## Hico Takes 19-6 Victory From Rising Star

## Antlerless Deer Permits Will Be Issued October 29th

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has announced the dates and locations for issuance of antlerless deer permits to landowners in three regulatory districts for the 1970 deer season. Included are dates for Hamilton, Bosque and Erath counties.

Antlerless permits will be issued in Hamilton County at the Courthouse, on Thursday, October 29. Area for the permits will be designated at a later date, and will be posted in the courthouse.

Erath County landowners may receive permits on Friday, October 30 at the Courthouse in Stephenville.

Bosque County, one of two in the Possum Kingdom District with an experimental either-sex deer season, will issue special tags at the Courthouse in Meridian on Nov. 9 and 10.

Season dates for the three counties are November 14 through Jan. 3, inclusive. The bag limits remain the same, two bucks and one antlerless deer on permit, except in Bosque County, where hunters will



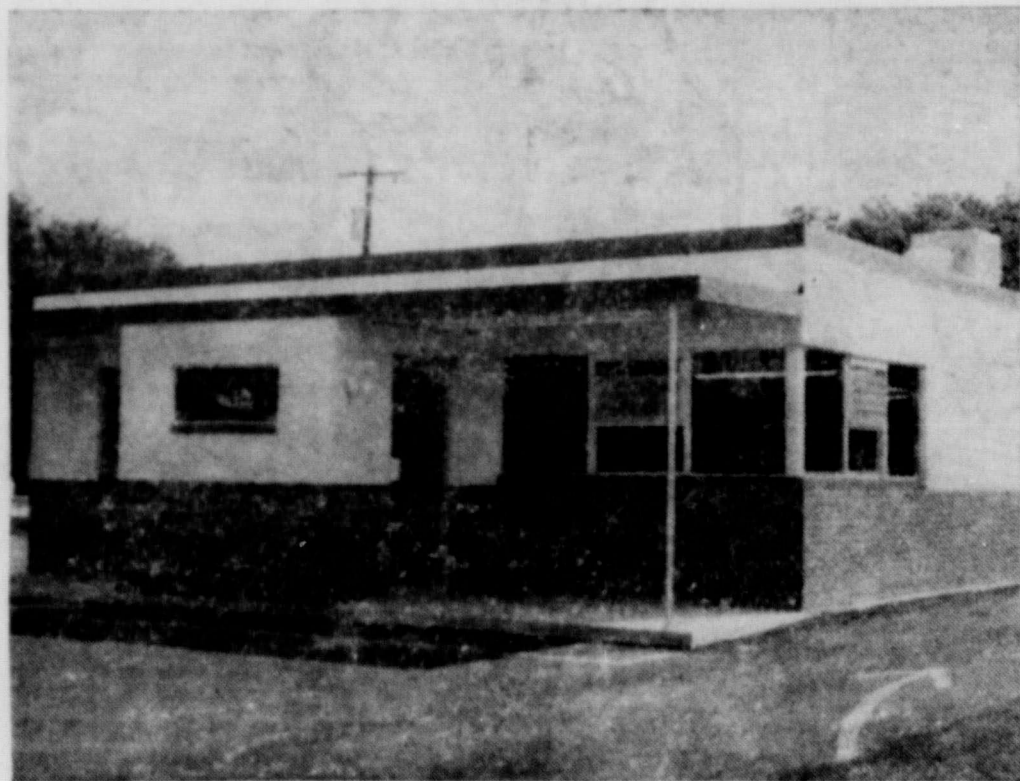

## Koffee Kup Cafe

### On the Home Range

'Tis the season of the great fur put-on—the fabulous fakes with wildlife looks. The manmade fur fabrics have been designed for vests and skirts, pants and pantsuits as well as coats and jackets. And the furs come in all types—chinchilla, raccoon, beaver, fox, wild spots, stripes, checks or even pop art patterns.

Fake furs are deep pile fabrics made by interlacing extra sets of yarn in the basic cloth structure. The pile is usually a manmade fiber, such as rayon, acrylic or modacrylic. The backing is knitted or woven of cotton, acrylic or modacrylic.

The Textile Fiber Products Identification Act requires that every textile fiber product be labeled according to its fiber content.

Fake furs have a luxurious appearance and feel yet are comparatively light weight plus warm to wear. The furs are resistant to moths, mildew and wrinkles, and their relative cost is less than genuine fur.

Fake fur fabrics, however, have a natural tendency to tuft in wear and dry cleaning. Tufting means that the fibers stick together. The fur also tends to mat and flatten down in wear. Because these fibers are very heat sensitive, care should be taken not to dry the garments near heat nor to steam press them.

To select the best fake fur garment, follow these guides: Read the label for fiber content and care instructions. Some fake furs are washable, but most of them require dry cleaning, using either commercial or the fur method which is a more expensive process than regular dry cleaning. Check the density of the pile. Better qualities have a denser, closer pile. Determine shedding by shaking the fur briskly or by working the fingers through the pile of the fabric. Acrylic and modacrylic have a tendency to hold oil and grease stains and may require special attention for removal.

Carrots, a good source of Vitamin A, are one of the most versatile vegetables. Start the day with carrot pancakes and end it with a slice of moist carrot cake. Crisp carrot strips are excellent

for snacks, and carrots may be cooked in stew, casserole dishes, soups or as the main vegetable of the meal.

One small carrot can meet the daily need for Vitamin A, except for women who are pregnant or lactating. Vitamin A helps one to see at night and adds to the health of the skin.

Carrots should be stored in a plastic bag in the crisper of the refrigerator. The green tops should be cut off if not already removed before purchasing. Wrapping the carrots in a plastic bag protects them from dehydration.

Cooked carrots may be enhanced with sauces flavored with orange, lemon, raisins, maple, mint and pineapple. Cooked mashed carrots can be added to cakes, cookies, pies and puddings. Or mix a good sandwich filling by mixing equal amounts of grated carrots and peanut butter.

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C.—Four months ago, on June 11 to be exact, we called attention to the Soviet Union's buildup of military potential around Cuba.

The Administration has now officially revealed the information referred to at that time. On Friday, Sept. 25, both the White House and Defense Department responded to news inquiry about what appears to be a Russian intent to build a submarine base at Cienfuegos on Cuba's south shore. The Pentagon confirmed to news sources that three Soviet ships had moved heavy barges and other equipment into Cienfuegos harbor in the past few weeks. Actually, the last few weeks go back to early June.

Questioned at the White House, a spokesman was quoted as saying, "the Soviet Union can be under no doubt that we would view the establishment of a strategic base in the Caribbean with the utmost seriousness." At that time the White House spokesman quoted President Kennedy's statement that there would be peace in the Caribbean "if all offensive weapons are removed from Cuba and kept out of the Hemisphere in the future."

Almost lost in the Middle East Crisis was the warning to the Russians about the possible construction of their strategic base.

For a century and a half the United States has held fast to the doctrine that no European nation be allowed to establish a military foothold anywhere in the Western Hemisphere. The Monroe Doctrine has been a living declaration for all this time.

Today, as nuclear-packed submarines are able to cruise underwater and sneak up to the coast lines of any country, reconnaissance planes constantly survey the sea approaches. A Soviet submarine base in Cuba, capable of firing missiles into the populous areas of the United States would constitute a grave threat.

As was mentioned in this column of June 11, those who are will-

ing to trust the Russian leaders will doubtless say that if they have the capability of launching missiles from Russian soil, why would they seek bases within 90 miles of our shore. The answer is simple enough—there remains some doubt as to the accuracy of missiles fired from 6,000 to 8,000 miles away, but little doubt of pinpoint certainty fired from a distance no farther than the Caribbean.

It is reasonable that the construction of a strategic submarine base in Cuba would be in keeping with the Soviet's intent of shifting the world balance of power away from the United States. This sort of action, coupled with Soviet military activity in the Middle East and in Indochina, seems to support a conclusion that they are now engaged in a bold bid for superior military strength in the West, which essentially means the United States.

It is entirely possible that Castro has had little to do with the Russian's move to establish a nuclear weapons capability at Cienfuegos. He is so dependent on the Soviets for financial aid that he is likely no longer in authority insofar as these actions are concerned. This is of little consequence except that whatever action is taken to see that a formidable military base is not established in Cuba must be directed to the Soviets themselves. In the meantime, Central and South America could be imperiled but, of course, an advantage over North America would be the primary goal.

We should tell the Russians now that all bids are off in all other directions, including the strategic arms limitation talks now going on, unless they stop any plan they may have for building bases in Cuba or any other place near the Western Hemisphere. In the meantime, North, Central and South America should make it clear that strict sanctions of all trade and commerce will be imposed against Cuba if plans believed to be in the making are not immediately abandoned.

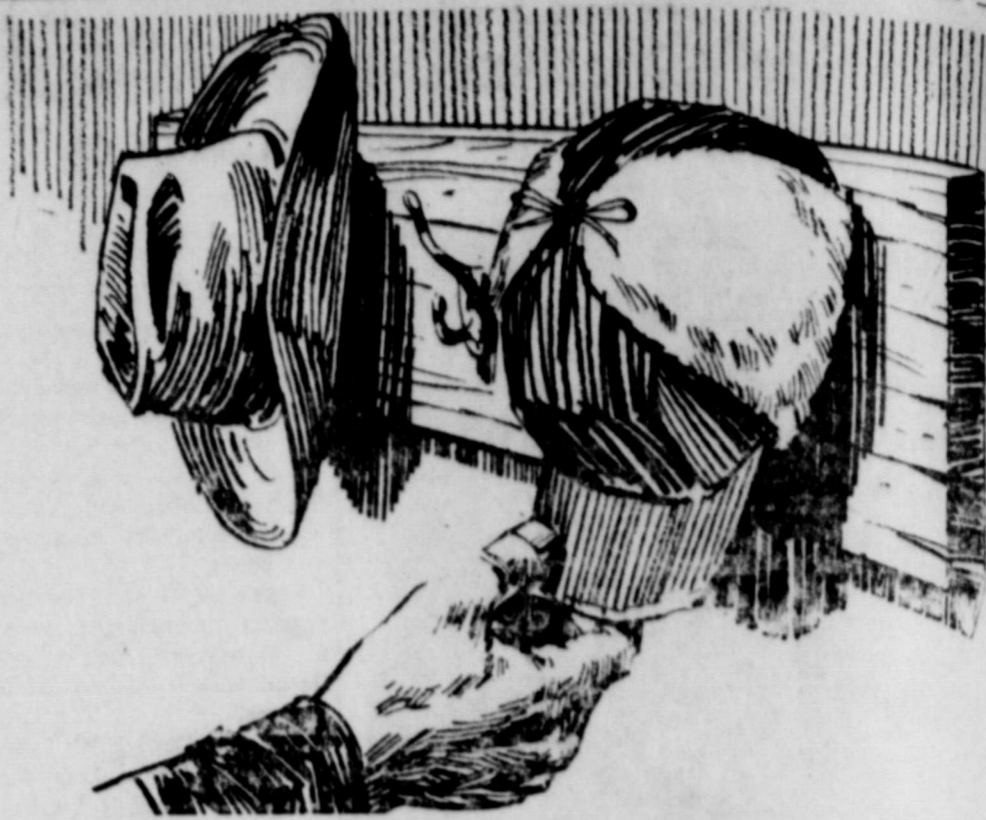

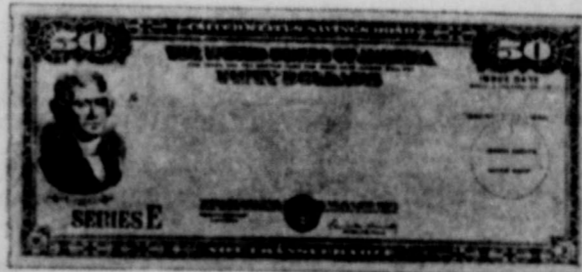

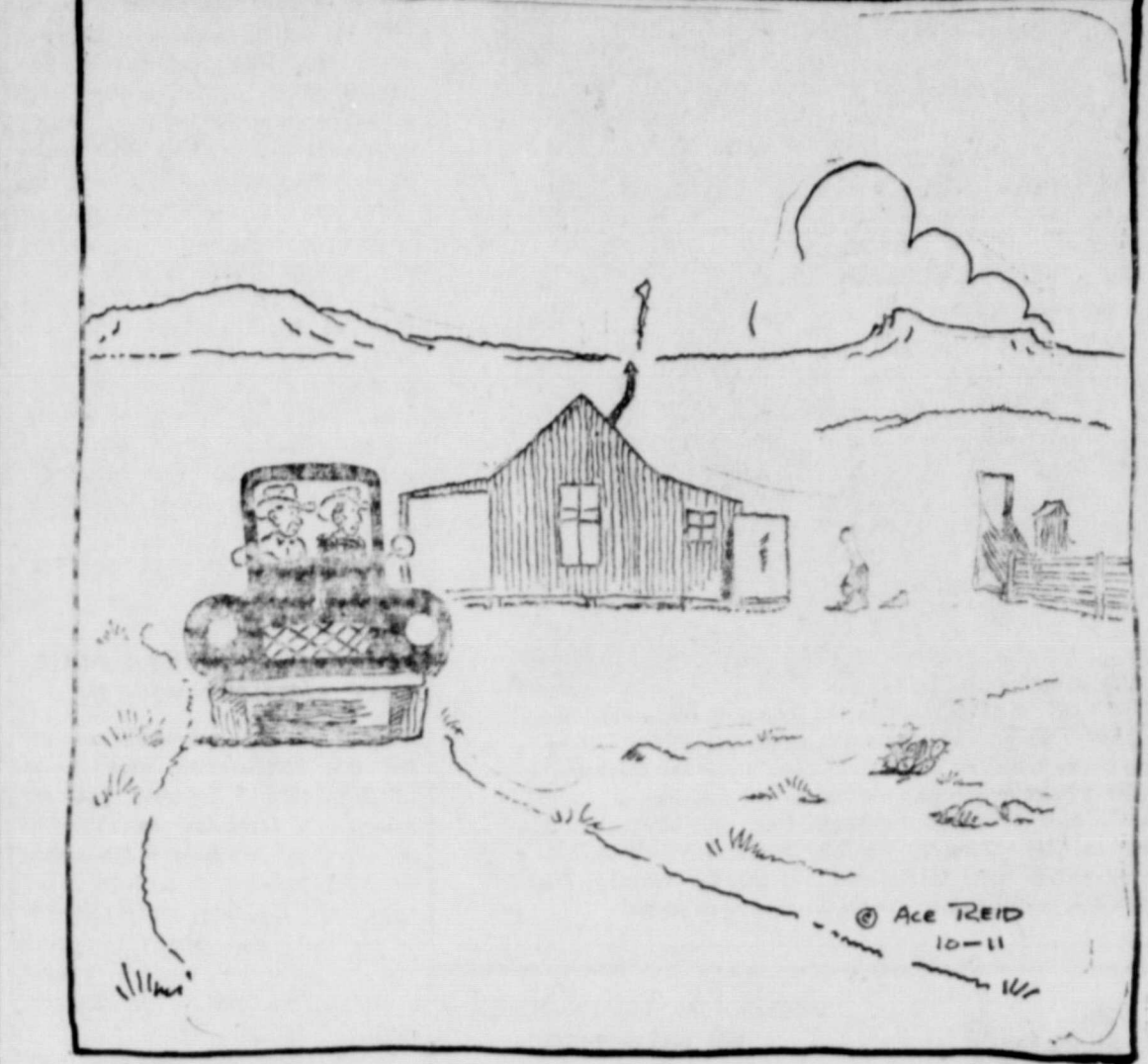

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Insects are not normally known as being particularly good parents to their offspring. However, female twig girdler beetles take care to see that their offspring have the proper environment during their development.

The beetles are called twig girdlers because of the type of damage they do. The females laboriously make a notch-like incision through the bark and into the wood of twig after twig. She then deposits her eggs in small niches on the severed portions. The girdling is done so that the larvae that

hatch from the eggs will have wood in a suitable condition of moisture and decay.

The adult beetles are ¾ to 1-inch long and colored brown to grayish. Their most noticeable characteristic is the very long antennae which are longer than the beetle's body.

Although the beetles are only trying to make a proper home for their offspring, they do considerable damage to shade, fruit and nut trees. The girdled twigs die and either hang on the tree or fall to the ground. In young trees, there may be appreciable injury. Hickory, pecan, oak, persimmon, poplar, and honey locust are among the trees attacked by the beetles. Pecans may be deformed and the nut crop reduced. In persimmons, the beetle wounds afford entrance for a deadly wilt fungus disease.

Girdling begins in the late summer and the damage at this time may go unnoticed. Close inspection of wilted twigs is necessary to see whether they have been notched. In the fall, girdled twigs become more apparent as the twigs begin to drop to the ground.

Chemical controls are effective when they are timed to coincide with the beetle's girdling and egg-laying activities. Sprays containing malathion or sevin should be applied to the tree when the first girdled twigs are noticed. Three applications at two-week intervals are usually necessary.

Infestations may also be reduced by gathering and burning all severed twigs since the larvae remain in them until spring.

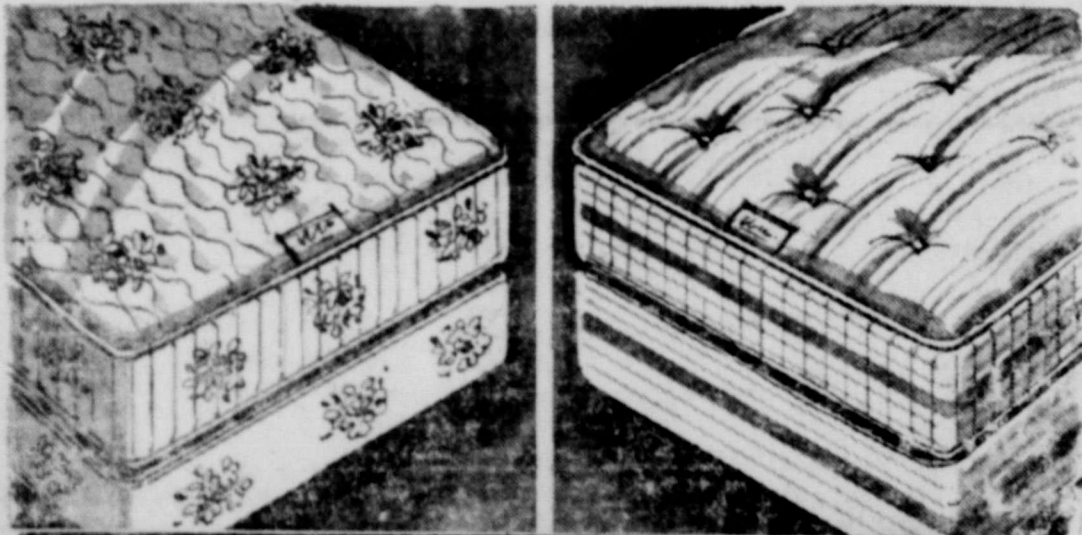
