeze damage on the young plants.

Fertilize about like oats. Use unbalanced material early in the fall on estabished grass and top dress with 40-60 pounds of actual nitrogen in the late winter. Control weeds with 2,4-D when needed after the crowns form.

It would be unwise to plant on land where you could expect heavy competition from volunteer small grain or rescue grass.

Several local producers have seed available and weather conditions are favorable for planting. If you have questions on this
