Coston. Rainwater, who has been commissioner since late January of 1969 when she was appointed by Judge Standifer to serve the unexpired term of her late husband. The appointment was to be effective until the next general election, which was Tuesday of this week. Mrs. Rainwater was the first lady in history to serve as a Hamilton

County Commissioner. Patterson won nomination to the post over two other candidates in the May primary. His present term of office is for the 2-years remaining on the original four-year term of office.


