Absentee Voting Oct. 14-30

Wednesday, October 14, to Friday, Oct. 30, inclusive, is the period for absentee voting by personal appearance for the November 3 general election.

Any qualified voter in Texas who is absent from the county on his residence on Nov. 3 may obtain an absentee ballot. To do so, he must take his voter's registration certificate to the county clerk's office during the specified period. In addition to state, district and precinct races, the November 3rd ballot will include seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Subject, the proposed amendments relate to: (1) censure and removal of judges; (2) authority to amend beverage law; (3) assessment of farm, ranch and other lands; (4) reconstitute State Tax Commission; (5) county bonds and assessed valuation; (6) increase value of homestead exemption from forced sale; and (7) authority to consolidate functions of government.

As recorded a record 4,150,645 registered voters this year. Normally, absentee voting accounts for approximately five percent of the total vote turnout.

National 4-H Club Week Being Observed in County

"We Care!" That's what more than 3 million boys and girls across the nation will be saying during National 4-H Club Week, Oct. 4-10. Who are they? About 130 live here in Hamilton County and approximately 90,000 are Texans. The 9 to 19 year old youths do more than just talk about caring. They show their interest and concern by working on community and county projects of many kinds. They take advantage of the opportunities which membership in 4-H provides for them and then their best in carrying out assigned responsibilities.

4-H Club members have long been engaged in programs aimed at making their homes and communities better places in which to live. Their projects help them learn about doing, including combatting poverty, malnutrition and the pollution of our environment.

Others are enrolled in educational programs, the youth phase of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which aim to give members basic training not only in their fields but in leadership and citizenship responsibilities as well. Membership is not limited to rural

boys and girls. In fact a sizeable percentage of the nation's total enrollment is made up of boys and girls who live in urban areas, many from the heart of our major cities. New projects are constantly being added in order to interest youth who do not have the space or facilities to carry out farm related projects.

4-H Club work is a team organization, and one of its most important members is the local volunteer leader who renders yeoman service in the local clubs. We have a good number of men and women in Hamilton County active in the 4-H program. They serve in many capacities, some are subject matter leaders, others coach or assist with the coaching of judging and demonstration teams but regardless of their assignments they have one thing in common—they have abiding faith in today's young people.

While we have a relatively good number of volunteer leaders, more are needed to adequately serve even more of our young people. Any adult interested in joining our 4-H team can get full details on what is involved in volunteer leadership work at the County Extension Office.

Perennial West Texas Class B power Rising Star Wildcats come to town Friday night for a 7:30 p.m. contest with the Hico Tigers, continuing a series that started in 1968.

In the previous two contests, the Wildcats have come out on the long end of the score, winning 42-6 in 1968, and taking a 30-14 victory from the Tigers last year in a game that was much closer than the score indicates.

Rising Star, in the same district with the Tigers the past two years, are playing in another loop this season, and the game Friday night has no bearing on the championship race.

Rising Star has four regulars returning from last year's fine team, that went 8-2 and tied Gor-

man for second place in the district standings. They reportedly are big, well-drilled, and make few mistakes.

Hico coaching staff is expecting a real tough game with the visitors.

The Tigers will not be in the best physical condition for the game. Cecil Holley, who played such an outstanding game last week, has been lost for the next two games with injury to the foot which was cut in a home accident. Larry Decker, who has been hobbled with a knee injury, is no better, but will play this week. Otherwise the team is intact.

Tigers Drop 20-6 Decision to Arlington Lamar Vikings

Put two teams on the field with equal man-power, and the one with the most stamina would perhaps win in the eventuality.

But when you put two teams on the field, one with 48 players of equal ability, and the other with perhaps 17 players in the same category, then sooner or later the larger squad is going to gain the upper hand.

That's what happened to Hico's Tigers last Saturday night when they journeyed to the big city to battle Arlington Lamar Vikings. It is not an ability—merely a fact—that

quantity, not quality finally led to the Tigers' downfall.

The Tigers fought and fought, and even had the upper hand, but the Vikings simply kept throwing fresh personnel at them until every ounce of strength was sapped, and the home team caught up, and then pushed ahead for the 20-6 win.

The Tigers were certainly not awed by the city lights or the big school name. Because they took the fight to the Vikings for over half of the contest before the numbers finally caught them.

The Tigers scored midway of the first quarter to take a 6-0 lead, which held up until several minutes were gone in the third quarter. Hico's marker came after a fumble recovery at the Viking 29. One play lost three yards to the 32, and Reggie Grover hit Jim Ferguson with a 10-yard pass to the 22. On the next play Galen Lindsey blew through a big hole and raced to the end zone for the only Tiger marker.

The Tigers, attempting to protect the 6-0 margin, put up a valiant defensive effort for the remainder of the half and on into the third period, four times stopping the Viking inside the 30.

After intermission, the heat and intense play began to tell on the Tigers, and they let Lamar loose on

its first possession for the tying TD. The Vikings used seven plays to march 65 yards for the score.

The second Viking TD came on a 48-yard drive, with a 39-yard pass play being the big gainer. The completion put the ball at the Tiger 9, and the Vikings cracked at the Tiger defense four times before covering the distance.

The final Lamar touchdown was scored with only three seconds left in the game.

Even though they let the Vikings loose for three TD's, the Tiger defense was the outstanding feature of play. Larry Decker, Lee Ramage, David Ashby, Wendell Bell, Chuck Bowden, Galen and Eugene Lindsey, Eldon Black, Danny Polk and Chester Land all came in for their share of the spotlight as they fought and fought to make the score as respectable as it was.

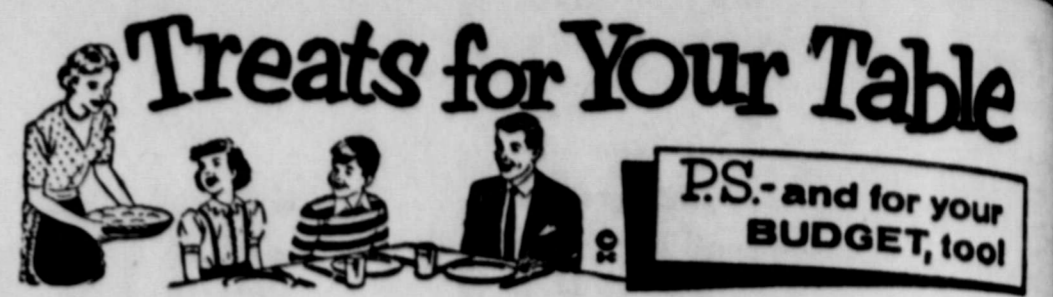

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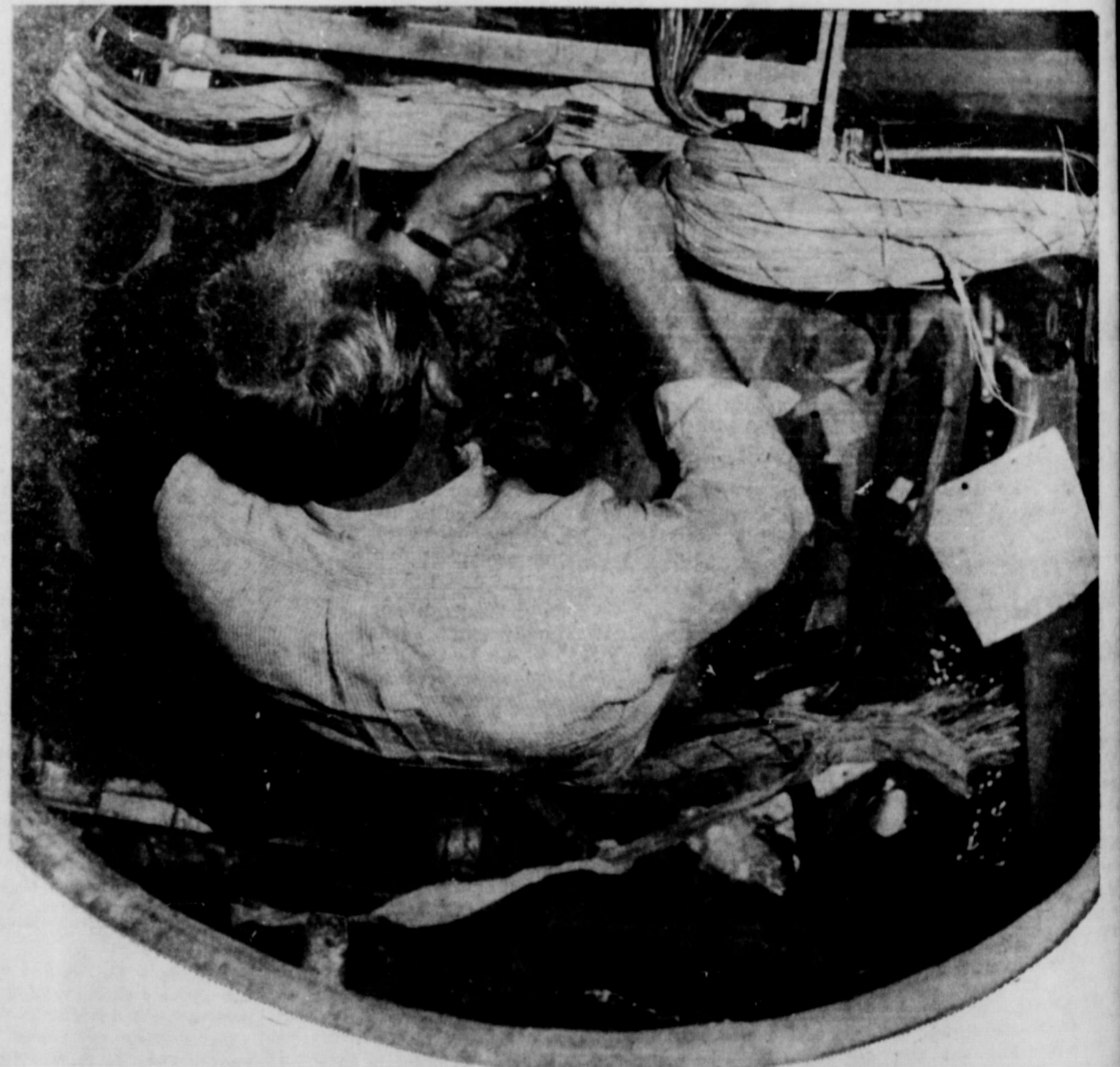

Social Security

Questions & Answers

By JACK CALVERT

QUESTION: My wife died three years ago. I have always supported our children but I heard the other day that my children may be entitled to social security benefits on my wife's social security work record. Is this correct?

ANSWER: Yes, it could be. Children may receive monthly social security benefits on their mother's social security earnings record even though their father is the chief, or even full, support of the children. To qualify, the mother must have worked long enough on social security jobs to be "insured." Insured means that she has worked one-fourth of the time she was 21 up to the time of her death or have ten years social security work. The work does not have to be regular or consecutive. There is also a "currently insured" status, for those persons who do not meet the "regular" requirement. Currently insured means that a person has worked in six of the thirteen quarters just preceding death. You should see our representative immediately and file an application on behalf of your children. Bring their birth certificates and your deceased wife's social security card when you meet our representative.
